Black History Month

The role of Black people and their communities in Canada has largely been ignored as a key part of Canada's history. There is little mention of the many soldiers of African descent who made sacrifices in wartime as far back as the War of 1812. Black History Month is a time to learn more about the many important contributions that Black Canadians and their communities have made to the history and continued growth of Canada.

The first Black History Month in Nova Scotia was observed in 1988 and later renamed African Heritage Month in 1996. In 1993, the Ontario Black History Society (OBHS) successfully filed a petition in Ontario to proclaim February as Black History Month.

A student who wished to remain anonymous said this on their experience as a black teenager: "I've been profiled especially for being darker skinned. I hate living in a multicultural country, although everyone is of a different race it still feels like a war between black and white."

Even though it's been almost 40 years since our first Black History Month in Canada, there is still prejudice and judgement in places like schools, where everyone is supposed to feel safe and welcome. Black History Month is a time to celebrate the history and cultural heritage of Black individuals and to acknowledge the many contributions and achievements they have made to society and communities not only in Canada, but all around the world.

Chinese Heritage

With a lengthy history of around 5000 years, China has a rich culture that integrates ancient traditions passed down from numerous generations, with more recent beliefs and customs from the last century.

Ancient Chinese culture, legends, and mythology have been incorporated into modern media and entertainment for decades. However, there has been a drastic increase in the popularity of historical C-dramas in recent years with the rise of new celebrities. As a result, many young generations rewatch old classics. Original soundtracks from these dramas often use melodious elements reflecting traditional vibes, such as Fangs of Fortune's "Heaven and Earth Are Unrivalled" by Yanan, further promoting ancient Chinese roots to younger generations.

Traditional Chinese opera is another critical element of Chinese heritage. With many people gradually losing interest, the government has attempted to encompass all forms of Chinese opera in the CMG New Year's Gala every year, with at least one large portion of the show involving opera performances. Every household across China watches this gala during Chinese New Year reunion meals. In this way, younger generations are more exposed to Chinese opera, cultivating hope for the future of this form of entertainment.

Every Chinese holiday has distinctive colours and practices, constructing an integral part of Chinese heritage. This year, January 29th marked the start of Chinese New Year, the most notable holiday in China. This time of the year emphasizes the importance of reunion and family in Chinese culture. On Chinese New Year's Eve, individuals from all over China share one common goal – returning home to their families to share a reunion meal, no matter how busy they are with work, life, or other responsibilities. Highway traffic is always an impressive sight during this time.

When it comes to Chinese New Year, numerous people think of red envelopes packed with money as they overlook the various traditions involved in the 15-day celebration, 16 including Chinese New Year's Eve. Dumplings, fish, and chicken are essentials on the New Year's Eve dinner table, though it often varies with each family's customs. Even the emptiest streets are occupied by people with wide smiles, lighting up firecrackers that will resonate through the streets all night long. Cleaning is done on this day or a few days before the new year to avoid sweeping away good luck and fortune. Nails are cut and thorough showers are taken since these are prohibited on the first day of the new year. Consequently, New Year's Eve is sometimes jokingly referred to as the national day of hair-washing.

On the first day of the New Year, wearing bright red, praying in a temple, and visiting other family relatives, especially seniors, are common traditions. The second day is for married daughters to return to their families, and most people choose to stay home on the third day because arguments are prevalent on this day. Worshipping the Kitchen God occurs on the fourth day when he descends into the human realm to protect families from household accidents. The next day, people worship the God of Wealth and clean the house. Many people discard old or dirty belongings and return to work on the sixth day, if not the day right after the new year. Soups, congee, noodles, and other foods are eaten on the seventh day for blessings.

Many people consider the eighth day the final day for Chinese New Year celebrations, though some regions continue performing ceremonies for the gods and goddesses until the tenth day. The eleventh day is tied to the second day, with the only difference being the daughter's parents inviting their son-in-law over. The next three days are mostly preparations for the Lantern Festival on the fifteenth day, where many people solve riddles to win decorated lanterns. In ancient times, unmarried women were not permitted to leave the house often, so many took advantage of the Lantern Festival to socialize and meet new people.

China is a diverse country with countless regions, nations, customs, and beliefs. Traditions can widely differ depending on the area, making Chinese heritage even more unique and worthy of passing down to future generations. February celebrates Chinese Heritage Month, an excellent chance for everyone to acknowledge and appreciate the true beauty of Chinese culture.


