MIDDLE FRENCH IMMERSION application deadline

The Toronto District School Board (TDSB) would like to share some information with you and your families about Middle French Immersion. The entry point to Middle French Immersion for September 2024/25 school year is <u>Grade 4</u>.

The application to the Middle French Immersion program will remain an online process and applications must be completed online between January 8 and February 2, 2024. An offer of placement in the program (not a specific school) is guaranteed to all eligible on-time applicants. Families with an older sibling currently in a Middle French Immersion program are still required to complete an online application for the new student. Interested families can apply via the <u>Application Link</u>.

2023 – 2024

The TDSB will continue to offer students in Junior Kindergarten to Grade 12 the option for virtual learning in the 2024 - 2025 school year. Elementary Virtual Learning classes will continue to be hosted at local schools. Secondary students will attend Virtual Secondary School.

Regular programs and Intensive Support Programs (ISPs) depending on viable programming and where there is available space, will be offered in elementary Virtual Learning.

French Immersion, Extended French, LEAP, Alternative Schools, and Student Interest Programs continue to be available in-person only.

The TDSB recognizes that students who have chosen to learn virtually may wish to continue in this method of instruction.

Students currently in Junior Kindergarten to Grade 12 who are attending school virtually will automatically be enrolled in virtual for the 2024-2025 school year. There is no action required for students who are currently learning virtually and wish to continue in a virtual setting.

Elementary and Secondary students who are attending school In-Person will be able to request Virtual Learning for the 2024 - 2025 school year through the Out-of-Area Attendance process. While it is our goal to accommodate as many requests for virtual in the 2024 - 2025 school year, we cannot guarantee that all requests will be met.

Information will be shared at a later time regarding students who register with TDSB after January 26 for this school year or in advance for the 2024-2025 school year (e.g., students entering Kindergarten in September 2024).





ELEMENTARY ALTERNATIVE SCHOOLS online application process

The TDSB offers a wide range of <u>elementary alternative schools</u> available to students. The application process is managed centrally and includes an online application form. Information about the online application process will be available on the <u>Alternative Schools website</u> on December 11, 2023.

The online application for admission for September 2024 will be open from Monday, January 8, 2024 at 9:00 a.m. to Wednesday, January 31, 2024 at 4:00 p.m.

The TDSB has partnered with SmartSAVER on a board-wide campaign to help families access free money for their children's future education.

What FREE money? It's the Canada Learning Bond, available now through <u>www.tdsb.on.ca/SmartSAVER</u>. This is a Government of Canada contribution to a child's Registered Education Savings Plan. It provides up to \$2,000 in savings for the post-secondary education of eligible children.

Who can get it? You are eligible if your child was born in 2004 or later and you have ever been eligible for the National Child Benefit Supplement as part of the Canada Child Tax Benefit. All eligible children receive at least \$500 and will receive \$100 more for each year they're eligible up to age 15 or a maximum of \$2,000.

How do I get the Canada Learning Bond?

WINTER WEATHER STUDENT TRANSPORTATION

From time to time, it may be necessary to cancel student transportation, classes and/or programs because of severe weather. On rare occasions, severe weather makes it necessary to close schools, administrative offices or sites.

With approximately 235,000 students in 583 schools, any decision to cancel buses, classes and/or programs or to close sites can have a significant impact on thousands of families across Toronto. This decision is not taken lightly. When schools remain open on days with inclement weather, parents/guardians make the final decision on whether to send their children to school and they can keep children home from school if they so choose.

traffic safety

how to make this a safe winter season



As winter approaches, we know that severe weather will be part of our daily lives for the next several months. While traffic safety is an important matter all year long, this is a particularly good time to review what we can do to keep students safe.

The need to be aware and alert at all times, on any road, and even in the most routine circumstances is key to traffic safety. This applies to students and drivers alike. Road conditions can be challenging in the winter months. So to those of us who drive, please take extra care on the roads and in parking lots, especially in areas where children might be present.

School staff periodically review street and traffic safety with students. Parents can help reinforce these safety messages with children at home. Below are some tips that might be helpful to review.

- \star Stop, look, and listen for traffic.
- \star Only cross at corners and crosswalks.
- \star Make eye contact with drivers.
- \star Walk on the right side of the crosswalk.
- ★ Wear appropriate footwear to reduce the chances of slipping. -Never run into the street.
- \star Obey crossing signals.
- \star Cross only if clear.
- \star Walk on sidewalks.
- ★ Where there are no sidewalks, walk as far away from traffic as possible, facing traffic.

The safety of our students is always a top priority. Let's work together to make the winter season safe so we can enjoy all it has to offer.

