
ATHLETICS

Secondary Program Review

The Toronto District School Board (TDSB) is undertaking a review of secondary schools to ensure all students have equitable access to programs and opportunities, as close to home as possible. The vision of the Secondary Program Review, which will address both under and over-utilized schools, includes fewer schools with strong programming and increased access to courses that support all pathways. In order to achieve that, the Board will consider potential consolidation and/or relocation of schools, repurposing secondary school buildings to address other system needs, and different models of school organization (e.g. full-year programming).

Key Facts

- •The secondary panel has declined from a high of 140,433 students in 1976 to approximately 72,600 students today
- •As of October 2019, the average utilization rate at the 111 secondary schools in the system was 78 percent; 25 of them were operating below 50 percent of their capacity
- •The average age of our secondary school buildings is 64
- Just over 50 percent of secondary students attend their home school by address (compared to 76 percent of elementary students)
- •Secondary students are choosing programs and schools in higher income areas and fleeing from those in lower income areas
- •Secondary schools are competing for a shrinking secondary school-aged population
- •The existing structure of secondary schools across the Board is not in sync with the TDSB's Multi-Year Strategic Plan.

Kinder Corner

Now that the COLD WEATHER IS REALLY HERE...

LAYERS, LAYERS, LAYERS! As the temperature continues to dip, we want to encourage our Kindergarten students to dress in layers for school. A T-shirt underneath a long-sleeved shirt provides all-day comfort, as our classrooms vary widely in temperature. It is important for your child to wear a warm jacket that may be put on and zipped independently and appropriate accessories for the weather each day, as we spend at least 45 minutes outside per day, unless the temperature is below -20 degrees with the wind chill.

<u>LABELS!</u> Please ensure all clothing items, including accessories (hat, neck warmer, mittens), are labeled with your child's first name and last initial.

CHOICES! Get your child involved in picking out new outerwear. Have your child try on a new jacket before buying it, to ensure that your child is able to zip it easily. Dressing independently gives young learners feelings of pride and responsibility. It also encourages them to take care and keep track of their personal belongings. MITTENS vs GLOVES... Mittens are much warmer than gloves and are far easier for young children to put on independently.

In Person Registration

Step 1 Find your local school.

Step 2Contact your <u>local school</u> and make sure you have the following documents:

- Proof of age (birth certificate, Canadian passport, Canadian Citizenship card or certificate or baptismal record)
- Proof of address, including any two of the following current documents: lease or deed, car registration, utility bill, residential telephone bill, moving bill, property tax bill, bank statement, credit card statement, or correspondence from a government agency.
- Proof of immunization (the card that shows a list of needles your child has received):
 - 1. Report online www.toronto.ca/studentvaccines.
 - 2. If unable to report online, parents can provide immunization information to the school and the school will mail a copy to Toronto Public Health. Toronto Public Health accepts and translates foreign immunization records.
 - 3. If requesting an exemption, call 416-392-1250.
- Verification of date of arrival, if your child was not born in Canada. Children without immigration status are welcome in our schools and information about them or their families will not be shared with immigration authorities. To register, please visit the International Programs and Admissions Office at 5050 Yonge Street, on the main floor, for a TDSB school admission letter.

Online Registration

Kindergarten Registration for the 2020-2021 school year will open on **Monday, February 3, 2020 at 9 a.m. Step 1**
