KAREN CHABOYER SPEAKS ABOUT HER EXPERIENCE AS A RESIDENTIAL SCHOOL SURVIVOR

On September 30, the National Day for Truth and Reconciliation, Malvern learned about the history and legacy of residential schools through the lived experiences of Karen Chaboyer. Despite telling her story through a zoom meeting to over 1000 staff and students, it was as though she spoke to each of us directly.

Following the hour, students and staff walked in silence to their next class, where they reflected not just on Karen's story, but on the story of so many survivors of residential schools, and intergenerational impact.

Karen entered the residential school system in 1956 and remained there for 9 years. She remembers, at the age of 6, that she didn't know what school was, but she was excited. Nine years later, she left school not knowing her own language, not knowing how to communicate, not knowing how to socialize, not knowing how to make decisions or problem-solve, not knowing her family or friends. She left school and had no self-love, not trust, and no acceptance from others. She recounts, "I yearned for love and acceptance, yet trusted no one."

Karen has drawn strength and joy from her 17 grandchildren, and she continues to share her story with others. When asked what the Malvern community can do to support the Calls to Action and Truth and Reconciliation, Karen's response was a powerful one: "Don't rescue us. Realize that education is the key. Commit to learning more about the past and about us. Our culture is beautiful.

INDIGENOUS LEGACY GATHERING - SOCIAL SCIENCES FIELD TRIP

Students from the Grade 11 "APS" (Anthropology, Psychology and Sociology) classes and the Grade 12 Equity & Social Justice class went on a field trip to Nathan Phillips Square on September 29 for the 4th Annual Indigenous Legacy Gathering. This gathering was organized by Toronto Council Fire Native Cultural Centre, a cultural agency serving the Indigenous community and their well-being.

The programming this year is focused on the theme of Revillagizing. From Council Fire: "Revillagizing is a return to traditional cultural values and beliefs that honours Creator and all of creation (the natural world). Through the support of our community members, knowledge keepers, elders, grandmothers, storytellers, drummers and dancers, we gather in the spirit of celebrating all our teachings, learning, sharing and collective growth."

At the gathering, students observed events on the Main Stage, including a Grand Entry, drumming, singing, lacrosse teaching, and storytelling. In tipis and booths throughout the square, students participated in learning experiences with a wide variety of local organizations, including Métis Nation of Ontario, Ontario Native Women's Association, 2 Spirited People of the 1st Nations, Thunder Woman Healing Lodge Society, Our Children's Medicine, and the Anishinaabe Teaching Lodge.

As a Malvern community we plan to keep learning, building cultural competence and forging our own paths to Truth and Reconciliation.







How do I stay Informed of School Events?

- 1. One of the best ways to know what is going on at the school is to ask your child. All students have access to the School Connects App, and daily school announcements are accessible through the app. If you can convince your child to give you their phone and log you in, you'll see all the information there!
- Consider checking the school's calendar regularly. All events and special days are
 posted in the calendar and it is updated almost daily! The school's <u>website</u> has the live
 calendar.



How do I know if My Child Needs an Individual Education Plan (I.E.P.)?

How do Students Access Additional Support if they don't have an I.E.P.?

Students who do not have an I.E.P. or a diagnosed learning disability may need additional support from time to time because of a variety of factors that may impact their learning.

These factors include—but are not limited to—the following:

- ♦ Anxiety or Depression
- Other mental health issues
- ♦ Gaps in learning
- ♦ ADHD
- Trauma/Emotional Distress

For most students, Classroom-Based (Tier 1) support will address these needs.

How do Students Access Classroom-Based (Tier 1) Support?

Students do not need an IEP, an ILP, or a doctor's note to access classroom-based support. Classroom-based support is available to all students, as needed.

It is essential that students communicate their learning needs to their teachers. Students may choose to not disclose specific factors that are impacting their learning; however, it is critical that students communicate to the teacher what their learning needs are, and the specific times when their needs require some additional support from the teacher.

What is Classroom-Based (Tier 1) Support?

Teachers are required to support all students so that they can demonstrate their understanding of the course curriculum. This includes—but is not limited to —the following:

- ♦ Additional time for tests, <u>when needed</u>
- Providing specific feedback for next steps
- Providing additional opportunities to demonstrate the expectations
- ◆ Providing extra help opportunities
- ♦ Providing skill-building exercises related to the feedback
- ♦ When necessary, differentiating & scaffolding evaluations

Students who experience anxiety, depression, other mental health issues, trauma or emotional distress, learning gaps, or ADHD may have a greater need at certain times for additional support from teachers. The most common request is the provision for additional time on tests or the use of the Resource Room for writing tests.

