

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MESSAGE FROM THE PRINCIPAL

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June is Pride Month!

Statement from TDSB Chair, Alexander Brown and Director, Karen Falconer on the discovery of the unmarked graves 215 Indigenous Children

In the wake of the tragic discovery of the unmarked graves of 215 Indigenous children at the former Kamloops Indian Residential School in British Columbia, the Toronto District School Board deplores the loss of life and mourns alongside Indigenous communities.

Friday's discovery is further evidence of the genocide perpetrated on Indigenous Peoples in Canada. Substantial work must be done in schools and systems, to face the historical and current realities that continue to harm Indigenous Peoples.

The TDSB flags will remain at half mast, starting today for nine days — one hour for every life lost — in honour of the 215 children.

It is important to acknowledge that words and symbolic gestures are not enough. We must move beyond words and truly commit ourselves to learning and understanding the critical importance of truth, reconciliation and reparation. There cannot be reconciliation without truth.



In a cohort of 25-30 students, you will explore your passions, develop leadership and communication skills for future scholarship, post-secondary and job opportunities, discover new careers and universities, and grow as community leaders.

When: SUV runs from July 5th to 30th. There will be mandatory sessions every Monday, Wednesday, and Friday between 1:00pm and 3:30pm. Optional workshops and socials are scheduled on Tuesday and Thursday.

Where: We will be building our community through Zoom and Slack.

What: We have a variety of amazing <u>programming and opportunities</u> prepared for you this summer! Some examples of the opportunities you will be able to engage with, participate in, and learn from are business skills training, keynote speakers, personal and professional development workshops, 1-on-1 mentorship, and an Innovation Challenge Showcase for you to build your own entrepreneurial ideas.

UNIVERSITY UPDATES

- It is your responsibility to request that any private school report a private course you are taking to OUAC.
- Please log into your online application on the OUAC website to review your academic information on file with OUAC. If changes are required, students are advised to contact their guidance counsellor.
- Read any conditional offers you receive from a university very carefully.
- Every student who receives an offer will receive an individualized letter, which outlines the conditions of maintaining this offer.
- Pay attention to the courses and grades required for maintaining your offer; as a general rule, universities <u>will</u> not round up grades for maintaining the offer or scholarships.

CARLETON UNIVERSITY - ENRICHED SUPPORT PROGRAM

In grade 12 and still interested in applying for university?

The <u>Enriched Support program</u> – <u>ESP</u> – is designed for students that don't meet the traditional entrance requirements. We offer students the change to begin first-year study with structured academic support. Our sister program, the <u>Indigenous Enriched Support Program</u>, is designed to support Indigenous learners in their transition to university. Students who finish our program with the necessary average are guaranteed admission to many programs at Carleton. For more information, check out the <u>Guidance Counsellors</u> page, or if students would like to learn more information, they can book a <u>one-on-one visit with Student Ambassadors</u>. Additionally, there are <u>Information Nights</u> (7:00pm) coming up on June 2nd and June 9th.

ESP is still accepting applications; students apply directly, rather than through OUAC, so even students who have not applied to University can submit an application. Our deadline is currently June 15^{th} , but is usually extended through July, space permitting.



COLLEGE UPDATES

- Please log into your online application through the OCAS to review your academic and program information. If changes are required, students are advised to contact their guidance counsellor.
- Read any offers you receive from a college very carefully.
- Many college programs still have applications open for Fall 2021; as long as space remains in an Ontario college program, you may apply for it. Go to ontario colleges, ca, or contact the colleges you are interested in to inquire.
- ♦ June, 2021 The colleges require payment of a tuition deposit in June to secure your spot in your program. Each college sets its own tuition deposit amount and payment deadline. This information will be communicated to you by the college.

We have been able to tackle projects we don't normally get time to address or spend quality time on. Let me highlight what has been going on here at Malvern C.I.

We have spent some time redoing the gyms the way they need to be done. Let's just say they look fantastic and the finish will last a long time.





