This Month's Character Trait is:

EMPATHY

The short, repeated sentence structures and expressive illustrations showed Kiran that he could understand French! It's available in English too, great for building early readers' confidence. The other animals get bored, tired or annoyed at waiting for Mr. Panda to finish baking, but penguin's patience is rewarded with a treat that's bigger than them! It has gorgeous illustrations all of black and white animals, then the baked goodie on the final page is a multicoloured surprise.
- Claire's (age 8) favourite author is Roald Dahl. She loves his book Matilda the best. Matilda is about a girl who is very smart. Her parents and some of her teachers are very mean. French Programs Application Deadline

For families interested in the Toronto District School Board's system-wide French Programs, we offer an online process to apply for Early French Immersion (begins in Senior Kindergarten) and Middle French Immersion (begins in Grade 4). An offer of placement in the program (not a specific school) is guaranteed to all on-time applicants. The timelines for applying for these programs for September 2021 are:

Early French Immersion: Applications must be completed online between November 2 and November 27, 2020. Middle French Immersion: Applications must be completed online between January 4 and January 29, 2021. Offers of placement within your chosen program (not a specific school) will be made to all on-time applicants in the weeks following the close of the application window. Families with an older sibling currently in a French program are still required to complete an online application for the new student.

At Humewood CS we are committed to creating a teaching and learning environment that is equitable and inclusive for all students, staff and families. We have begun the work of intentionally identifying, interrupting and addressing anti-Black racism in our school and we are committed to doing more.

Mask and Face Covering Requirements For TDSB Students & Staff - Updated

In response to rising confirmed cases of COVID-19 in Toronto, the GTA and elsewhere in Ontario, health agencies, and provincial and municipal governments are reviewing and updating health and safety measures in an attempt to reduce the spread of the virus. The TDSB is also reviewing its health and safety measures and making changes where needed. The TDSB's COVID-19 Mask Procedure - PR730 (formerly TDSB Mask Guidelines) has been updated in light of increases in confirmed COVID-19 cases. The Procedure has also been updated to provide additional direction regarding mask exemption requests. Important changes are highlighted in yellow throughout the updated COVID-19 Mask Procedure. The TDSB's COVID-19 Mask Procedure has been developed to address our collective responsibility to follow public health and Ministry of Education requirements known to be effective in combatting the transmission of COVID-19. Unless an exemption applies that would allow a student, staff or visitor to attend in person without a mask, the wearing of appropriate masks is mandatory at TDSB schools or buildings. This Procedure provides direction to superintendents, principals, managers, staff, visitors, parents and students on the TDSB's mask requirements and exemption requests. It is really important that students remember to bring their masks to school each day. Students should be provided with two masks from home, in case they need to be changed throughout the school day. We are noticing during morning entry that many students arrive without a mask. Although we have masks to provide to our students, we should refrain from relying on the school to provide masks because this delays entry procedures and will eventually deplete the masks we have in our building, so please let's not make this a habit. Please remember to check your child's backpack or fanny pack to ensure they have masks for their school day, each and every day. Thank you for your co-operation with this matter.

PICK-UP & DROP-OFF DURING LUNCH

PICK-UP

We are noticing parents picking up their children during the lunch hour for appointments. Please ensure that you are coming to the office right before lunch (11:30 p.m.) or right after lunch (12:45 p.m.) to do so. It is very difficult to locate students while they are playing outside, and then having them retrieve their belongings from their locked classrooms is also a challenge.

DROP-OFF

If your child/children were absent in the morning to sign back in, or if they are coming back to school from lunch, they must only arrive back to school at the sound of the reentry bell which rings at 12:40 p.m.

Fire Drills & Lockdown

At the beginning of each school year, our students and staff prepare for the year ahead by establishing the foundations for a successful year. One of the ways we know we can help students be successful is to create a safe environment in which to learn. Though no one ever wants to see an emergency happen at a school, it's important for school staff to be equipped to deal with those situations, should these occur.

The safety of students and staff is a top priority at our school and to that end, as with all emergency drills, it is essential that we are prepared and understand the importance of procedures that will help ensure the safety of everyone in our school.


The TDSB has taken steps to ensure your child's safety while in school. Each school has developed emergency preparedness plans that include steps staff will take in the event of an emergency, how staff will get students away from possible dangers, and how students' families will be contacted.

One aspect of emergency preparedness is the lockdown and fire drill. All schools are required to conduct a minimum of two lockdown drills and six fire drills each school year. Lockdown drills, like fire drills, are an essential component to ensuring student and staff safety. It is important that all staff and students are prepared and know how to respond in cases of emergencies. The drills last approximately 5 minutes and ensure plans are effective and can also systematically identify any safety concerns.

Communication is also very important in any emergency situation. The emergency contact information kept on file is important in helping this happen. It lists the people who can pick up a student from the school. If you have not yet provided this information to the office or have updates to the information on file, please make sure our office staff have that information as soon as possible.

REMEMBRANCE DAY - NOVEMBER 11, 2020

On Wednesday, November 11th, students and staff at TDSB schools will mark Remembrance Day. For Remembrance Day, teachers make connections between global events and students' lives by promoting peace within our school community. On this solemn occasion, staff, students, parents, and the wider community all join together in a call for peace.



