French Programs Application Deadline

For families interested in the Toronto District School Board's French Immersion or Extended French programs, we offer an online process for applying to: Early French Immersion (EFI) which begins in Senior Kindergarten; Junior Extended French (JEF) which begins in Grade 4

At this time, we guarantee an offer of placement in the program (not a specific school) to all

on-time applicants. The timelines for applying for these programs for September 2020 are:

Applications for Early French Immersion (for a Junior Kindergarten aged child), must be completed online between November 4, 2019 and November 29, 2019.

Applications for Junior Extended French must be completed online between January 6, 2020 and January 31, 2020.

Offers of placement within your chosen program will be made to all on-time applicants in the weeks following the close of the application window.

Please note: families with an older sibling currently in a French program are still required to complete an online application for the new student.

Kinder Corner

Learning In Mrs. Malloy and Mrs. Ieriti's Room 3

Children in Room 3 are exploring the changing colours in our community and school yard. Children are researchers and demonstrate their wonder and curiosity during daily outdoor play. During our outdoor play they notice the leaves have changed yellow, orange, red, green and even black! They have been bringing in bags of leaves from home to explore in the classroom. The children are wondering, do all leaves turn black before the winter? They also wonder if leaves "crush" or break, because the water inside dries up. Looking ahead in our learning, the children want to know, do leaves turn the colour of the rainbow? They also want to know, do leaves get thirsty? What do they eat to grow?





Children have been finding math in leaves in our Kindergarten yard. One child collected leaves and placed them in order; one, two, three. **What math do you see outside?**





Reading in Kindergarten

What does reading look like in Kindergarten? How can I help my child at home?

Children in Kindergarten are introduced to books daily. Children listen to books read to them each day related to interests in the classroom. Books are made accessible to children throughout the classroom to inspire them to read in English, as well as their home language. We are helping children develop skills on holding books, what is the front and back of the book, the author, and illustrator. In the month of November several classrooms will visit our local Brentwood Library to further inspire children's love of reading. Children will receive a library card application so that they visit with loved ones to explore books. Library cards have no cost for Toronto residents. We are looking forward to exploring our community and meeting the local Librarian!

November is Aboriginal Education Month in the TDSB "Aboriginal Education for ALL: Building Alliances"

This year's theme highlights that Aboriginal education is not just for Aboriginal students but for all students. When non-Aboriginal students learn about the rich histories, cultures, and contemporary contexts of diverse Aboriginal peoples, cross-cultural coalitions and alliances are more likely to occur. Non-Aboriginal students learn about themselves in relationship to the experiences and lives of Aboriginal peoples. These experiences create possibilities for a common commitment to social justice that leads to an equitable and more inclusive society. There is also a need for educators and policy makers to deepen knowledge about Aboriginal education in supporting Aboriginal student success and well-being as a whole. (Senk, 2011)

ABORIGINAL EDUCATION MONTH is an occasion for all our schools and workplaces to improve our knowledge and understanding of the diverse histories, cultures, achievements, experiences and world views of First Nation, Métis and Inuit peoples in Canada.

In designating November as Aboriginal Education Month, we acknowledge Aboriginal peoples as the original peoples of this land. Within our classrooms, Aboriginal Education Month provides an occasion to honour the historic and contemporary accomplishments of Aboriginal peoples, and to re-examine conventional understandings (past and present) which often overlook the perspectives of First Nation, Métis and Inuit peoples. The histories of First Nation, Inuit and Métis peoples are an integral part of Canada's history, yet the contributions of Aboriginal peoples, their rich and diverse cultures, as well as their rights and perspectives have traditionally been marginalized.

These activities in recognition of ABORIGINAL EDUCATION MONTH are designed to improve our awareness of the achievements of Aboriginal peoples, their struggles, their successes and their perspectives, both historically, and within in a contemporary context. These teaching and learning experiences serve to foster authentic student engagement and enhanced student success as well as to reinforce pride and self-esteem among First Nation, Métis and Inuit students as they see themselves positively reflected in the curriculum.

We respect the enduring place that First Nation, Métis and Inuit peoples hold in contemporary Canadian society. Additionally, infusing Aboriginal realities and perspectives across curriculum areas creates inclusive spaces for students to see themselves reflected as individuals and validated within the school community. Dr. Susan Dion's report, Decolonizing Our Schools: Aboriginal Education in the Toronto District School Board (2010), outlines how such an inclusive environment positively impacts Aboriginal and non-Aboriginal students' feelings and beliefs about Aboriginal identities, which in turn positively affects their attitudes toward school. http://www.tdsb.on.ca/Portals/0/Community/docs/Decolonizing%20Our%20Schools%203.pdf

Keeping Kids Safe



Drivers are reminded to do their part to keep children safe near school buses.
