<u>Covid Update</u>

Thank you to the community for assisting us in keeping everyone safe and



well from <u>ensuring your child's Health Assessment</u> is signed, to wearing masks when on the property. Although we have had a couple of classes closed temporarily, as a result of parents and the school being proactive, the time in isolation was significantly reduced. If you know you are sick or might have been exposed to COVID-19 please remember to isolate and

follow the directions of Toronto Public Health (TPH). **You must keep your children home depending on exposure and pending the results of your test.** Please keep Knob Hill in the loop.

Toronto Public Health just announced today it has updated its COVID-19 student screening tool to prevent further opportunities for virus spread. The TDSB follows direction from Toronto Public Health and the <u>new screening tool</u> was effective starting **Monday**, **December 7**, **2020**. Please read the entire message from Toronto Public Health, below.

As part of this guidance, if a child has one or more new, or worsening COVID-19 symptoms, parents will now be required to:

- Keep their child home.
- Keep siblings and other children home, even if they do not have symptoms.
- Arrange for the child to get tested or contact their health care provider.
- Without testing, the child must stay home for 10 days.
- Monitor the family for symptoms. Adults must stay home if they have one or more symptoms.

Transitions to Grade 9

At first glance, it may seem that transitioning to Grade 9 takes only a few minutes. However, the TDSB has many choices for students to examine. This year, we will be working directly with the students as our guidance staff have been re-deployed to support virtual school. Teachers are using the My Blueprint forum to plan as well as engage in virtual meetings with various High Schools. Please discuss your child's secondary school information with them. The TDSB also has a great deal of information on its 'Beyond 8' website to help with understanding the system and the deadlines for applications. Grade 7 and 8 Vaccinations

All school immunization clinics are suspended for the 2020-2021 school year.

Students in Grades 7/8 can still receive their vaccinations at Toronto Public Health clinics later, by appointment only. The three vaccines available for free are:

- Meningococcal-quadrivalent
- Human papillomavirus (HPV)
- Hepatitis B

<u>Important Information for Families of Grade 3 Students (NEW Middle</u> <u>French Immersion Program – Grade 4 Entry)</u>

For families interested in the Toronto District School Board's system-wide NEW Middle French Immersion Program (begins in Grade 4), we offer an online process to apply. Attached to this email you will also find an important information package. Please note: This program will replace the Junior Extended French program as the Grade 4 entry program in TDSB.

To apply for the Middle French Immersion Program (Grade 4 entry) for September 2021, applications must be completed online between January 4 and January 29, 2021.

An offer of placement in the program (not a specific school) is guaranteed to all on-time applicants and will be made in the weeks following the close of the application window.

Please note: Families with an older sibling currently enrolled in a French program and who will be in attendance next year are still required to complete an online application for the new student. Please select the "sibling option" within the online application.

<u>Commemorations, Traditions and Celebrations</u>

<u>Kwanzaa</u>

Kwanzaa was created by Dr. Maulana Karenga in 1966 after the Watts riots in Los Angeles. He founded the US, a cultural organization, and started to research <u>African</u> "first fruit" (harvest) celebrations. From there, he combined aspects of several different harvest celebrations to form the basis of Kwanzaa.



The name Kwanzaa comes from the phrase "matunda ya kwanza" which means "first fruits" in Swahili. Each family celebrates Kwanzaa in its own way, but celebrations often include songs and dances, African drums, storytelling, poetry reading, and a large traditional meal. On each of the seven nights, families gather and a child lights one of the candles on the

Kinara, then one of the seven principles, values of African culture, is discussed. An African feast, called a Karamu, is held on December 31. Learn more about the principles of Kwanzaa <u>here</u>.

<u>Christmas</u>

One of the most widely known December holidays, Christmas traditions vary around the world. While Americans celebrate with Christmas trees, visits from Santa Claus, and dreams of snowy landscapes, Christmas falls during <u>Australia's</u> summer, where it is popular to go camping or to the beach over the holiday. Some Australians

decorate a "Christmas Bush," a native with small green leaves and flowers during the summer.

In <u>England</u>, Christmas traditions are the <u>United States</u>, but instead of cookies for Santa Claus, children and brandy for Father Christmas.

city Reykjavik turns into a winter wonderland with its Christmas market and for the children, there is not one but thirteen Santas, known as Yule Lads. <u>New Years Day</u>

Civilizations around the world have been celebrating the start of each new



year for at least four millennia. Today, most New Year's festivities begin on December 31 (New Year's Eve), the last day of the Gregorian calendar, and continue into the early hours of January 1 (New Year's Day). Common traditions include attending parties, eating special New Year's foods, making resolutions for the new year and watching fireworks displays.
