# Students Transferring Between the In-person Schools and the Virtual Schools for October 13

The following message will provide information on how to proceed with requests to have students transferred to the Virtual School, or have Virtual School students transferred to in-person learning, for the first opt in/out date of October 13, 2020.

Parents have until September 29th to inform schools of their intent to switch. Please read the instructions below very carefully. A reminder of the deadline will be posted to the landing page of the TDSB website, on social media, and as part of a larger communication that will be sent to parents/guardians later this week.

As long as parents/guardians complete the form, no further action (or emails) are required as the information will be collected and sent directly to the Virtual School Office Administrators.

#### **Updated Mask Policy for Parents and Caregivers**

In order to minimize exposure and risk to students and staff all School visitors, including parents/guardians and caregivers, are required to wear a mask/face covering indoors and outdoors on school property, such as during pick-up and drop-off.

# Orange Shirt Day Wednesday, September 30

(Recognized throughout the week)

Phyllis Webstad, a member of the Stswecem'c Xgat'tem First Nation in British Columbia, was forced to attend St. Joseph's Mission Residential School, as her relatives before her. She entered the school in 1973 wearing a brand new orange shirt which was immediately confiscated by the staff and replaced with a uniform. She never saw the shirt again, and began to associate the colour with the traumatic experiences in the school and the loss of language and cultural identity she suffered. In 2013, Webstad transformed her negative experiences into something positive by creating a Nationally recognized Orange Shirt Day. Celebrated annually on September 30th, this day acknowledges the residential school system in Canada, honours those who survived, and remembers those who did not. It is a day to demonstrate, by wearing orange, that all students matter.

Orange Shirt Day has been marked in schools across Canada in a variety of ways, including Orange Ribbon campaigns, commemorative walks, and wearing orange shirts. Over 6,500 survivor statements have been collected by the Truth and Reconciliation Commission of Canada, which concluded in 2016 after six years of research and testimonies. Senator Murray Sinclair has stated that "reconciliation must fall in the hands of Canadians, not solely with Indigenous peoples." Ultimately, wearing orange shirts on September 30 is a visual reminder of our shared past as Aboriginal and non-Aboriginal peoples in Canada, and provides an opportunity for dialogue between Aboriginal and non-Aboriginal peoples in shaping our shared future.

#### **PEDESTRIAN SAFETY - TIPS FOR PARENTS**

Children under nine should be accompanied by adults or older children when crossing the street. At this age, their judgment and perceptual skills are still immature, yet they often eagerly try to cross streets on their own in order to demonstrate some independence. Teach your children the rules of the road - start when they're young. Think of it as gradually training your children about safety until all the connections are in place. By the time your child reaches age nine, and can act independently, the road safety rules will be second nature.

- •Teach children how to cross the street safely. Teach them to stop (before stepping onto the road), look left, right and left again, and listen for traffic before stepping out into the street. Teach children to wait until the street is clear and to keep looking until they have crossed the street. They should also look the driver in the eye before crossing.
- Teach children to recognize pedestrian crossing signals but not rely on them. Before crossing, children should also be sure the traffic has stopped. Remind them to continue across if the light changes to "Don't Walk" while they are in the crosswalk.
- Teach children to be extra alert when crossing at a corner with no traffic lights.
- Teach your children to stop at driveways, alleys and areas without curbs and to never run out onto the street.
- Teach children about the dangers of crossing the street between parked cars or when not at a corner. Children should cross only at corners and pedestrian crosswalks, not diagonally or between parked cars.
- •Teach children to respect the role of the crossing guard and to understand his/her signals.
- •Teach children that wherever possible they should walk on the sidewalk. In areas without sidewalks, teach children to walk as far away from the road as possible, facing approaching traffic (when there is no choice but to walk on the road).
- •Teach children that playing games at railway crossings or around trains can be deadly. Teach children that the only way to cross railway tracks is to use designated railway crossings.

Follow the same rules that you want your child to follow. You may want to cut across the street in the middle of the block, but you want your child to learn to cross at the intersection. Be a good role model.

#### **School Health Services**

#### **Vaccinations for Students**

Vaccinations for Hepatitis B, HPV and Menactra in Grade 7/8 schools are suspended for the fall of 2020. Students can get vaccinated at TPH community clinics later in the fall, by appointment. We will notify you when these clinics open.

Toronto Public Health will not be reviewing student immunization records this year. It is important for students to get their usual vaccinations to protect them from non-COVID-19 diseases. Because vaccinations are an essential health service, you can make an appointment to get them from your health care provider.

#### **Dental Services**

Dental screening services in schools are temporarily suspended, but are still available at Toronto Public Health dental clinics, by appointment. Please call 416-338-6565 for more information.
