ROCK CLIMBING



60 students from Glenview went to True North Climbing, the climbing gym at Downsview Park. It was an amazing experience. There were a large variety of varying difficulties in the walls that we could climb. First, we tried the auto belay routes. This consisted of a large pulley at the top of the wall, which would support and catch you if you fall. It was quite frightening to trust the system, but after a few runs, we felt safe with it. After a few successful attempts, we were able to try new challenges; We spent about an hour and a half just trying the auto-belay walls.

Later, we decided to move on to a Top-Rope belay course. This consisted of a person on the ground

(the belayer) connected to you through a rope looped around a point anchored high up on the route. When you are climbing, they would be pulling and taking out the slack in the rope with a device called a Gri-Gri. With all this combined, the belayer would be able to catch you if you ever slipped. Though some the of the walls were challenging, it was enjoyable because it really tested our strength and made it all that much more satisfying when we reached the top (If we did!).

It turned out there was more than just climbing walls. Around a corner, we found a training area filled with Slack-Lines and smaller objects to scale such as a table. This might not seem that exciting, as the table was merely a table bolted to the floor. The challenge however, is to climb from on top of the table to under it and around until you end up back on top without touching the floor! This might not seem challenging but, when we tried it we could barely get underneath.





Then, there were the slack-lines, a long, wide stretchy band that span between two points. This really challenged your balancing and we all eagerly took turns trying to get across without falling. We did this for at least an hour. We were having so much fun that even Mr. Rodier saw us and tried it for himself. We spotted a really easy climbing wall. As a group, we decided to see who can scale the wall the fastest. We would each take turns and time our speed and then at the end compare our results to see who got up the fastest.

Our day was truly amazing with challenging walls to scale, fun objects to climb and balance on, and finally attempt to climb an easy wall as fast as possible. This rock climbing experience was spectacular and amazing and many of us wish to return soon.

Course Selection Sheet Instructions

- 1. Complete Part A
- 2. Complete section 5 in Part B (Country of Birth, First Lang and Date of Entry if born outside of Canada)
- 3. Choose 8 courses plus alternatives if required
- 4. Make sure to sign the paper course selection sheet on the back of page 2
- 5. Complete a myBlueprint course submission. Ensure the 8 courses and alternatives on myBlueprint are the same as what you chose on the paper course selection sheet
- 6. Submit myBlueprint and print out Page 2.
- 7. Return the signed course selection sheet along with the page 2 printout of myBlueprint.
