The application to the Early French Immersion program will remain an online process managed by the Central French Department and applications must be completed online between **November 4 and November 29, 2024**. An offer of placement in the program (<u>not</u> a specific school) is guaranteed to all on-time applicants. Families with an older sibling currently in an Early French Immersion program at the same school are still required to complete an online application for the new student. TDSB and Cellphones

To help reduce distractions in our schools, starting this September, we are denying cell phone usage during instructional time so that students can focus on getting back to basics and learning foundational skills like reading, writing and math.

Our youngest learners in kindergarten to Grade 6, who may have phones, will now be required to keep phones on silent and out of sight for the duration of the day.

For students in Grades 7 to 12, phones can be with the student. However, they will only be permitted during instructional time if explicitly allowed by the educator.

TDSB will also commit to having report cards include comments on students' distraction levels in class. We recognize that some parents want to communicate with their children during school, and the policies listed above will still permit that during non-instructional time or when an educator gives permission.



November 11 - Remembrance Day

Every year on Remembrance Day, we pause in a silent moment of remembrance for those who have served to assure peace and respect for human rights in the world. 1 2 Students and staff across the **Toronto District School Board** (TDSB) mark Remembrance Day, and we pause to honour the generations of Canadians who served our country at home and abroad. We also acknowledge that these brave individuals, including many former TDSB students, played an integral role in securing the rights and freedoms we enjoy today. It is vital that we continue to share these stories of courage and selflessness and pay tribute to veterans who are often not remembered or relegated to the side.

The role of women, Indigenous, Black, Jewish, Muslim, South Asian, East Asian, racialized and 2SLBGTQIA+ soldiers, and all those who hold diverse and intersecting identities need to be remembered too, so that their contributions are not forgotten. First Nations, Inuit and Métis people of Canada served in every war. Yet, it was only in 1995 that Indigenous soldiers were officially recognized for their service. By remembering the efforts of all the diverse Canadians who have served our country, we recognize what these courageous people worked to preserve. We also take this time to recognize all the people, children and families who were and are victims of war. The many impacts of war are often overlooked and must not be forgotten along with the distinguished service of Canadian soldiers. Lest we forget.

WALK FOR WENJACK

Everybody has their own reason to Walk for Wenjack. For some, it may be a moment to bonour Charnie. For others, it may be an opportunity to raise awareness of the true history of residential schools. Each Walk for Wenjack is unique.

Originally organized by a dedicated team of volunteers, Walk for Wenjack is a grassroots event that started in 2016. The first walk retraced the steps of Chanie Wenjack, starting at the Cecilia Jeffrey Indian Residential School in Kenora, ON, and continued to Redditt, ON with a ceremony representing Chanie's final resting place near Farlane, ON. Since then, thousands of Indigenous and non-Indigenous people have joined this movement.
