FROM the TDSB

The TDSB continues to do everything we can to help slow the spread of COVID-19. Daily self-assessments, regular hand washing, mask wearing and physical distancing are some of the most important things we can do. In addition, according to Toronto Public Health, increasing fresh air is an important strategy in our schools and classrooms.

Over the past few months, the TDSB has checked all mechanical HVAC systems to ensure they are operating as designed, increased the frequency of filter changes, adjusted systems to increase the amount of fresh air and reduce recirculation, added portable HEPA air filter units in classrooms where mechanical ventilation is not an option, and opened windows where possible.

As we head into the colder months of the year, open windows will continue to be an important step to increase fresh air in classrooms and schools. Toronto Public Health is recommending that windows in classrooms should be opened for a period of time, at different points of the day to introduce fresh air into the space and increase air flow. While heating systems will be turned up, we still expect that schools will be cooler than normal.

We recognize it is very much a balance between introducing more ventilation at various times during the day and maintaining a comfortable indoor air temperature in classrooms. Please keep this in mind as your child gets ready for school each day by considering an extra layer of clothing to ensure comfort throughout the day.

Thank you for your continued support of our efforts to slow the spread of COVID-19 and keep our schools safe for staff and students.

HERE'S WHAT YOU TOLD US...

Common themes emerged from our feedback survey

Thank you to the 338 parents and the 215 students who completed the feedback survey after Quad 1. Your feedback (as well as staff feedback) was reviewed with the staff during out PA day.

Some common themes emerged from parents, students and staff:



Communication

Parents are looking for more communication from the teachers. While there was a general understanding that parents don't typically hear from the teacher if "all is well", parents indicated that they would have liked some sort of communication regardless of how their child was doing.

We agree.

Many teachers will be adding parent emails to their online classrooms. While this won't give parents access to the entire program, it will provide information to parents on assignments, due dates and their child's progress.

Teachers will also be sending introductory emails to parents with a course outline and information on how to contact the teacher.

Asynchronous Lessons/Time

Some parents commented that they were unaware that the 8:45-12:30 time block (when students were at home) was actually "course time" with an expectation that students complete work independently in the on-line classroom.

Note: The teacher is not present during this time, as they are teaching the other half of the class (the other cohort).

Many (parents and students) expressed that this time was not used for school work on a consistent basis.

Parents and students also commented that the course work that is given during this time needs to be less "open-ended".

Teachers shared similar concerns and suggestions. They found it challenging to find the right balance between providing a sufficient amount of independent learning for students for this block of time and then providing adequate support and flexibility when the time was not used and students fell behind or started to struggle with the workload and pace.

Quad 2's Asynchronous lessons will be more structured, with specific expectations.

Feedback/Marks

Teachers expressed that providing timely feedback to students proved to be challenging. The purpose of evaluation is to provide feedback for further learning, and this is somewhat hindered by the fast pace of the quadmester format.

Parents also expressed a desire for the "mark-to-date" (mid-term mark) to be communicated to parents directly. While students may have received a notification from their teacher about their mid-term mark, this information did not necessarily make it to the dining room table.

There is no official report card that is produced for the mid-term mark.

We recognize, however, that it is important to communicate this mark to all parents and students and that parents have an opportunity to follow up with the teacher if necessary.

This will be in place for Quad 2.

SUGGESTIONS FROM STUDENTS Regarding In-Class Lessons

- Fewer videos (if the video is long, we fall asleep)
- Fewer "lectures"/powerpoints.
- More class discussions.
- Consider an outline of what will be covered in class so we know what to expect. So much is "thrown at us".
- More breaks.
- Let us come to school everyday.
- The hands-on stuff is fun.
- Shake it up.

MALVERN SCIENCE

Dissection Time!

Dissections are somewhat of a rite of passage in high school science. They are one of those high school experiences that you remember for the rest of your life even if you do not continue studying in the field of science.

biology students completed their rat dissection, and our grade 10 science students completed their frog dissection.

Hands-on labs are what science is all about, and our students had a great time investigating the various organs and organ systems that we had been learning about in class...even though some student were a little grossed out at first! The grade 10s got to investigate the basics of the major body systems as well as the hierarchy of cells, tissues, organs, and organ systems. The grade 11s got to expand on their knowledge of the

various organs in the digestive, respiratory, and circulatory systems, with a specific emphasis on how these organ systems work together to provide the body with energy via cellular respiration.

This past quadmester, our grade 11 If students continue in the sciences at Malvern, they will have the opportunity to build on the knowledge that they gained from the dissections. If they do not continue in the sciences, they will still forever have the dissection experience to look back upon fondly.



