Identifying sounds in words is one of the many strategies early readers use. Remember, the <u>first sound</u> in the word 'fun' is 'fff'. The <u>last sound</u> in the word 'fun' is 'nnn'. When you see a letter in between slashes (e.g., /s/, /f/), it is a cue that the sound is said not the letter name.				1 Say the names of all family members.
