STUDENT SUPPORT & SPECIAL EDUCATION

Student Success Team

The Student Success Team at Malvern works closely with the Special Education Department, Guidance and the Administration.

Students sometimes need a little support in getting organized, prioritizing their work, getting caught up, or recovering a credit after the course has finished.

The Student Success Team is available to assist and get students back on track!

The Student Success team works with students who are not receiving support through the Special Education Department.

The Student Success Department also runs a very successful **Peer-Tutoring program**.

The Special Education Department

- Students who have an IEP receive support through the Special Education Department.
- Students can take up to 4 Learning Strategies courses—GLE. (1 per year).
- Successful completion of the GLE course counts for 1 credit each.
- The course focuses on key learning strategies, organization, study skills, self-advocacy.

Teachers in the Special Education department also monitor student progress, update IEP's, apply for SEA Claims, and collaborate with school staff to ensure that students receive the learning supports they are entitled to.

I think my child needs an IEP for High School. What do I do?

Many parents believe that their child needs an IEP in order to have learning supports in place. For example, students who have anxiety or ADHD may need a quiet place to write a test, or may need a bit more time to complete the test, or some flexibility with deadlines.

At Malvern, all students may access additional support for their learning—**with or without an IEP**. We are trying to dispel the myth (and past practice) of insisting on an IEP or medical documentation in order for students to be given some flexibility or additional time.

If your child has particular needs, please encourage them to advocate for themselves and communicate their needs to their teachers. It's our job to listen to them and support them as best we can!

SPECIALIST HIGH SKILLS MAJOR (SHSM)

What is a SHSM?

A Specialist High Skills Major is a ministry-approved program that allows students to focus their learning in a particular field or sector. In grade 11 and 12, students enrolled in a SHSM program experience a variety of enhanced learning opportunities.

Schools across Ontario offer all types of SHSM programs. These programs are not considered "specialized" programs in the TDSB (i.e. students do apply to these programs). Any student who is enrolled in a school can choose to enrol in that school's SHSM program (starting in grade 11).

Students who fulfill the requirements graduate with an **industry recognized Red Seal diploma**, a SHSM record documenting their achievement, and a formal recognition on their Ontario Student Records.

Malvern's Health & Wellness SHSM:

The Health and Wellness SHSM program at Malvern allows student to customize their learning with courses that suit their interests in the fields of Health & Wellness.

Malvern's SHSM Includes:

FRENCH IMMERSION

FRENCH IMMERSION PROGRAM

Requirements:

Students in the French Immersion program are required to complete **10 courses** in French before graduation in order to receive their Bilingual Certificate.

Students who complete **11 courses** in French will receive an Honours Certificate.

These 10 or 11 courses include the 4 French language courses (course codes beginning with "FIF") offered each year.

The remaining 6 or 7 courses are subject courses taught in French, such as geography, history, math, or social sciences.

French Immersion course codes always end with "5".

In addition to the 4 mandatory French courses, French Immersion students are expected to take other mandatory courses (grade 9 geography, grade 10 history, etc.) and electives in French in order to satisfy the program requirement and to increase exposure to the language. Students are evaluated based on their performance across the four main language skills: Reading, Writing, Listening, and Speaking.

Evaluations throughout the course are balanced to give students the opportunity to excel in all of these areas.

In Grades 9 and 10, there is no final exam in the FIF course; a culminating task will give students the chance to demonstrate skills they've developed throughout the course.

In Grades 11 and 12, there is both a final exam and a culminating task.

It is expected that students and teachers communicate exclusively in French in the Immersion program.

While the use of language learning technology (online dictionaries, verb conjugation references, etc.) is encouraged, students are expected to write original ideas in French without the use of translation software.

Students who are coming to Malvern through the TDSB's designated pathway may register in the French Immersion Program at Malvern. Registration of other students (who reside in the catchment area) is subject to space in the program. Student are not permitted to switch from French Immersion to Extended French.