FROM THE ENGLISH DEPARTMENT



Priyanka, the winner of Canada's Drag Race, joined Mr. Janeteas' ENG4U class and Malvern's Gender and Sexuality Alliance (GSA) for a conversation about representation in media. We talked about the cultural significance of Drag Race and the importance of including LGBTQ+ voices in television and film.

Students in Mr. Janeteas' ENG 4U were curating a media anthology entitled #RepresentationMatters. Students shared recommendations of texts that highlighted a unique positive representation of an otherwise underrepresented or misrepresented identity.

GRADE 9 ENGLISH











Last Quad, Grade 9 English students in Ms. Vuckovic's class were making inferences, sequencing, problem solving, and learning to prioritize information as they completed reading adventure escape rooms during asynchronous learning blocks.

The series of online reading escape games follow different teen protagonists as they solve various mysteries in Burnbridge - and paying attention to detail is a must to solve the puzzles. Generation Z students are fast-paced multitaskers, and the online reading escape games at home paired with traditional and tactile reading annotation at school is gearing this group of students up to read actively and think critically!

THE DREADED AUTOMATED ATTENDANCE CALL

From a parent who has been there

"Hello. Good-evening. This is an automated message from Malvern Collegiate. A student in your household in grade **TEN**, by the name of **ERRRN** was absent for periods ..."

I get it. The automated call is enough to ruin a lovely family dinner, particularly if there's a discrepancy between the recorded attendance, and the VERY convincing teen who is outraged that she was marked absent...again.

To make matters worse, parents are now receiving calls in the morning if their child hasn't signed in to their online classroom by 9:00 a.m.

I'm not sure if this is a Ministry requirement or if it is our (the TDSB's) attempt to improve student attendance for the morning period (when students are at home and are supposed to be logging in and completing class work). Whatever the rationale, I understand that it is annoying and I'm sorry. We received about 100 calls to the office

on Monday and Tuesday with parents exclaiming, "The school just called to say my kid is absent. She's sitting



right here in front of me. Why are you telling me she's absent?"

I know how you feel. As a parent, I had a love-hate relationship with the automated messages. I needed to know whether my kid reported to class, despite the fact that it was very triggering. The calls have had a lasting affect. Erin, now in her mid 20's, is still referred to as **ERRRN** (with the same automated tone of voice). We just can't help it!

The calls are here to stay, and whether they improve attendance for the at-home learning block remains to be seen. But at the very least, it's providing parents with information. As annoying as it is, that's not a bad thing.

Reese, Forever in Our Hearts

Reese Fallon was a recently-graduated student of Malvern C.I. who was tragically taken from us in July of 2018, just weeks before she was to begin a nursing program at McMaster university. This tragedy hit us all hard and we struggled with how to process such a senseless act of violence.

A memorial for Reese organically popped up by the flagpole at Malvern. It grew to be a massive display of flowers, cards, statuettes, angels, Reese bars and candles.

With the permission of the family, we made a decision to respectfully take it down a month after it started. Everything was laid out in the staff room (it filled it up) and the cards were saved and given to

Reese's family. The flowers were dried out and montages were made from them and given to family and to people who loved Reese.

The next day, another memorial started to grow at the flagpole. We saw that the community needed this to stay and it remains to this day, two years after the fact.

Alongside our wonderful neigh-



bours in the community, the caretaking staff have tended to this memorial respectfully. We change batteries in the candles, straighten out the flowers and memorial items placed there and ensure that it looks good for those who still come by to honour Reese's memory. This memorial serves as a wonderful reminder that

Reese's memory still lives within us and our Malvern community. I get teary-eyed when I see people come by, stop and pay their respects. It warms my heart when I see a parent with their young ones gently explaining the meaning behind this memorial to a child who is far too young to yet understand. We have a wonderful community here.

Early last year, we planted a tree in Reese's honour. This tree is on Malvern Avenue near the large parking lot. It too has grown to have some angels, stars and butterflies both hanging from her tree's branches and around it's base. It serves as another beautiful reminder of Reese and the energy she brought to our community.

At the tail end of last year, a teacher (who wishes to remain anonymous) at Malvern made a plaque to memorialize Reese's tree forever. This plaque has been mounted in cement to offer a permanent reminder that Reese will always be with us.

Next time you go for a walk around Malvern C.I., stop by Reese's tree and the flagpole, both located on Malvern Avenue, take in the beauty of the flowers, notes, pictures and knick-knacks left behind by those who knew and loved Reese and by those who were affected by her story. Take it in and be reminded of how precious life is. Talk to others about what you can do to make a difference. And then resolve to be part of the change in our world that is so desperately needed to bring back the beauty and indomitable spirit of humanity. I know Reese would like that.
