Information was shared on how our final goal is for teens to develop maturity and readiness to tackle a variety of situations. Thank you to all who attended!

Staffing Process

On Tuesday, March 20th we will be receiving our staffing allocation for the 2018/19 school year. We will then begin our work with our Staffing committee to develop a model for September 2018 that

meets the needs of Glenview. Based on the staffing allocation, we will decide as well how many classes we will have at Glenview in the Fall (e.g., English, Immersion and Extended). Once the model is approved by our Superintendent, teachers will receive their teaching assignments. During this process, teachers have until the end of June to apply to other positions within TDSB. By the end of June, we should have a full staffing complement that we will share in our last Parentview of this school year.

Math PLC

On February 21st, all of our math teachers were released for the day for our Math PLC. We started by focusing our discussion around Number Talks. All math teachers will begin their classes with a Number Talk where students learn that they can make sense of math in their own ways, make mathematically convincing arguments, and critique and build on the ideas of their peers. In contrast to traditional algorithms, Number Talks depend on students sense-making; they help students become confident mathematical thinkers. The other part of the PLC was used to work together to develop summative assessments including unit tests and rich tasks in order to focus our questions on the Achievement chart (e.g., Knowledge, Communication, Application and Thinking)

Requests from the Office

We want to avoid disrupting classes by calling students to the office so that is why a note is needed as it can easily be shown to his/her teacher. With almost 800 students at Glenview, calls home should only occur in emergency situations. We would appreciate your support with this matter. On a separate note, please refrain from calling your child during the school day to ask the office staff to call him/her out of class to speak with them on the phone. We have noticed an increase in the number of these calls lately. Please try to make any after school arrangements with your child before they leave in the morning. Teachers have indicated that this is becoming quite disruptive for the class.

achievement for this test. We found the test to be a nice challenge and a rich part of our math experience. We can't wait to find out our results which will be announced at the March assembly. Best of luck!



The day started with opening remarks from Tracy Schmitt, commonly known as "Unstoppable Tracy" and she is the winner of the 2017 Robert W. Jackson Award [Founder of the Canadian Paralympics], 2017 Ontario Premier Awards, 2017 C-SASIL Lifetime Achievement Award. Tracy is a World Cup Sailor who has climbed the Himalayan mountains, captained a 110-foot-tall ship, won paraskiing bronze and she is funny too. (For example, Tracy said, "Oh, did I mention she was born a 4-way amputee?")

In her address, Tracy stated 9 words I want to carry with me in my life-"I am beautiful, I am intelligent, I am strong."

Tracy's speech showed her courage, determination, perseverance, humour and passion for the things she's done. Everyone in the audience was left with the determination to face the world and overcome hardships in their lives.

Following Tracy's keynote, it was time for Lunch! The buffet was filled with mouth-watering french fries, crispy chicken fingers, delectable salad, sweet and savoury desserts and an assortment of drinks. As we ate, we were entertained by a talented musician who played the steel drums to popular songs like "Despacito". Following an insane dance party, we had a 10 minute mindfulness session to get us refocused for the second half of the day.

When we were calm, one of ladies in charge of the event told her story of how she was mistreated as a young woman. People ridiculed her for trying hard in school and made fun of her black skin colour. She found courage to be assertive and believe in herself. Her story was very powerful. Dear Parent/Guardian:

School Year 2017/2018

Toronto Public Health (T.P.H.) provides dental programs to children from Junior Kindergarten to Grade 8. Dental screening will take place at Glenview during the weeks of April 16 and April 23.

To identify children with oral health problems, a screening program is offered to students in accordance with the Ontario Ministry of Health requirements for mandatory health programs. The screening is an assessment by a dental hygienist using sterilized instruments. The dental hygienist will assess the need for topical fluoride, scaling, sealant and any other obvious dental needs.

As a follow up to the screening, only parents whose children are identified as requiring dental services will be notified. A note to that effect will be sent home with your child/ren for your information and action. You may also receive a phone call from T.P.H. dental staff to assist you in accessing care.

Please be advised that this screening assessment does not replace the dental examination done by a licensed dentist.

If you do not wish your child/ren to be screened, please inform the school.
