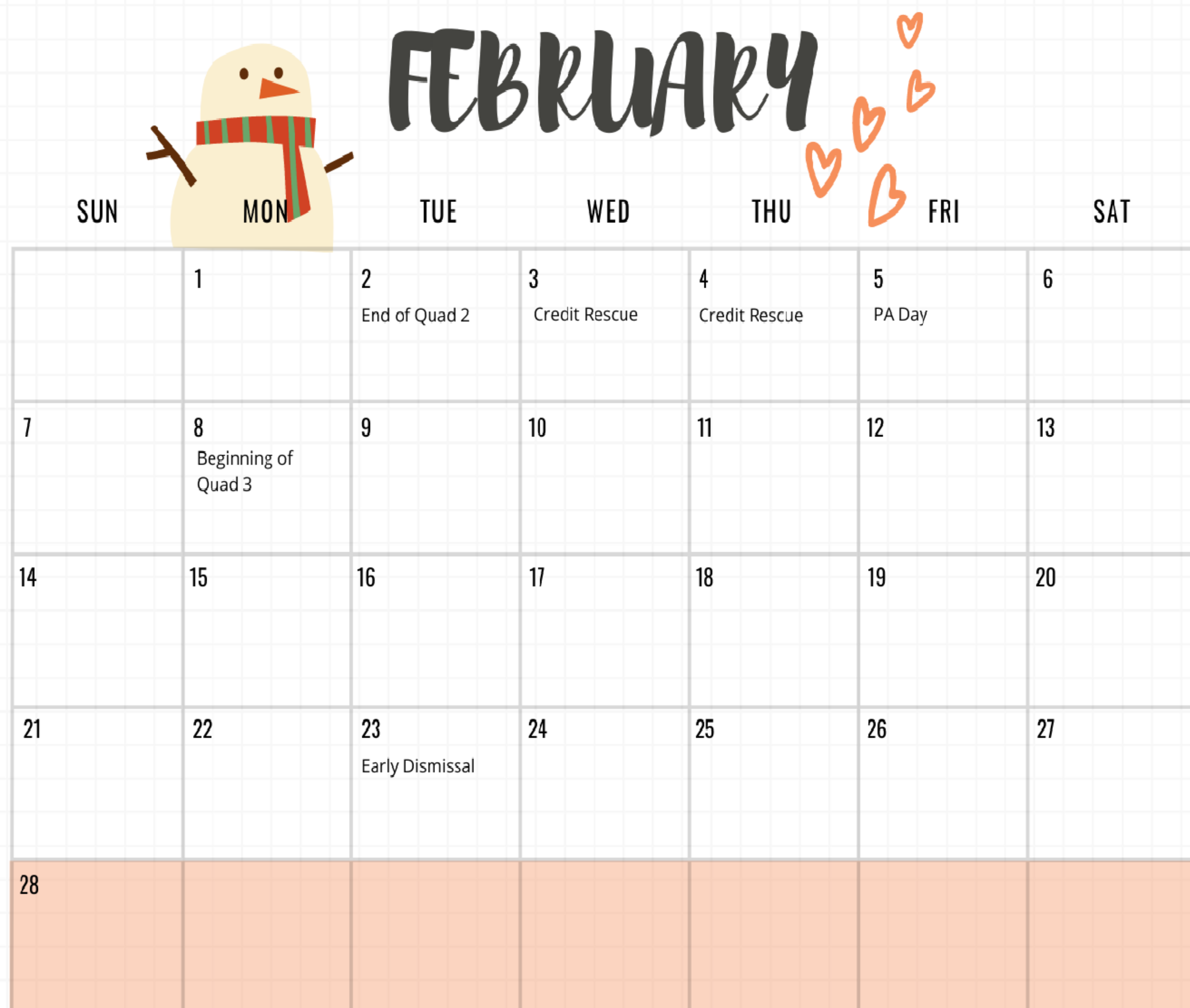

Two MAC Students ‘Hack the North’!

A month ago, an email from Hack the North entitled “Congratulations, you are in!” turned up in my inbox; that email marked the beginning of an unforgettable experience filled with learning, accomplishments, and of course, some sleep deprivation.

Hack the North is Canada’s largest hackathon, a programming and design-based competition where participants create, or “hack”, a project from scratch. Competitors have thirty-six hours to prototype, code, and pitch a project to judges. The event is typically hosted in-person at the University of Waterloo. This year, over 3000 high school and university students across the globe connected virtually on Discord for Hack the North 2021.

Before the official competition period, participants could form a team--up to a group of four-- through slide deck introductions. I had the opportunity to work with Catherine He, the president of MAC Computer Science club, and two university students with whom Catherine He and I connected over Discord.

Hack the North also hosted GearUp, a series of workshops prior to the hackathon. These workshops were designed to equip hackers with technical skills for the hackathon and soft skills for career success. I learned to rapidly prototype a user interface in a program called Figma in GearUp’s design series. As well, I gained valuable advice for curating resumes from RBC’s sponsored career talk.

The official hacking period began on the evening of January 15th. Our team quickly delegated roles, hopped in a Google Meets, and got down to programming. Catherine He and I focused on visual frontend development while our teammates focused on incorporating sponsored technology in the backend. While programming, we encountered numerous challenges that furthered our understanding of web development. At the end of two sleepless nights, we progressed from a blank index.html file to a multi-page website, and from an empty video camera to one that detected users’ expressions, movements and audio cues.

When reflecting back on the hackathon, Catherine He shared, “Hack the North was a very enriching experience! I learned a lot through the hands-on experience of working with my team to code a project in 36 hours.”

Applications for Hack the North are open each year between October to November. Whether you want to code an innovative project or network with like-minded individuals, Hack the North is a valuable opportunity that you will not want to miss.