Parents are reminded to observe the speed limit and all posted traffic signs e.g., Bus Loading Zone, No U Turning, No Parking, etc. along Southlawn and surrounding streets. Remember to please slow down in school zones!

We have a Student Drop-off Zone by the west gate by the kindergarten play area. The parking lot is for staff use only. *For safety,* students are *not allowed* to enter the parking lot, nor are parents allowed to drop off their child(ren) in the parking lot.









Festivals of Light



DIWALI

Diwali is the Hindu festival of lights, with variations celebrated in other Indian religions. It symbolises the spiritual "victory of light over darkness, good over evil, and knowledge over ignorance". Diwali is celebrated during the Hindu lunisolar months of Ashvin (according to the amanta tradition) and Kartika—between around mid-September and mid-November. The celebrations generally last five or six days.



During the festival, the celebrants illuminate their homes, temples and workspaces with *diyas* (oil lamps), candles and lanterns. Hindus, in particular, have a ritual oil bath at dawn on each day of the festival. Diwali is also marked with fireworks and the decoration of floors with *rangoli* designs, and other parts of the house with *jhalars*. Food is a major focus with families partaking in feasts and sharing *mithai*.

The festival is an annual homecoming and bonding period not only for families, but also for communities and associations, particularly those in urban areas, which will organise activities, events and gatherings. Many towns organise community parades and fairs with parades or music and dance performances in parks.

CHANUKAH

The eight-day Jewish celebration known as Hanukkah or Chanukah commemorates the rededication during the second century B.C. of the Second Temple in Jerusalem, where according to legend risen against Jews had up their Greek-Syrian oppressors in the Maccabean Hanukkah. Revolt. which means "dedication" in Hebrew, begins on the 25th of Kisley on the Hebrew calendar and usually falls in November or December.



Hanukkah 2023 begins on the evening of Thursday, December 7 and ends on the evening of Friday, December 15. Often called the Festival of Lights, the holiday is celebrated with the <u>lighting of the menorah</u>, traditional foods, games and gifts.

The Hanukkah celebration revolves around the kindling of a nine-branched menorah, known in Hebrew as the hanukiah. On each of the holiday's eight nights, another candle is added to the menorah after sundown; the ninth candle, called the shamash ("helper"), is used to light the others. Jews typically recite blessings during this ritual and display the menorah prominently in a window as a reminder to others of the miracle that inspired the holiday.

CHRISTMAS

Many Christians celebrate the birth of Jesus of Nazareth in Bethlehem on December 25, although the true date and year of his birth is unclear. The tradition of celebrating his birth at the end of December may come from the widespread European tradition of celebrations around the winter solstice. Christians who follow the Eastern Orthodox tradition celebrate the birth of Jesus on January 7, while it is marked on January 6 by the Armenian Apostolic Church.



The traditions centered on Christmas gifts in Canada vary a lot between families. In some families, a mythical figure called Santa Claus brings gifts. He travels on a sleigh pulled by reindeer, enters homes via the chimney and leaves presents and candy in Christmas stockings or in a pile under the Christmas tree. In other families, individual members exchange carefully selected gifts. Popular gifts are toys, games and candy for children and clothes, music, alcohol and practical or luxury items for adults. Canadians may open their presents on Christmas Eve after a special church service or during the morning or after lunch on Christmas Day.

KWANZAA

The name Kwanzaa is derived from the phrase "matunda ya kwanza" which means "first fruits" in Swahili. Each family celebrates Kwanzaa in its own way, but celebrations often include songs and dances, African drums, storytelling, poetry reading, and a large traditional meal. On each of the seven nights, the family gathers and a child lights one of the candles on the Kinara (candleholder), then one of the seven principles is discussed.



The principles, called the Nguzo Saba (seven principles in Swahili) are values of African culture which contribute to building and reinforcing community among African-Americans. Kwanzaa also has seven basic symbols which represent values and concepts reflective of African culture. An African feast, called a Karamu, is held on December 31.

Mazao, the crops (fruits, nuts, and vegetables) symbolizes work and the basis of the holiday. It represents the historical foundation for Kwanzaa, the gathering of the people that is patterned after African harvest festivals in which joy, sharing, unity, and thanksgiving are the fruits of collective planning and work. Since the family is the basic social and economic center of every civilization, the celebration bonded family members, reaffirming their commitment and responsibility to each other. In Africa, the family may have included several generations of two or more nuclear families, as well as distant relatives.

- Christmas Markets: In many European countries, Christmas markets feature a wide variety of festive cookies - these markets are a popular tradition!






Hanukkah Cookies



We even got to watch a video on Winter Solstice in the Cree Tradition.


