Ottawa Trip – Grades 5 and 6 – June 5-7, 2023

On February 23, I provided an update by Zoom conferencing on the Ottawa trip, along with an email follow-up to grades 5 and 6 parents on Tuesday, February 28. These included the revised trip itinerary, summary of changes, and a survey. The staff participating in the trip and I will continue to maintain open lines of communications with parents of the students attending the trip, and the tour provider. The end of year Ottawa trip is an excursion organized by the teaching staff of the grades 5 and 6 students. The students also held fundraising efforts for their trip to Ottawa. I am pleased to share that the students raised \$3000. through various ventures including a Chili and Hot Chocolate Sale at the Island Christmas Boutique; A Candy Cane Holiday Sale during the festive season; A Hot Chocolate and Candy Cane Sale at the Holiday Hoopla in-person event at school; and a chocolate dipped fruit Kebob event held on Valentine's Day by the grade 1/2 class. The \$3000. will be provided by cheque directly to Brightspark and it will contribute to offsetting the additional \$57. added to the cost of the trip due to the hotel upgrade to the Holiday Inn – Downtown Ottawa – Parliament Hill. Future funds raised will be directed towards the trip, and parents may either opt in or out of other funds as indicated through the survey in which we asked whether or not you would like to pay the full cost for your child's trip on your own?

Parent Access Card – Toronto Island Ferry



Emergency and Crisis Response Plan (ECR) - Lockdown Drill – March 10

Schools are required to schedule and complete 6 practice Fire Drills (3 in the Fall, and 3 in the Spring) and 2 practice Lockdown Drills each year. We are having a lockdown drill on March 10, and have invited our Neighbourhood Community Officers from the Toronto Police Service – 52 Division to join us onsite for the lockdown drill. These are emergency management and preparedness events that enable staff, students and community partners to know what to do in case of emergency.

THREAT TO SCHOOL SAFETY RESPONSE PROCEDURES

Follow these steps when you have been informed of a Threat to School Safety


CLASSROOM INSTRUCTION

Engage in ongoing professional learning with staff to build understanding, develop critical consciousness, and implement strategies through curriculum. This will better support students and families in confronting hate, racism, and discrimination.

CAREGIVER ENGAGEMENT AND LEARNING Establish a district and local school learning plan to support combatting hate and racism with parent/caregiver communities utilizing system and school based data.

CYBER SAFETY AND DIGITAL CITIZENSHIP

Cultivate strategies that support cyber safety, digital citizenship and critical awareness of hate and racism in social media and other online environments.



STUDENT LEADERSHIP

The development of a student equity leadership collective that will make positive changes system wide and at the school level to address racism, hate and discrimination in the TDSB.

TOOLS FOR RESPONSE TAKING ACTION

The creation of student equity collectives in each school committed to addressing and combatting hate and racism.

EDUCATIONAL PARTNERSHIPS FOR LEARNING

Building partnerships with community agencies and educators whose voices are often not heard to support extending learning opportunities in dismantling hate and racism.