The Auditorium stage was refinished. What a project! We had to take the curtains down (and we're getting new curtains!) and the amount of dust on the lights and rails was ridiculous. HIGHLIGHTS FROM CONSEIL FRANÇAIS



Beginning in November and prior to our first lockdown of the school year, members of the Conseil français have been volunteering their time to offer free virtual tutoring sessions in French to support elementary students at our two largest French feeder schools; Adam Beck

and Williamson Road.

Ranging from grades SK to Grade 8, in French immersion, Extended and Core French, the younger students have engaged in interactive and fun activities on Zoom to help their French language development in a one-on-one environment. These interactions allowed both the younger and older students to practise speaking in French, an opportunity that has been rare and difficult since the pandemic started last spring.

At the same time, Malvern students were able to accrue some muchneeded volunteer hours and establish connections in the wider Malvern community.

Many parents, Malvern students and elementary students have raved at how positive an experience and op-

portunity it has been for all involved. Looking ahead, the Conseil français in tandem with Malvern French immersion and Extended French programs hope to continue and grow this outreach with all of our French feeder schools in the future.

To date, we have published a total of 91 pieces. Our team consists of five graphic designers, ten topic editors, one editorial assistant, two photographers, and 28 journalists.



Here is a sample of what we did!


Workshop #1 Consent (Thurs Jan 14)

Message from the Principal



WORDS THAT SHALL NOT BE SPOKEN

There's an episode of the Simpsons where Marg asks the kids what they learned in Sunday School. Bart was expecting the question and he couldn't wait to answer.

"Hell!" Bart exclaims.

Homer gasps.

Bart responds with quick quip: "How the hell can I answer you when you ask me what I learned in Sunday school without saying 'hell' when I learned about hell? Hell, hell, hell."

While Homer takes a little while to process this, Bart knows full well that for this particular word, context matters and he has discovered a legitimate excuse to say a bad word.

While profanity is not acceptable in certain segments of society (like school), there are situations where a choice word or phrase is the only one that comes to mind in that split second. Context sometimes serves to mitigate the relative badness of the bad word.

For other words, there is not an acceptable context or excuse. To be clear, it is unacceptable to speak, read aloud, sing, or write the n-word in its unabbreviated form (and that includes a variation of the word, such as adding 'a' to the end). The n-word has an historical context of slavery, colonialism and ongoing forms of individual and systemic anti-Black racism and dehumanization. There is significant and on-going trauma associated with the word. It is NOT in the same category as a bad word or profanity.

The TDSB and Malvern have been clear about our response to the use of this word in our learning spaces.

It is important to remember that there are other words that target racial/ethnic groups or the 2SLGBTQ+ community. These words are also derogatory and are rooted in hate, violence, racism and discrimination. There is significant and on-going trauma associated with the words.

In our learning spaces there is not an acceptable context or excuse to use these words.

THE EQUITY, ANTI-RACISM AND ANTI-OPPRESSION WEBSITE

The Equity, Anti-Racism and Anti-Oppression website features many resources and tools that foster equity and inclusiveness in the development and implementation of programs and services. IN-PERSON AND VIRTUAL OPTIONS FOR SEPTEMBER 2021/22 A MESSAGE FROM THE TDSB

The Government of Ontario recently announced that school boards will provide In-Person and Virtual Learning options for the 2021-22 school year.

With this in mind, the Toronto District School Board (TDSB) will be asking families to complete an online **Selection Form for In-Person or Virtual Learning** in mid-August.

At that time, families will have up-to-date information on the status of the pandemic and vaccinations for school staff and students, and will be in a better position to make an informed decision. The TDSB will also be in a better position to provide information about health and safety measures in schools for in-person learning and more details about how live, online virtual learning will be delivered.

The Virtual Schools currently in place will <u>not</u> be offered for the 2021-22 school year. Virtual Learning will be provided through home schools and will include live, online instruction involving teachers, staff and students from the home school or a group of schools.

More information about the Selection Form for In-Person and Virtual Learning will be emailed directly to families in August. All information and the selection form will also be made available on the TDSB website.