EXTENDED FRENCH

EXTENDED FRENCH PROGRAM

Requirements:

Students in the Extended French program are required to complete 7 courses in French in order to receive their Bilingual Certificate.

Students may complete 8 courses in French to receive an Honours Certificate.

These 7 or 8 courses include the 4 French language courses (course codes beginning with "FEF") offered each year.

The remaining 3 or 4 courses are subject courses taught in French, such as geography, history, or social sciences.

Extended French course codes always end with "4"

In addition to the 4 mandatory French courses, Extended French students are expected to take other mandatory courses (grade 9 geography, grade 10 history, Civics/ Careers) and electives in French in order to satisfy the program requirement and to increase exposure to the language. Students are evaluated based on their performance across the four main language skills: Reading, Writing, Listening, and Speaking.

Evaluations throughout the course are balanced to give students the opportunity to excel in all of these areas.

In Grades 9 and 10, there is no final exam in the FEF course; a culminating task gives students the chance to demonstrate skills they've developed throughout the course.

In Grades 11 and 12, there is both a final exam and a culminating task.

It is expected that students and teachers communicate exclusively in French in the Extended program.

A short adjustment period is normal in Grade 9, but in following years, communication should be entirely in French.

While the use of language learning technology (online dictionaries, verb conjugation references, etc.) is encouraged, students are expected to write original ideas in French without the use of translation software.

Students who are coming to Malvern through the TDSB's designated pathway may register in the Extended French Program at Malvern. Registration of other students (who reside in the catchment area) is subject to space in the program. Please refer to the final page of Frequently Asked Questions.

OUR PRIORITIES

To ensure learning is differentiated, students feel valued, included, and leave with both the tools and a desire to enjoy a lifelong love of literacy, program planning will include the following:

- learning conditions that foster student voice and choice and center the beauty, joy, and resiliency of diverse voices;
- opportunities for students to talk to the teacher (one to one), to one another, to bigger audiences, and to practice listening skills;
- provide access to a wide variety of culturally relevant and responsive texts and text forms;
- intentionally select texts with content that engage students' in learning to deepen critical literacy, understand systemic oppression, challenge power and privilege through advocacy or actions for change;
- model critical literacy, reading, writing, and communication strategies;

- create regular opportunities for students to live as writers with narrative and generative writing opportunities;
- provide opportunities for teacher and student descriptive feedback, co-creation of success criteria and examination of exemplars;
- ensure accommodations to meet the needs of students as set out in their ILP and/or IEP are implemented within the classroom program;
- honour languages and cultures in the classroom and invite parents/caregivers, community artists and leaders to partner in the teaching and learning experiences of students;
- ensure students use digital tools to foster deep learning that incorporates creativity, inquiry, entrepreneurship, collaboration, leadership, communication, global citizenship, character, critical thinking and problem solving.

CORE FRENCH & SPANISH

CORE FRENCH PROGRAM

- All students not enrolled in either the Extended or Immersion French program are required to complete the Grade 9 French course (FSF1D1) in order to graduate.
- Students who complete the French ("FSF") course each year of high school will graduate with a Certificate of Achievement in French Studies. Completing an "FSF" course beyond Grade 9 also satisfies the graduation requirement of completing an additional language, social science, art, co-op, or tech course.
- Core French classes are extremely practical and offer useful conversation and writing skills applicable to almost every professional context in Canada.
- Most students who study French all the way through high school leave with a working proficiency in the language and may confidently seek out post-secondary opportunities which call for a practical knowledge of the French language.

Spanish Program

- Malvern also has a vibrant Spanish language program headed by our resident Hispanophone: Señora Smolkin!
- Students need not have any background in Spanish to enter the program; it is expected that students have little or no experience in Spanish before starting.

