Rm. 203 Letters To and From Authors

In October, the students in Room 203 began to plan letters to their favourite authors. Using a graphic organizer, they described what they liked about their authors' books, identified their favourite moments in one book, asked a few questions, and asked for advice about writing. Once their planners were finished, they wrote a draft, got some feedback from Mrs. Cullen about how to improve their letters, wrote another draft, and got more feedback! Finally, they typed and printed their final copies, and addressed their envelopes. We sent them off hopefully, to writers like J.K. Rowling, Lemony Snicket, Trenton Lee Stewart, and Kate DiCamillo, to name just a few. And . . . we've received responses! Four of our students have heard from their favourite authors! The first to answer was the writer of the "Harry Potter" series, J.K. Rowling One student received a picture postcard from Kate DiCamillo, who wrote "The Tale of Despereaux" and "The Miraculous Journey of Edward Tulane". Tony DiTerlizzi who wrote the Spiderwick series also wrote back! We are thrilled that these busy people have taken the time to get in touch with their young readers.

Dear Griffin.

Thank you so much for your lovely letter, I am happy to hear that you enjoyed *The Spiderwick Chronicles*. I certainly enjoyed spinning the *Spiderwick* tales with Holly Black.

To answer your question, the idea for *Spiderwick* started long ago; I created a field guide to fantastical creatures when I was twelve, called "Gondawanaland." I was introduced to goblins and fairies at a very young age through fairy tales read to me by my mom, like those of the Brothers Grimm and Andrew Lang. When I first started to think about making the field guide into a book, I was not satisfied with my technical ability, so I took a lot of life-drawing classes and frequented the Museum of Natural History where I copied many of the mounted animal specimens. It was here I began to think about goblins and fairies viewed through the eye of a naturalist as in *Arthur Spiderwick's Field Guide to the Fantastical World Around You.* I based Arthur Spiderwick's character on one of my favorite artists, Arthur Rackham.

As for coming up with story ideas - the truth is there are times when I get stumped too, where I do not feel inspired or very imaginative. Often, I return to the place that sparks my mind—the great outdoors. Being in nature both stimulates my brain and helps me process. From hikes in the woods to walks on the beach, the endless textures, patterns, and colors in our outdoor world is the most amazing, overwhelming inspiration one could hope for. I also find motivation from reading stories and copying art from masters. Whether I'm reading Beatrix Potter's Jeremy Fisher or rendering an alien from The Art of Star Wars there are many things in books that rouse my imagination. The most important advice I can give you is to never give up.



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
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mary ann shadd was the socont black women to earn a law degree. she started as school for kids of all races, she started a newspaper call the provincial freemen for African Americans.



<u>Dash and Dot Coding</u> Rm 202




