It is extremely important that all children learn the value and importance of being punctual and attending classes regularly. As these are lifelong skills, we would ask that you assist and support us in reinforcing their importance with the students.

The teachers take attendance immediately following entry and the attendance is sent to the office. Whenever a child is marked absent, and the school is unaware of the reason, the office staff will attempt to contact a parent/guardian at home or at work to determine the child's whereabouts and ensure that no harm has come to him or her on the way to school.

If we are unable to contact a parent/guardian or the emergency contact provided on the student's emergency card, under the Board's Student Attendance and Safe Arrival Procedures, the principal may be required to contact the police or a Children's Aid Society (CAS) and initiate a search.

To avoid unnecessary and/or embarrassing situations, please assist us by informing the school office

whenever your child is absent. If the office is closed, a recorded message may be left on the school answering machine. In your message, please include your child's name, teacher, the date and the reason for the absence. **The school phone number for Safe Arrival is 416-395-2662**.

The safety of all of our students is of prime importance. Please ensure that all contact numbers for you and anyone else involved with the child are up to date. <u>Kindly ensure that you inform the school immediately if any of the contacts or phone numbers change.</u>

Finally, it is important that all students start the day on time. If your child is late, please have them report to the office. Office detentions will be issued to students who are habitually late. We appreciate your cooperation in this matter.

#### **Lockdown and Fire Drills**

At the beginning of each school year, our students and staff prepare for the year ahead by establishing the foundations for a successful year. One of the ways we know we can help students be successful is to create a safe environment in which to learn. Though no one ever wants to see an emergency happen at a school, it's important for school staff to be equipped to deal with those situations, should they occur.


The safety of students and staff is a top priority at our school and to that end, as with all emergency drills, it is essential that we are prepared and understand the importance of procedures that will help ensure the safety of everyone in our school.

The TDSB has taken steps to ensure your child's safety while in school. Each school has developed emergency preparedness plans that include steps staff will take in the event of an emergency, how staff will get students away from possible dangers, and how students' families will be contacted.

Two aspects of emergency preparedness are the lockdown and fire drill. All schools are required to conduct a minimum of two lockdown drills and six fire drills each school year. Lockdown drills, like fire drills, are an essential component to ensuring student and staff safety. It is important that all staff and students are prepared and know how to respond in cases of emergencies. The drills last approximately 5 minutes and ensure plans are effective and can also systematically identify any safety concerns.

Communication is also very important in any emergency situation. The emergency contact information kept on file is important in helping this happen. It lists the people who can pick up a student from the school. If you have not yet provided this information to the office or have updates to the information on file, please make sure our office staff have that information as soon as possible.





#### What Zone Are You In?

Once again this year our whole school is using the concept of the Zones of Regulation to teach our students to identify different feeling/emotions, to learn how to recognize different situations when those emotions arise and strategies to manage and regulate those emotions. Our intentions in implementing this program is to provide students with an opportunity to learn to problem solve and to create a common language when working though social and emotional conflicts. Each category of emotions is represented by different colours. Any zone is acceptable to be in at any point in time, however, optimal learning and relationships are developed when we are in the green zone. Over this school year, teachers and students will be exploring different strategies to use as we move through each zone.

# **Eco Update**

Lillian is proud to be an Eco School and we will be working toward this goal again this year. The staff and students cannot do it alone. We need your help! Your continued dedication to the environment is much appreciated and recognized. This year, we will continue to focus on becoming WASTE FREE by RE-USING as much as possible, by bringing RE-USEABLE containers only, not plastic water bottles or tetra packs. Students are already using our recycling and green bins in the lunchroom with the help from our amazing eco monitors.

Two years ago, Lillian received a water refill station located on the first floor by Room 103. Single use plastic water bottles are expensive, can deplete water sources in local communities, take a lot of energy to create and transport, and last in landfills for over four hundred years. Toronto tap water on the other hand is affordable, local, low waste and tasty! Let's do our part by using reusable water bottles.

Students and staff get to and from school every day by walking, cycling, mobility devices, and many other forms of human-powered transportation. Research shows that those who use active and sustainable modes of transportation experience benefits to mental and physical health and well-being, are better prepared to learn and work and are more connected to their communities. In the course of a single generation, there has been a significant decline in the percentage of students walking and cycling to school. This year let's see more bikes in our bike racks and more students walking to school.

# Pink Day @ Lillian!!!

Pink Day was started in Nova Scotia when 2 high school students saw a boy wearing a pink shirt being bullied. The 2 students intervened and decided to purchase pink shirts and got everyone to arrive at school wearing pink, stand up and speak out against bullying.
