

FINANCIAL AID FOR POST-SECONDARY

It was great to see many of you at our "Tuesday Talk" with Guidance on April 6 on the topic of Financial Aid for post-secondary and OSAP. We were joined by Kassi Wicke from George Brown College, and her role is to help support the transition to post-secondary for all students, regardless of which College or University they will attend. She has generously shared many resources with us, including a Financial Aid Resource flyer and a checklist to help with OSAP applications. Financial Aid Presentation slides are also included, along with a Zoom recording.

UNIVERSITY (OUAC) UPDATES

If you applied to university for Fall 2021, you should have received an email from the OUAC indicating that Quad 3 grades have been processed. Please follow those instructions and log in to your online application on the OUAC website to review your academic information on file with OUAC. If changes are required, students are advised to contact their guidance counsellor.

A few important points to note:

- •Read any conditional offers you receive from a university very carefully.
- Every student who receives an offer will receive an individualized letter usually after logging into the specific university platform), which outlines the conditions of maintaining this offer.
- •Pay particular attention to the courses and grades required for maintaining your offer; as a general rule, universities <u>will not</u> round up grades for maintaining the offer or scholarships.
- •Conditional offers will continue in May, and the last offers by Ontario universities will come by Thursday, May 27, 2021.
- •Tuesday, June 1, 2021, is the earliest date that Ontario universities may require a response to an offer and a financial commitment; out-out-province deadlines may be sooner. COLLEGE (OCAS) UPDATES

If you applied or want to apply to college for Fall 2021, please also log in to your online application through the OCAS to review your academic and program information. If changes are required, students are advised to contact their guidance counsellor. A few important points to note:

- •Read any offers you receive from a college very carefully.
- •Many college programs still have applications open for Fall 2021; as long as space remains in an Ontario college program, you may apply for it. Read here for details: https://www.ontariocolleges.ca/en/; or contact the colleges you are interested in to inquire.
- •Saturday, May 1, 2021, was the date to confirm your acceptance to college, unless the offer is made to you after this date. Each college determines its own confirmation deadline on offers made after May 1. Read more here: https://www.ontariocolleges.ca/en/apply/offers-of-admission



ENGLISH & MODERN'S DEPT'S: REVAMPING THEIR TEXTS



FROM THE MODERN'S DEPT

Despite a rainy last week of April, spring is definitely in the air, which means... spring cleaning! Although we've been out of the building for most of the winter (or so it feels!) work has been going on behind the scenes which I'm very excited to finally reveal. Since around November, I've been gathering a collection of novels to seriously revamp the French department's book room, with a particular goal in mind: adding modern, relevant French texts at all levels (Core, Extended and Immersion, grades 9 – 12) written by Black, Indigenous and authors of Colour, which feature BIPOC characters. It's no secret that « *les grands classiques* » tend to be pretty Eurocentric, and while many of those stories are beautiful and timeless, many more continue to grow less and less reflective of *la francophonie* in the 21st century as the years go by. It's time to clean out our book room!

Both in Canada and abroad, there is such a rich diversity of French literature which has been traditionally overlooked in favour of « *les grands classiques* », but which is no less compelling than Hugo's *Les Misérables*, or Molière's *Le Bourgeois gentilhomme*. Stepping into Michel Noël's youth as a francophone Algonquin living in 1960s Québec, or the childhood of Joseph Zobel growing up on the plantations of Martinique gives us another perspective on what it means to be francophone, and indeed that *la francophonie* is not just one thing. We strive to present learning materials in our classes which reflect not only the richness of the language, but more importantly the students in front of us who are working hard to learn that language, and to that end, I have some exciting developments.

Beginning in December, a group of FSL teachers from across Ontario began corresponding electronically to organize what, at that time, we were informally calling the "FSL BIPOC Book Club." Since then, and thanks to the tireless work of some dedicated teachers based in the Peel District School Board, the project has grown to include funding from the University of Ottawa, and was rebranded, "The Collective Catalogue of FSL Books for Diversity." The goal of the project was for each teacher involved to select and read one book from a list of French novels written by BIPOC authors, and to make a re

port on its suitability for use in the classroom. We then got together on Zoom in February to share our reports, and recommend our books for use in the appropriate program and grade. We came away with a rich catalogue of texts, suitable for all different levels, and which had all been read cover-to-cover by people willing to share any teaching materials they may have developed. From this catalogue, the process of updating Malvern's French literature resources has begun!

Naturally with a project this size, even just at one school, rollout can't happen overnight, as books need to be ordered, inventoried, and lessons and activities need to be developed. It is our goal, therefore, to have a number of these books ready to go for September 2021, at which time (fingers crossed!) it will

be safe enough to actually be back at school and engage with these beautiful new books in a meaningful way. As a community, our anti-racist work is never done, but we are hoping that this exciting step will go a long way to promoting inclusivity, worldliness, critical thinking skills, and love within our French language learners at Malvern.


