# Principal's Message

Snow is on the ground, and in a few weeks, school will be out and we will all be enjoying the Winter Break. It is hard to believe that the year 2020 is almost here.

As you read through this issue of our newsletter, there are a few items that I would like to highlight and bring to your attention:

- School Advisory Council Our School Council has been working hard to develop different ways to engage parents. Currently, we are working to bring workshops of interest to our school community. The next workshop topic is being brought to us by Aisling Discoveries and is on bullying and how parents can help their children at home. If you are interested in the work of the council our next Parent Council meeting in on February 4<sup>th</sup>, 2020. The meetings begin at 6 pm in the staffroom.
- **Inclement Weather** Please ensure that on extremely cold days your children do not arrive at school too early. Arriving <u>5 to 10 minutes</u> <u>prior</u> to the bell ringing (i.e., 8:40 a.m. or 12:25 p.m.) would be best. Always make sure that your child is dressed appropriately for the weather. For example, when it rains, a raincoat or an umbrella will help to keep your child dry until they are brought into the school. On days when cold weather is a factor, (when the temperature reaches -28 °C or colder), the children will be kept inside during recess.
- Primary Concert and Holiday Food Drive Our Primary Concert for students in Kindergarten to grade 3/4 will be on December 12<sup>th</sup> at 6:30 p.m. We hope to see you then. Please also consider bring a nonperishable food item to donate to a local food bank. Food donations will be accepted until December 16<sup>th</sup>.
- Winter Break Our school break begins on Monday, December 23rd. We look forward to seeing all of our students back on Monday, January 6th, 2020.

#### **Fire Visits**

Ms Ballantyne also showed us, as a school, how important it was to make a plan for escape routes at home to make sure everyone would get out safely in a fire. We also heard how quickly a kitchen fire could spread and how to cook safely in the kitchen.

At the end of the presentations, Ms Ballantyne gave the students some booklets to take home so that they could share their knowledge with their parents. We were lucky to have had this great opportunity to learn more about fire safety, found it really eye-opening, and look forward to hearing more about fire safety in the future!

## **Traffic Safety Tips For A Safe Winter**

As winter approaches, we know that severe weather will be part of our daily lives for the next several months. While traffic safety is an important matter all year long, this is a particularly good time to review what we can do to keep students safe.

The need to be aware and alert at all times, on any road, and even in the most routine circumstances is key to traffic safety. This applies to students and drivers alike. Road conditions can be challenging in the winter months. So to those of us who drive, please take extra care on the roads and in parking lots, especially in areas where children might be present.

School staff periodically review street and traffic safety with students. Parents can help reinforce these safety messages with children at home. Below are some tips that might be helpful to review.

- Stop, look, and listen for traffic.
- Only cross at corners and crosswalks.
- Make eye contact with drivers.
- Walk on the right side of the crosswalk.
- Wear appropriate footwear to reduce the chances of slipping.
- Never run into the street.
- Obey crossing signals.
- Cross only if clear.
- Walk on sidewalks.

- Where there are no sidewalks, walk as far away from traffic as possible, facing traffic.

**School Specific Information:** Due to the <u>large number of buses</u> at our school, the following options are the safest ways to drop your child off and pick your child up before and after the school day. 1. Walk with your child to school.

2. A <u>crosswalk guard</u> is located at Briarcross and Chartland for student safety. Parents may find it convenient to park on Briarcross and then have their child cross Chartland safely with the crosswalk guard.

3. Park legally on the side of the street along Chartland and <u>walk</u> your child across the street at the crosswalk.

Please **do not** stop or park in our **bus loading zones** as it prevents our school buses from being able to drop off or pick up our students safely. The school parking lot is for staff only as well.

The safety of our students is always a top priority.

## **Keeping Kids Safe**

Drivers are reminded to do their part to keep children safe near school buses. Drivers should follow these tips:

- Stop and never pass a school bus when its red lights are flashing.

- Leave space around school buses and avoid blocking school bus loading zones so children can enter and exit safely.

- Be prepared to stop for a school bus at any time, not just during school hours.

- Always obey the rules of the road and watch for children, especially in school zones.

- Stop for pedestrians at crosswalks and school crossings.

Parents can also help keep their children safe by reminding them to be aware of their surroundings when they are on or near school buses.



#### Winter Weather Transportation

From time to time, it may be necessary to cancel student transportation, classes and/or programs due to severe weather. On rare occasions, severe weather makes it necessary to close schools, administrative offices or sites.

With approximately 246,000 students in 582 schools, any decision to cancel buses, classes and/or programs or to close sites can have a significant impact on thousands of families across Toronto. This decision is not taken lightly. When schools remain open on days with inclement weather, parents/guardians make the final decision on whether to send their children to school and they can keep children home from school if they so choose.
