Elementary Special Education Summer School 2023

The Toronto District School Board (TDSB) will be offering a summer program for students who receive support from the Developmental Disability Special Education Program, Physical Disability Program, and Deaf and Hard of Hearing Program, and who have an Individual Education Plan (IEP). These half-day programs will be held at various locations throughout the TDSB. They will support students to develop their independence through programming in the areas of functional literacy and numeracy skills, activities of daily living, and communication and social skills through a creative curriculum that can include technology, physical fitness, art, music and drama. The information below provides a brief outline of the programs.

HOURS: 9:00 a.m. to 12:00 p.m.

Make a scrapbook and let them fill it with drawings, words, and even small objects you collect on your walks, so they have a record of their experiences during this unique time. Take a look through some story starters, and let them choose one that they find exciting, interesting, or fun.

Challenge them to write a persuasive essay, using prompts, like "Which would you rather battle: 1 horse-sized duck, or 100 duck-sized horses?" Or "You can choose one superhero power to help others: fly or stop time. Which one do you choose and why?"

Here are some ideas for writing projects your kids can do at home: It is possible for children to have FUN writing when they have the means to let their creative imaginations run wild. Parents can help by providing support and direction: showing them how to write, using models and examples of completed works; then adding a

touch of art by giving them colourful, appealing materials to work with; and, motivating them by introducing interesting and weird themes that will "tickle" them. By making the purpose for writing clear, allowing creative means and engaging their natural curiosity, they might just end up having some fun!

Themes such as love, friendship, family, or courage can be developed using a collage. Images can be drawn or cut from old books, magazines and catalogues. Story narratives can be created in comic strip format, using drawings along with words. Whether it's a drawing, a card, or a story, children can enjoy original and imaginative ways to convey their thoughts and ideas. So, grab some pens and markers, stickers, pictures, and coloured paper and find something they enjoy talking about. Then sit down together for some fun times!

International Day of Pink is an internationally recognized day of anti-bullying and celebrating and uplifting the voices of 2SLGBTQIA+ students. This year, International Day of Pink is commemorating the Stonewall Riots and birth of World Pride.

April 17th **Yom HaShoah** is a day to remember the six million Jewish people who died in the Holocaust¹. It is also known as Holocaust Remembrance Day in English¹. It is observed on the 27th day of Nisan in the Hebrew calendar, which corresponds to April or May in the Gregorian calendar²³. In 2023, it will begin in the evening of Monday, **April 17th** and end in the nightfall of Tuesday, April 18th

Applications for the new Canada Dental Benefit:

The federal government has created the <u>Canada Dental Benefit</u>, which provides eligible parents or guardians with a direct tax-free payment of up to \$650 per year for two years to help cover dental expenses for children under 12. This is a temporary benefit, which will support an estimated 500,000 children, and is available to families without private dental insurance and with an adjusted family net income under \$90,000. The permanent program is being developed and is due in 2024. The first benefit period is for children under 12 years old as of December 1, 2022, who receive oral health care between October 1, 2022, and June 30, 2023.

The Canada Revenue Agency <u>began receiving applications</u> and processing payments for the benefit on December 1, 2022.

Children under 12 who are covered by provincial, territorial or federal (e.g. Non-Insured Health Benefits, Healthy Smiles Ontario) programs are eligible for the Canada Dental Benefit if they and their family meet all of the criteria to qualify for the benefit and as long as they have out-of-pocket expenses that have not been covered by their provincial, territorial or federal program. 




Sikh Heritage Month

Sikh Heritage Month is proudly recognized at the Toronto District School Board during the month of April since 2016 as the Board of Trustees voted to designate April of each year Sikh Heritage Month making the TDSB the first school board in Canada to do so. This designation matches the recognition by the Province of Ontario that proclaimed Sikh Heritage Month Act in December 2013, and the recognition proclaimed by the Government of Canada on April 30, 2019. Sikh Heritage Month is recognized nationally across Canada.


The Art Of Printmaking

Steps we followed:


- 1. Drew our instrument on paper.



I learned that police in California are more than twice as likely to use force against Black people than white people.


What did I learn about me, others, the world?
