Cooperative Education

On February 16th, interested grade 10, 11 and 12 students attended a Cooperative Education Information Session. This session was used to inform students about Coop before it was chosen for course selection.

The Cooperative Education (Co-op) program provides Grade 11 and 12 students with the opportunity to earn High School credits through the completion of a work placement. Coop Programs are designed to meet students' individual career goals, strengths and interests so that students can gain relevant experience in the workplace.

Students that have chosen Coop on their course selection should fill out the Coop Application by March 28th. The Application can be found on the Guidance Google Classrooms. A paper copy is also available in the Guidance Office.

Programming to Support Students

As students move into four new courses they may be faced with new challenges. If your child/ward is in need of additional support, Macdonald has programming in place to support students.

After School Literacy and Numeracy Support

Support in **Literacy** is available with Ms. Jhutty every Thursday after school from 3:00 pm - 4:00 pm. The goal of this program is to work one on one with students to help with their literacy studies. Ms. Jhutty will support students by teaching foundational concepts and improving literacy skills. Students may be recommended by teachers to attend the program, but all grade 9 and 10 students are welcomed to attend to receive support.

Numeracy support is available with Ms. Eshaque and Ms. Amirthalingam every Wednesday from 3:00 pm-4:00pm. Through this program, students will be able to work one on one with math teachers to practice fundamental skills and concepts to support numeracy. Students may be encouraged by their teacher to attend, but all grade 9 and 10 students are welcome.

Mac PALS

Macdonald Peer Assisted Learning Support (Mac PALS) are a group of students that have been trained by Licenced to Learn to be a tutor. All our Mac PALS have undergone several training sessions and are now certified tutors. Our tutors have expertise in many different subject areas and are happy to support other students. If your child/ward would like extra support through peer tutoring, they can be connected to a senior student for support.
