

This is the first year that University of Waterloo has offered this challenge to students in Grade 7 and 8. The challenge questions aren't based on computers. They are logic and reasoning based problem solving situations. Logic and

reasoning skills are important elements required for coding, computer programming and robotics.

Mr. Henderson's class is working diligently with Luke Persaud, our STEM coach, preparing for our initial First Lego league competition and a STEM Pilot project: The class is developing curriculum as part of the project, which will then be shared with other schools.

Mr. Persaud is also working with Ms. Forte's junior Kindergarten class in designing and building dinosaur condos. The Grade 3's of Mme Le Bouedec are embarking on an inquiry-based project on rectangles that will culminate in the creation of wooden vehicles, where they will learn to use hand tools as part of

the process. Mme Bennett's grade 5 class is embarking on a Digital Citizenship project using web-based forms as part of Google Classroom.

Addi Denison, Our Engineer in Residence is ready to begin working with our classes. Last year she focused on Primary grades – this year, she will begin working with our upper Junior grades.

We have received cases for our new iPad minis, thanks to SO-FUN. We have also purchased 10 refurbished HP 324 laptops through the Board to begin the process of replenishing our laptop inventory.

PIAC's 9th Annual Conference

On November 14th, PIAC (Parent Involvement Advisory Committee) hosted their 9th Annual Conference at Earl Haig Secondary School.

This year's theme "Unlocking Your Child's Full Potential" touched all the seminars I attended that day: Science, Technology, Everything (has now replaced Engineering) and Math (STEM); Mental Health; My Blueprint (an online educational planner); and Specialized Programs in the TDSB. In total there were 17 informative workshops to choose from, all facilitated by experts and/or heads within the TDSB. The day ended with a panel discussion about the new sex education curriculum, which clarified a lot of questions about this controversial topic.