NEW TEXTS IN SENIOR ENGLISH

MALVERN GRAD EMMA BURKEITT

Congratulations to Emma Burkeitt who is doing great things since graduating from Malvern CI back in 2012.

Around ten years ago, I had the great fortune to have Emma Burkeitt as a student in not one, but two, of my classes: Visual Arts and Media Arts. She was one of those students you just know is going to go on to do great things. And that, she is indeed doing.

After completing her four years at Malvern, Emma Burkeitt went on to study "Digital Futures" at OCAD U. In her final year, she and a team of fellow OCAD U animators and game designers won the Level Up Award for game design for their two-player co-

operative puzzle-solving adventure game, <u>Pitfall Planet</u>. From there, she went to Reptoid Games, which won the first Ubisoft Indie Series Award for their popular game, <u>Fossil Hunters</u>. Both Pitfall Planet and Fossil Hunters are now available on Steam and for Nintendo Switch.

Virtually right out the door from graduating from OCAD U, Emma was hired as a Production Artist for <u>Reblink</u>, an Augmented Reality experience created in partnership with the AGO that went on to be nominated for a Webby Award. I met the artist, Alex Mayhew, on a field trip to the AGO. When I mentioned that I knew Emma as one of my students from a few years back, Mayhew said she was "fantastic -- so talented and great to work with."

Somewhere around this time, too, Emma was a contributing writer and artist for *Toronto Comics: Yonge at Heart*, which has been highly praised on <u>Goodreads</u>.

More recently Emma was Lead Artist for the NFB Animated Augmented Reality Experience, <u>Book of Distance</u>, which has received numerous international awards including the Vancouver Interna-

tional Film Festival award for Best Animation and has received Official Selection at seven different international film festivals. Book of Distance is breaking new ground in the world of animation and storytelling and Emma Burkeitt was a key player in its creation and success.



So, congratulations to Malvern alumnus, Emma Burkeitt. She is currently an Art Director at a local independent game studio known as Laundry Bear and I am sure that we will see more great things from her in the years to come!

SEAN MATTHEWS' RECENT INTERVIEW WITH EMMA

Q: What was one of your best memories from Malvern?

A: Probably participating in the battle of the bands. It was a step out of my comfort zone and so much fun. I'm still playing music with one of my Malvern band mates today, and we just released our first album.



Q: What was the most challenging part of post-secondary learning?

A: For me it was definitely getting used to the workload. Another thing

used to the workload. Another thing that can be tough, if you're going to an art school, is having your work critiqued. Being able to accept constructive criticism is key if you have an art job. I love it now, I'm like, yes please help me make this good! Also, the most important skill I learned at OCAD U was how to work on a team. Learning how to work on a team is super important in an industry like video games, where you need people skilled in so many different disciplines to work together to create the finished product.

Q: In what way(s) would you say that Malvern prepared you for what you do today?

A: For my career in particular, taking Media Arts was the most valuable class I took. We had units on the fundamentals of photoshop, 2D animation, and video editing. If you work in video games, there is a huge range of jobs you might end up doing that may require a variety of different skills. It's important to learn how to quickly adapt to using new technologies. Also English was pretty useful because if you end up going to a university, regardless of what you study they are going to make you write A LOT.

Q: Tell us a bit about the most rewarding thing you have done since you graduated from OCAD U

A: Working on The Book of Distance was particularly rewarding because I was able to help realize a very personal story that needed to be told with great care and intention. I was very fortunate to have the opportunity to help such a wonderful team take on this challenge.

Q: What advice would you give to Malvern's next generation of students?

A: If you're planning on going to post secondary, remember to look into both universities and colleges regardless of what courses you're taking. I remember we mostly learned about universities when I was applying. I loved OCAD University, but say I wanted to very specifically study 3D modelling for Triple A video games, I'd probably be better off looking at college programs because they teach more specific skills.




University of Toronto Visits Malvern Science


During quadmesters 2 and 3, students in grade 11 and 12 biology attended a virtual guest presentation by U of T PhD candidates Kate MacDonald and Valerie Facca. Kate is in the Department of Medical Biophysics and studies DNA damage and repair. Valerie is in the Department of Pharmaceutical Sciences and develops targeted radiation therapies to treat aggressive cancers.

Kate and Valerie explained their research to our students, spoke about their journey from high school to graduate school, advised students how they can get involved in research opportunities as an undergraduate student, and then held a Q&A in which it was noted that our students asked fantastic questions!

The session was a very positive experience for our students, providing them with insight into what is involved in medical research. Many students who never knew they might be interested in pursuing academic research in the future now see it as a potential avenue.

LOOKING AHEAD TO 2021/22

We are all hoping that the 2021/22 school year will look much different, as the province ramps up its plans to have every immunized. Still, there is so much we don't know, and it's therefore difficult to plan ahead. While the Board of Trustees finalizes decisions on the school year calendar and structure, schools are in a bit of a holding pattern. ANTI-RACIST EDUCATION