How do Students Access the Resource Room for Writing Tests?

- The use of the Resource Room is for students whose IEP stipulates that an alternative space is needed.
- Students that do not have an IEP, and consistently demonstrate a need for an alternate space, may also use the Resource room for writing tests.
- In most cases, students are better served writing their test in their classroom, with the support of their teacher to answer questions, and the provision for extra time when it is needed.

What should students do if the support they are receiving is not meeting their learning needs?

- Tier 1 support is in place to address learning needs of <u>all</u> students, and it also enables teachers to determine if there is a consistent, demonstrated learning need that may require additional interventions.
- If a student consistently demonstrates a need for additional

support and it is not adequately addressed through the class-room teacher, then the student, parent or teacher may request that school-based support be initiated.

♦ See below for more information.

School-Based Support (Guidance, Student Success) Guidance Support may include:

- Meeting with student
- ♦ Connecting them with community resources/supports
- Coordinating with teachers to share best practices or to implement other strategies
- ♦ Checking in with student regularly
- Verifying that Tier 1 supports have been implemented
- ♦ If appropriate, referring student to In-School Support Team (IST)

Student Success Support may include:

- Meeting with student
- ♦ Connecting the student with our Youth Worker
- Reviewing OSR and achievement data
- Providing academic support as needed
- Monitoring the student's progress
- Liaising with teachers to review strategies and supports
- Verifying that tier 1 supports have been implemented
- ♦ Considering timetable changes
- ♦ If appropriate, refer to In-School Support Team (IST)

Initiating Tier 2 Support (Special Education In-School Support Team (IST)

The In-School Support Team (which includes Student Success, Guidance, Special Education, Admin, and referring teacher(s)) meets monthly to discuss individual students.

Discussion may include:

- Reviewing concerns and the strategies that have been implemented;
- ♦ Considering additional interventions;
- Reviewing OSR and academic history;
- Considering programming changes;
- Communicating next steps with students, teachers and parents:
- ◆ If appropriate, referring student to the School Support Team (SST)

School Support Team (SST)

The School Support Team (which includes the School Social Worker, Psychologist, Spec. Ed. Consultant, Parents) meet monthly.

Discussion/Plan may include:

- Reviewing all concerns, interventions and tier 1 supports that have been implemented;
- If appropriate, recommending formal assessments or outside agencies;
- If appropriate, preparing an I.E.P.; Reviewing completed assessments/testing;
- ♦ If appropriate, proceeding to an IPRC;
- Communicating plan with student, parent/guardian, classroom teachers, and TDSB support personnel and/or outside agencies



PRINCIPAL'S UPDATE

SCHOOL TONE & STUDENT SAFETY

I speak on behalf of all staff when I say that it is wonderful to have the halls full of students once again, and it's clear that students are happy to be together again. The buzz of student activity is back, and now that some extra-curricular activities are resuming, there will be even more energy in the school.

There are a few reminders, however, that I would like to bring to everyone's attention

Washrooms—A TDSB school was recently in the news over complaints from students that students were congregating in the washroom (vaping) and leaving other students no other option but to "hold it" or to go to the neighbourhood community centre. This could very well have been most secondary schools.

At Malvern, we have increased our supervision and have organized a program to increase awareness of the harmful effects of vaping. And while vaping in washrooms *appears* to have decreased since last year at this time, we still see groups of students who just happen to end up in the washroom at the same time, and their prolonged presence makes it uncomfortable (at best) and impossible (at worst) for an unsuspecting student to use the washroom for its intended purpose. It's an age-old problem perhaps, as the washroom is the only place that is truly private, and exclusively "student space".



We are continuing in our efforts to break up the social gatherings in the washrooms.

Lateness—Now that school is well underway, we are noticing an increase in the number of students who don't quite make it to class in time at the start of the day and for the class after lunch.

Digital Citizenship—Stay tuned for more information and workshops for parents around how we can work together to guide students on responsible and respectful use of social media. Online bullying continues to be an issue for many teens and young adults. Students need to become more aware of what online bullying looks like, as many reinforce harmful rumours without realizing they are doing it.

