At Humewood, students attended an assembly lead by Aqua Ninii Waawaaskone, a singer, songwriter, storyteller, artist, activist, and a strong Anishinaabe Kwe~Indigenous Woman. In class, student wrote reflections about their knowledge and understanding of this significant day, and these contributed to a school-wide orange shirt display.

"OPAL (Outdoor Play and Learning) is the first program in Canada that aims to make play an integral part of the school day. Children engage in self-directed play with "loose parts" (tools, boxes, spare tires, fabric, etc.), boosting their sense of agency and creating a more inclusive and reciprocal social environment.

OPAL is grounded in the child's right to play and the UN Convention on the Rights of the Child, to which Canada is a signatory. In partnership with the Toronto District School Board (TDSB), the OPAL program will roll out to 42 schools by 2020. Our goal is to bring the program to schools across the country."
