Making the Best of Winter Weather at our School

Principals are often asked how we decide whether it's too cold to allow our students out in the school yard for recess. Fresh air and exercise are important for children. It keeps them physically fit, and helps them stay alert all through the school day. Parents can help by making sure their children come to school prepared to spend time outdoors. Hats, mittens, boots, snow pants and a warm jacket are important to keep students comfortable during lunch and recess. But extreme cold can be dangerous, and parents want to know that their children will be safe. When the temperature is predicted to drop below -15C, the City of Toronto may declare a cold weather alert. Schools are very sensitive to the needs of our students and pay close attention to the weather, especially when the wind chill is below -20C. When the temperature and wind chill measure -28C or lower, students are kept indoors. Recesses and lunch hour may be shortened if the temperature and wind chill reading is between -28C and -20C. The icy conditions can also lead to some indoor recesses for student safety. Please be reminded that the hill on the south side of the school can become very icy and; therefore, dangerous for students. When this happens, we close the hill during the school day and advise that you do not take your children on it after school. Canadian winters can be wonderful when the weather is cold, school staff keep one eye on the thermometer and the other on the needs of our students - a perfect balance of fun and safety.

<u>Kindergarten Registration for September 2020</u>

February is the system-wide Kindergarten Registration month at the TDSB, and it's just around the corner. We look forward to welcoming you and your child at our school in September! To attend Junior Kindergarten in September, children must turn four by December 31, 2020 (born in 2016). To attend Senior Kindergarten in September, children must turn five by December 31 of 2020 (born in 2015),. You may choose to register in person at the school or begin this process online. Our school will be having Kindergarten Registration by appointment on: February 10,11,12,13 and 14. Please call Ms. Mistry in the office to set up your appointment. Registration packages will be available in the office for pick-up the week of January 27th. To register, please bring the following information about your child:

- 1. Proof of age (a birth certificate, Confirmation of Permanent Residence, Citizenship card, passport or permanent residence card)
- 2. Proof of address (three pieces of identification that show your address, such as your telephone bill, utility bill, bank statement, property tax bill, <u>rental or lease agreement (this must be one of your ID's)</u>
- 4. immunization (the card that shows a list of needles your child has received)
- 5. Health Card

Traffic Safety Tips: Help Make this a Safe Winter Season

As winter approaches, we know that severe weather will be part of our daily lives for the next several months. While traffic safety is an important matter all year long, this is a particularly good time to review what we can do to keep students safe.

The need to be aware and alert at all times, on any road, and even in the most routine circumstances is key to traffic safety. This applies to students and drivers alike. Road conditions can be challenging in the winter months. So to those of us who drive, please take extra care on the roads and in parking lots, especially in areas where children might be present.

School staff periodically review street and traffic safety with students. Parents can help reinforce these safety messages with children at home. Below are some tips that might be helpful to review.

- *Stop, look, and listen for traffic.
- * Only cross at corners and crosswalks.
- * Make eye contact with drivers.
- *Walk on the right side of the crosswalk.
- *Wear appropriate footwear to reduce the chances of slipping.
- * Never run into the street.
- *Obey crossing signals.
- * Cross only if clear.
- * Walk on sidewalks.
- * Where there are no sidewalks, walk as far away from traffic as possible, facing traffic.

The safety of our students is always a top priority. Let's work together to make the winter season safe so we can enjoy all it has to offer!
