Course Description				
This course explores the general theories, questions, assumptions, and issues that form the basis of study for anthropology,				

psychology, and sociology. Methods of research and approaches used by social scientists in examining topics of study will be examined and employed by students. Opportunities to explore theories from a variety of perspectives with a focus on classical and contemporary approaches used by social scientists in the three disciplines will be presented to the students. Students will be encouraged to apply these skills to a wide range of issues that impact society and to critically examine current thinking on these issues. They will also learn to develop and support a thesis, conduct research and analysis, and effectively communicate the results of their inquiries.
