Course Description This course focuses on the skills and knowledge parents, guardians, and caregivers need, with particular emphasis on maternal health, pregnancy, birth, and the early years of human development (birth to six years old). Through study and practical experience, students will learn how to meet the developmental needs of young children, communicate with them, and effectively guide their early behaviour. Students will develop their research skills through investigations related to caregiving and child rearing.

Achievement Level	Percentage Mark Range	Achievement Description
HL4/L4+ L4 LL4/L4-	95 – 100 87 – 94 80 – 86	Level 4 identifies achievement that surpasses the provincial standard. The student demonstrates the specified knowledge and skills with a high degree of effectiveness.
HL3/L3+ L3 LL3/L3-	77 – 79 73 – 76 70 – 72	Level 3 represents the provincial standard for achievement. The student demonstrates the specified knowledge and skills with considerable effectiveness. Parents of students achieving at level 3 can be confident that their children will be prepared for work in subsequent grades/courses
HL2/L2+ L2	67 – 69 63 – 66	Level 2 represents achievement that approaches the provincial standard. The student demonstrates the specified knowledge and skills with some

HL1/L1+	57 – 59	Level 1 represents achievement that falls much below the provincial standard. The student demonstrates the specified knowledge and skills with limited effectiveness. Students must work at significantly improving learning in specific areas, as necessary, if they are to be successful in the next grade/course
