



Special Education and Inclusion

Special Education and Inclusion is offering dedicated engagement sessions to parents/guardians/caregivers of TDSB students to learn about Special Education and Inclusion processes through an equity lens.

For Session #1, the Special Education and Inclusion team will be discussing Individual Learning Plan (ILP), In-School Support Team (IST), School Support Team (SST), Individual Education Plan (IEP), and Identification, Placement and Review Committee (IPRC) processes. Session #1 will be held over two dates, and is being offered to parents/guardians/caregivers as outlined in the flyers to be distributed by schools based on their Learning Centre: For schools in LC2/LC3 - Flyer



With renewed enthusiasm, TDSB's occupational therapists and physiotherapists are excited to relaunch our professional development and virtual office hours for both educators as well as parents/caregivers of students with special education and inclusion needs for the 2022/2023 school year. Our first session will occur on November 23rd, 2022 with a lunch session for parents/guardians/caregivers (12:30-1:30pm) and an after school session for educators (3:30-4:30pm). The format of these sessions include the provision of a brief education session from our TDSB OT/PTs followed by an open forum where attendees may ask questions, receive generalized strategies to support their student(s)/child(ren), and connect with one another. This month's discussion will focus on Healthy Sleep and Rest for Your Student/Family.

An offer of placement in the program (not a specific school) is guaranteed to all on-time applicants. Families with an older sibling currently in an Early French Immersion program are still required to complete an online application for the new student.

Early French Immersion: Applications must be completed online before the **deadline of November 25, 2022**. The deadline for the Early French Immersion program is quickly approaching. The program begins in Junior Kindergarten. Entrance is guaranteed to all eligible on-time applicants, however, admission to a specific school is NOT guaranteed.

Severe Weather

Occasionally, severe weather conditions may require the Toronto District School Board to cancel transportation and close schools. This may occur before the beginning of the school day or, if conditions become severe, during the school day. To ensure the safety and welfare of students and staff during school hours, the Board's Severe Weather operational procedures will guide decisions and operations.

The safety and welfare of students is a shared responsibility with parents and guardians. The decision to close schools is made by the Director of Education.

Closure of schools or cancellation of transportation services will be announced from 6:30 a.m. onward. Information on closure of schools and cancellation of transportation services will be posted on the TDSB website at www.tdsb.on.ca and on the TDSB social media channels Twitter and Facebook.

Recess During Cold Weather

Elementary school students are kept indoors for recess and lunch times for a number of weather conditions such as rain, thunderstorms, lightning, hail, extreme winds and extreme cold.

When temperature and/or wind chill measure -28C or lower, children will remain indoors due to risk of frostnip and frostbite.

When temperature and/or wind chill factor indicates -20 to -28C, recesses may be shortened to

10 minutes and lunch recess be 20 minutes depending on local conditions. Children should be monitored closely for signs of frostnip, frostbite or difficulty breathing. If a student's medical condition requires further consideration due to weather conditions, or if parents have other questions or concerns about how and when weather conditions affect your child's school day, please contact the school office.


Winter Weather Reminders

PLEASE WEAR...

- Multiple layers, with the outer wear being waterproof
- Cold weather clothing that is appropriate for specific activities
- Mittens or gloves that are waterproof
- Warm hat with ear protection since most of our body heat escapes from the head Warm socks to protect your ankles and feet
- Slip resistant, insulated boots
- Scarf and hat
- Snow pants
- Indoor shoes to change into from recess
- EXTRA pair of socks in case of need