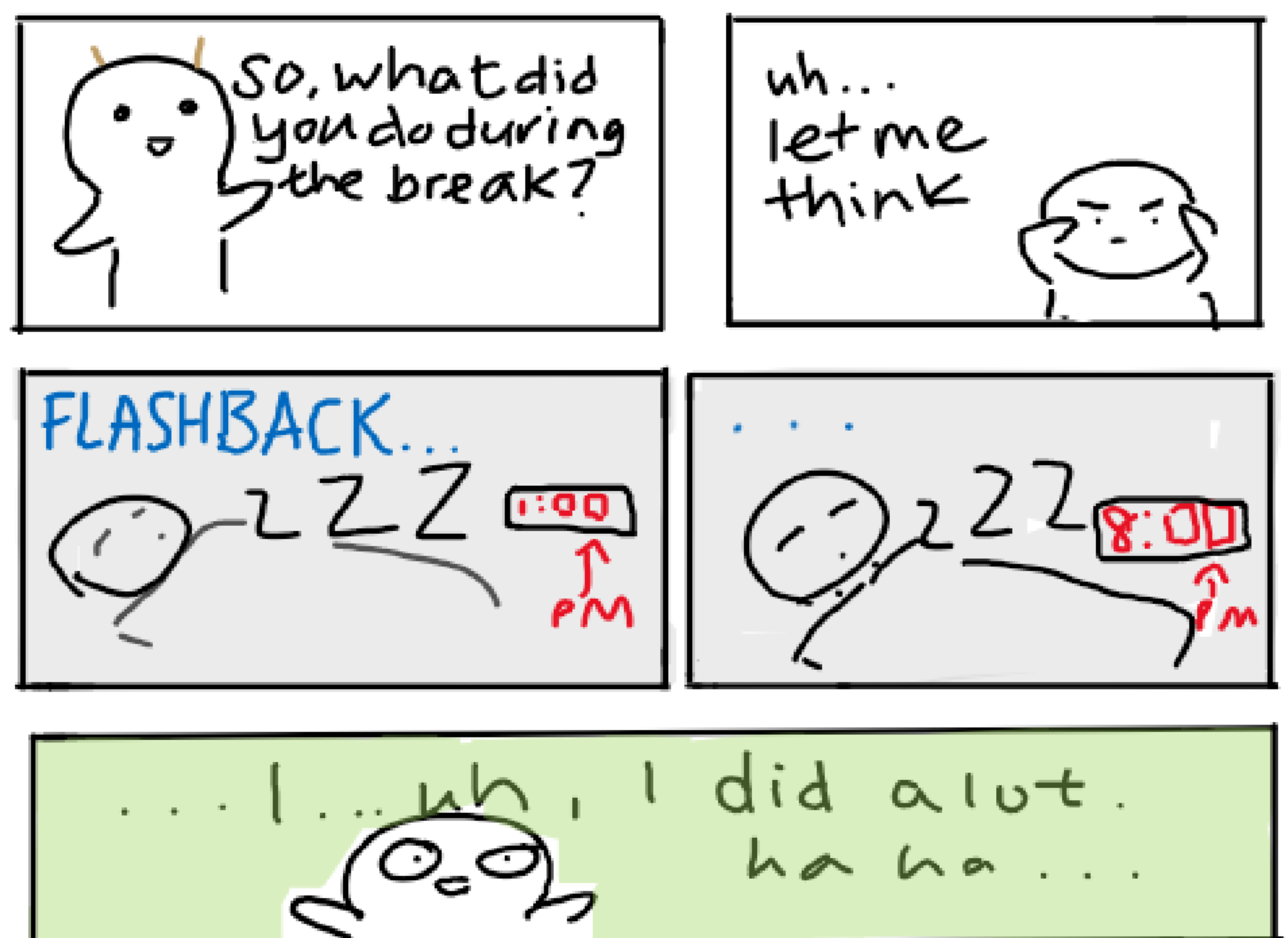

New Mac Club: MAC codeToday

In December 2020, Mac welcomed a new club called “MAC codeToday”. The founders and presidents, Saakshi Jaju and Mary Zhao, spent the summer of 2020 teaching coding and were eager to share their knowledge with our school! The name “codeToday” was inspired by camel case, a style of naming often used in coding languages. HTML basics will be taught for 10-12 weeks beginning the week of January 11th, 2021.

After contacting Mary Zhao, the Vice President of codeToday, I asked for their reasons for starting codeToday. She replied, “Coding and computer skills are important assets we believe everyone should have. However, for a lot of people, [learning to code] seems pretty daunting at first. Saakshi and I created this club so that more people become familiar with coding through learning with peers without feeling pressure or stress. We hope this will lead them to pursue coding in the future.”

Through hard work, the presidents and the executives of codeToday have been creating HTML teaching resources to be shared with their members. Anthony Truong, a Grade 9 student at Mac, spoke about his interest and experience as a codeToday member. He explained, “I enrolled in this club because I wanted to learn about programming, and fortunately enough this club delivered just that. The introduction into the club was great, plus the instructors are polite and are always there to assist you. My start was fantastic and my advice to anyone new to or curious about programming is that you should definitely give the MAC codeToday club a shot.”

The supervisor of codeToday, Mr. Fraser, also played an imperative role in starting the club, having provided input on the HTML content prepared by codeToday. I had the opportunity to ask him for his opinion on the club, to which he responded, “I think the club is a good idea. I really like the idea of making programming accessible to students who might otherwise never get into it. And, when I saw the students who would be running the club, I was confident that they would do a terrific job! I'm looking forward to seeing how students respond!”

With much hope and preparation, mentors and mentees expect that there will be plenty more to come in the approaching weeks in the new club, MAC codeToday.