- Unlike the French programs, there are only 3 levels of Spanish, meaning that students may pick it up in Grade 9 or 10 without worry of being behind.
- 1st year Spanish (LWSBD1)
- Fundamentals such as numbers, days of the week, and the basics of conversation.
- Important Latin American cultural celebrations and practices, such as dance and cuisine.
- 2nd year Spanish (LWSCU1)
- Conversational Spanish for travelling; navigating restaurants, stores, airports, etc.
- Deeper exploration of Latin American cultural practices and traditions.
- 3rd year Spanish (LWSDU1)
- Conversational Spanish for more nuanced expression of opinions and points of view.
- Deep exploration of current Latin American issues related to culture and immigration.
- As with French, a Spanish education comes with the benefits of giving students an advantage in the North American job market, stimulating parts of their brain not used in other subjects, expanding their cultural awareness, and satisfying the graduation requirement of completing an additional language, social science, art, co-op, or tech course.



What's the difference between AVI10 (Grade 9 Art) and NAC10 (Expressions in First Nations, Metis and Inuit Cultures?

In both courses you will learn many fundamentals of Visual Arts including drawing technique, printmaking and painting with acrylics and watercolours as well as terminology and the Elements and Principles of Design. But in NAC1O you will also learn about the art and cultures of Indigenous peoples across Canada. Plus special funding for this course means an enhanced set of art supplies and fully funded field trips and/or experiences with Artists in the School

Do I have to be an artist to take Art?

Our program is for students from a variety of skill levels, including the total beginner.

What sort of stuff do you do in Art History?

There is little in the way of formal Art History. In AVI1O we look at the major periods of Art in Egypt, Greece and Rome. In NAC1O we look at art works by Indigenous artists, some of which may be considered historical, but this is more likely done to better understand the culture at the time or to gain some idea of styles over time and across Canada.

Is there an exam in Art?

Is NAC1O about making Indigenous art?

This course is not about making Indigenous art. Indigenous art will serve as a lens through which we will gain a better understanding of Indigenous culture. Students have the freedom to express themselves in ways that they feel most comfortable. The course looks at how style is connected to meaning so that we can apply our own style to our own meaning in our art.

If it is not about making Indigenous Art, what kind of art will I make?

You will do colour pencil drawing including a variety of illustrative techniques, vinyl printmaking, acrylic painting, and a major unit in fundamentals of watercolour painting.

If I take NAC1O, do I still qualify to take grade 10 or 11 Visual Art?

YES! NAC1O is a grade 9 Visual Arts equivalent credit and qualifies as a prerequisite for any course that requires a gr. 9 Visual Arts course, which at Malvern would include: Grade 11 Visual Art (AVI3M) and Grade 11 Media Arts (ASM3M)

I'm serious about doing Art after High School. Will Malvern get me there?

Stick with our program and you are very much capable of getting into a post secondary program in Art. Malvern grads have, in the past few years, for example, won top prize, 4th year graduates, sculpture and installation art at OCAD, as well as honourable mention for Art Criticism and Curatorial Studies.

Students' artwork is celebrated throughout the school. Classroom doors, hallways, and even ceiling tiles, have been transformed into works of art that reflect our students and our school's values. We also host yearly Art Shows!

DRAMATIC ARTS

THE STUDY OF DRAMA

By communicating in both their real and imagined worlds, students acquire proficiency in listening, speaking, questioning, and problem solving.