MALVERN'S CODE OF CONDUCT & WELCOME ASSEMBLY

In addition, the administration hosted a welcome assembly during the 1st week of school to review school expectatation.

PARENTING FOR POSITIVE MENTAL HEALTH

FROM THE MATH DEPARTMENT

In February and April of the 2022 school year, Malvern participated in the University of Waterloo Canadian Mathematics competitions. The Pascal, the Cayley, and the Fermat contests were written by approximately 55, 585 students from over 1300 schools across Canada. For the Euclid contest there were just over 22,000 participants and for the Fryer, Galois and Hypatia contests, over 6000 students wrote.

The aim of these competitions is to not only provide students with an opportunity to test their mathematical aptitude against that of other students but also to develop invaluable skills like creative problem solving and big picture thinking. In recognition to those students who scored in the top 25% of all competitors, the University awards certificates of distinction and classifies them as honour roll students locally provincially

We look forward to seeing everyone at the School Council elections on October 5 or at our next Council meeting, with the newly-elected Council in place, on October 18.

2022-23 School Council Election: The election will take place via Zoom at 7PM on Wednesday, October 5. We will first elect Parent Members followed by the election of the Officers. Per the Malvern by-laws, Council is able to have up to 30 Parent Members who have voting rights. Submit your <u>self-nomination form</u> by October 3 at 4:00 p.m. **IMPORTANT:** You do not need to be a voting member of Council to attend Council meetings.

Parent Members (up to 30 members)

Any current parent/guardian is welcome to join School Council as a parent member. If you wish to be able to vote on issues such as budget, you must submit the <u>self-nomination</u> <u>form</u> **no later than Sunday, October 2**. Per the by-laws, Malvern School Council can have up to 30 parent members who are expected to attend all Council meetings. If a parent member misses more than two meetings, their voting privileges may be revoked.

School Council Officers

Once the voting Parent Members of Council have been elected, Officers will then be elected by the new Council. These are the Officer positions available – all can have a maximum of 2 people in that position. 2021/22 Officers were as follows: Angie Law (Chair), Adrienne Scott (Secretary), Nancy Mallins (Chair).

Chair: The Chair is an elected position within the Council and must be a parent or parents who are not employed by the School Board. It is strongly recommended that this position be filled by someone who has previously been an Officer of Malvern School Council. In addition to performing the same duties as other council members, the Chair is also responsible for: Arranging/organizing meetings, Preparing agendas, Chairing Council meetings, Facilitating resolution of conflict, Ensuring the minutes of the Council are recorded and maintained, Participating as ex-officio members of all committees established by the Council, Communicating with the Principal on behalf of the School Council, Providing input on behalf of the Council on issues related to Principal selection, classroom size, setting education priorities, school improvement plan for examples

Secretary: The Secretary is an elected position within the Council and must be a parent or parents who are not employed by the School Board. In addition to performing the same duties as other Council members, the Secretary is primarily responsible for recording attendance and minutes at Council meetings. The Secretary will work collaboratively with the School Chair to distribute meeting minutes and materials; manage email distribution lists and manage voting as needed.

Treasurer: The Treasurer will track and account for all School Council related expenditures and report back to the School Council at monthly meetings and submit the PSAB report at the end of the school year. Strong accountability, record keeping, and accounting skills are required for this position.

School Council Committee Volunteers Needed!

There are many opportunities to participate in the activities of Malvern School Council! Volunteers are needed for these committees or roles:

Parent Engagement Committee

Provides leadership on initiatives that engage, involve and welcome parents/families within our school. This may include surveying parents to identify engagement needs, exploring ways to involve parents in their child's learning and the school community, submitting relevant grant(s) (i.e., Parent Reaching Out Grant).

Eco Committee

Provides leadership on environmental initiatives within the school.

Social Justice and Safe & Caring Committee

Works closely with the School and Student Council to determine social justice initiatives and ways that School Council can collaborate and contribute to those initiatives. A parent representative from this committee will also be a member of the School's Caring and Safe School's Committee.

Fundraising Committee

Responsible for creating the fundraising plan for the year based on priorities identified by the school and Malvern families and overseeing and/or providing guidance to all fundraising initiatives.

Ward Representatives

Responsible for attending Ward meetings and reporting back each month to Council on highlights from those meetings.


PHYSICS PHUN!




BALL HOCKEY BUDDIES!