Humewood CS will be hosting a virtual Remembrance Day service which will include some meaningful videos, a moment of silence, and some displays of student visual art pieces. There will be more details with the google meet link and time sent to families prior to the service.

Without this granted permission, students cannot fully participate in some of the learning that takes place beyond Humewood, such as, walking excursions within the immediate community. Please ensure you complete the entire package as soon as possible.

Check only one box. By adding your signature, you are verifying that the information is true. Return the completed form to your child's school principal

Water Bottles

It is important that your child/ren come to school with 1 to 2 reusable water bottles. This will ensure students stay hydrated during their school day. Currently we are only using a water bottle filling station or some classroom sinks to refill bottles. Students are NOT using water fountains. We are noticing that several students forget their water



bottle daily, and parents dropping them off at the office. Please ensure these are packed in your child's/ren's backpacks so they have all that they need. Teachers have been instructed to refrain from giving their student plastic cups to refill as this is wasteful and increases the chances of spills within the building. Please make sure the water bottle is labelled with permanent marker or a label. Thank you for your help and cooperation with this.

Indoor/Outdoor Shoes

With the change of weather, we want to ensure that our hallways and classrooms are kept as clean as possible. We are happy to see that many parents/guardians have sent their children with indoor shoes to be left at school. Students are switching out of their outdoor shoes and boots, into their indoor shoes with smooth and staggered procedures.

There are still several students who are wearing their outdoor shoes and boots in our building leaving some classrooms completely full of mud and debris all over

their floors. This is not conducive to a safe environment, nor is it fair for our caretaking staff to clean/mop each and every day. Remember our students are now eating in their classrooms (snacks, lunch), and we need to maintain a clean, safe, and sanitized classroom environment for our students.

Students will have a designated spot in their classroom or outside the hallway their classroom to hang their coats and store their outdoor boots/shoes. Teachers have developed different systems to ensure that students are staggered when they retrieve and return their belongings.

EARLY FRENCH IMMERSION INFORMATION PACKAGE 2021-2022

PARENTS/GUARDIANS/FAMILIES OF CHILDREN IN JUNIOR KINDERGARTEN

You have a choice to make about French programming for your child. For 2021-2022, across the TDSB, we will continue to offer two programs: Early French Immersion (SK entry) and Middle French Immersion (Grade 4 entry).

Senior Kindergarten is the **ONLY** time your child may begin the **Early French Immersion** program.

WHAT IS EARLY FRENCH IMMERSION?

Early French Immersion programs are designed for students who do not speak French at home. The Early French Immersion program (SK Entry) provides the maximum French language experience available in our schools.

The French Immersion program for Senior Kindergarten to Grade 3 is a 100% model of instruction in French in most schools (with the exception of a PREP providing subject that may be delivered in English if required). English is introduced in Grade 4 for about one hour per day and increases to half-day by Grade 6.

The subjects taught in French SK through to Grade 8:

- Math
- Social Studies (Geography/History)
- French Language

After Grade 8, students continue the French Immersion program at designated secondary schools. Students who successfully complete a minimum of 10 credits in French at the secondary school level are eligible for a Certificate of Bilingual Studies in French within the TDSB.


Applications for the Early French Immersion Program are completed online for September 2021

Applications to the Early French Immersion program (SK entry) are made the year the child is in Junior Kindergarten for entry in September of Senior Kindergarten.

- ✓ It is an entirely online application process.
- ✓ All communication will be sent via the email address provided online at the time of application.
- ✓ Please check this email regularly including junk mail.
- ✓ Families with an older sibling currently enrolled in the same French program and who will be in attendance the following year are still required to complete an online application for the new student. Please select the "sibling option" within the online application.

Please visit the application site www.tdsb.on.ca/pars during the application period:

- ✓ You will need your child's date of birth and OEN (Ontario Education Number). The OEN is a 9-digit number found on any report card from the TDSB.
- ✓ For non-TDSB students, please select the "Non-TDSB Student" option and follow the steps to generate an identification number. You must then return to the PARS site and follow the application procedure with this number.
- ✓ Please select Early French Immersion from the drop-down menu and complete the application process.





FRENCH AS A SECOND LANGUAGE Early French Immersion Information Package

An offer of placement in Early French Immersion is guaranteed to all eligible on-time applicants, however placement in a particular school is **NOT** guaranteed.

On-time applicants will be offered a placement online via the email address provided at the time of application. Parents/Guardians <u>MUST</u> take action to accept this placement by the deadline requested when offered a placement in order to reserve a spot in the program.

Offers of placement will be on-going through the weeks and months following the close of the application period. *Please check email regularly (including junk mail) and follow all instructions found therein.*

IMPORTANT DATES:

Application process opens: November 2, 2020

Deadline for applications: November 27, 2020

<u>Please note the following items:</u> While every effort will be made to place students in the school identified as their area French Immersion school, this is not always possible. In cases where the number of applications in a given area is greater than the number of allotted program spaces in the school, students may be redirected to schools with available program space.

Placements are made based on the child's primary home address of record prior to the application deadline. If the address changes between the application deadline and the fall of the SK year, there is no guarantee of placement in the new area.

Applicants who have older siblings currently enrolled in the same program and who will be in attendance the following year have a priority placement in that school.

NB: Please note that classes with fewer than 25 students may not open.