FREQUENTLY ASKED QUESTIONS

What is Malvern's Optional Attendance Status for the 2023/24 school year?	For the 2023/24 school year Malvern has been designated as closed for all programs. Registrations for our regular program are accepted if the student and a custodial parent or legal guardian reside within our catchment area.
Can I attend Malvern if I have a sibling who attends?	Since Malvern is closed to optional attendance, the "sibling rule" does not apply. Students who are out of area cannot register at Malvern, even if they have a sibling that currently attends Malvern.
What is the process for registering at Mal- vern?	Course selections and support are handled by the grade 8 school staff. Eligible students' profile and course selections are transferred online by the feeder school in Feb. 2023
If I attend a Specialized program at another school, can I change my mind and come to Malvern?	Students who attend a Specialized program at a school retain their right to register at their home school, at appropriate breaks in the school year (i.e. at the start of sem 1 or the start of sem 2). This applies to the regular program only.
If I attend a Specialized program at another school, can I change my mind and come to Malvern for Fr. Imm or Ext. French?	Students who have opted to attend a specialized program at another school will not be able to register at Malvern at a later date for the French Imm or Ext. French program. Students may register at Malvern for the regular program if they reside in the catchment area.
What is the process for registering if I am in a different school board?	Please contact the guidance dept at Malvern following the winter break to arrange registration. Refer to TDSB link for documentation required: https://www.tdsb.on.ca/Find-your/School/Registration
I will be moving into Malvern's catchment ar- ea. What is the process for registering?	Once you have moved into the area, contact our guidance department. You cannot register until you have moved into our area and have provided sufficient documentation of residency. Students should register at their designated home school until the move is complete.
Can I register in Malvern's regular program if I am currently in Fr. Imm or Ext. Fr.	Students may register for the regular program if they reside within Malvern's catchment area. The program change will be handled by the feeder school.
If I am enrolled in Malvern's French program, can I switch to the Regular Program at a later date?	Student who live within Malvern's catchment area for our Regular Program can switch to our regular program and remain at Malvern. <u>Since Malvern</u> is closed to Optional Attendance, this policy is strictly enforced. Students who are outside the catchment area will be referred to their home school by address.
If I switch from the French Program to the regular program, will my French credits still count?	Yes, if you have credits in Math or History that are French Imm or Ext. French Credits, and you switch to a Regular Program, those credits will still count as credits.
If I am enrolled in the French Immersion pro- gram, can I switch to the Extended French program.	Students who are enrolled in a specialized program (such as French Immer- sion or Ext. French) are expected to continue in this pathway. Students are not permitted to switch from French Immersion to Extended French (or from Extended French to French Immersion).
If I am in the Fr. Imm program, and haven't obtained enough credits, can I receive a bilin- gual certificate for the Ext. Program?	Fr. Imm and Ext. Fr are considered 2 distinct programs, and students cannot go from one to the other. If you do not fulfill the requirements of the Fr. Imm program, then you cannot receive an Ext. French certificate.
I currently attend a French program outside of the TDSB, but I live in Malvern's catchment area? Can I register for Malvern's French Pro- gram?	Currently we are closed for all programs. A student may register for our regu- lar program if the student resides within our catchment area for the regular program. Admission to the French Program is dependent on whether there is space in the program. Malvern will not be able to confirm if there is space until late August/early September.
I currently attend a French program though the Catholic or French Board. Can I enrol in the regular program at Malvern and wait for a spot in the French program?	Malvern will not be maintaining a wait list for the French program for stu- dents who have registered in our regular program. We will, however, keep a record of registered students from other boards who would prefer to be in the French Program. In the event there is space in the program, these students will be considered. Students who register for the regular program should do so with the understanding that there may not be an opportunity to switch to the French program.

FUN FACTS ABOUT MALVERN

Malvern's History:

- **Malvern dates back to September 1, 1903** when East Toronto High School opened in the original Mary Street School building (now Kimberley Public School).
- In **1905** the Board purchased a site on Malvern Avenue.
- On **January 3**, **1906**, a new building of four rooms was ready for occupancy.
- On **January 5, 1910**, the Board renamed the school Malvern Avenue High School.
- In the **Spring of 1914** the it was renamed Malvern Avenue Collegiate.
- On **May 19, 1922**, WWI memorial in front of the school was unveiled by the Premier of Ontario, Mr. G.S. Henry. In **May 2022**, the Malvern Community, in collaboration with the Alumni Association, planned a commemorative ceremony to mark the 100th anniversary of the War Memorial.
