MALVERN'S SOCIAL JUSTICE CLUB LEADS A VIGIL FOR MMIW

November was Indigenous Education Month, and Clara Dabed, Lucy Carpenter, Jessica Law and Hannah Riley, student leaders of the Social Justice Club, organized a educational campaign featuring daily announcements that highlighted different Indigenous communities, including their histories and culture.

The campaign culminated in a silent vigil on Friday. While students silently lined the hallways with their class and teacher, a procession of students silently walked through the entire school, carrying posters honouring Indigenous community and raising awareness of injustices.

Over the PA system, a 15 minute reading provided information about the history of colonization in Canada, the residential school system, and the names of missing and murdered Indigenous Women.

Their message was a powerful one as they challenged the Malvern community to speak out, speak up, and take action, not just during the Month of November, but at all times, and for all forms of discrimination, hate and injustice.

STUDENT VACCINATION REQUIREMENT & WINTER SPORTS

The TDSB has made a decision to require all students aged 12+ to be fully vaccinated to participate in winter sports (e.g. basketball, ice hockey, swimming, etc.) that involve competition between schools, mixing of students and travel to other TDSB schools and/or external venues.

For students participating in sports that occur only within their school and only with students from their school, vaccination is recommended but not required at this time.

This decision is consistent with recommendations from Toronto Public Health and has been made with the health and safety of students and staff in mind, as getting vaccinated helps ensure strong protection against COVID-19. The TDSB decision also follows other school boards that require student vaccination to participate in sports. Additionally, many sports competitions and finals take place at facilities in Toronto where a vaccine mandate is already in place. In these cases, all students are required to show proof of vaccination to enter the building and would not be able to access the facility to participate if unvaccinated.

Students will be required to upload proof of vaccination to the Service Now App (see instructions below) to participate on any inter-school team. In rare cases where a student is unable to be vaccinated, we will work with Toronto Public Health and staff to develop a process to support these students so they can safely participate where possible.





MID-SEMESTER 1 CREDIT RESCUE

On November 5 and November 10, 2021, over 400 students were invited to participate in Credit Rescue. Credit Rescue is a TDSB early intervention initiative to support student achievement. The goal of Mid-Semester 1 Credit Rescue was to enable students and educators to engage in Credit Rescue activities and to plan for continued support throughout the semester.

We are excited to share some Credit Rescue success statistics with you!

- ♦ 453 invitations were sent
- 75% of the students who received invitations attended Credit Rescue
- Only 162 students had a mark of below 50% on their mid-term report cards
- ♦ The average mark increase following Credit Rescue was 6%
- 88% of the students who attended Credit Rescue had a mark increase!

Credit Rescue will occur at the end of Semester 1 on Friday, January 28, Monday January 29th and Tuesday February 1.





During the months of November and December Ms. Collura's and Ms. Graham's classes will be participating in the Amnesty International Write for Rights letter writing campaign.


Every year on December 10th, Amnesty International celebrates Human Rights Day with this large event and this year, Malvern

MINISTRY ANNOUNCES A CHANGE TO REGULAR SEMESTERS!

It's the announcement that many of us have been waiting and hoping for: a return to 75 minute classes, like the "good ol' days!".

While the TDSB is busy with all the logistics, a possible shift to a the new (old) school schedule leaves us with questions:

- Will lunch be longer than 40 min?
- ♦ When will the school day start and end?
- Will the AM and/or PM classes "flip" from one day to the next?
- Will every school in the TDSB follow the same schedule?

Unfortunately, we don't have answers just yet.

We do know that we have to maintain 75 minutes/class, plus travel time (5 min the AM; 5 min in the PM), and then perhaps a longer lunch period.



So the school day will definitely be longer that its current 9:00 am to 2:45 pm, but at least the periods will be shorter!

Coding and computational thinking are essential skills for students in nearly all subject areas. This year, the revised grade 9 math curriculum includes "coding" expectations and this trend will likely continue in other subjects as the Ministry updates the curriculum.



Grade 9 teachers have been encouraged to spend an hour working on some curriculum-related (but fun!) coding challenges.

HAUDENOSAUNEE CONFEDERACY

The Haudenosaunee Confederacy is also referred to as Iroquois or Six Nations since it is made up of 6 Nations; the Seneca, Cayuga, Oneida, Onondaga, Mohawk and Tuscarora. There is a reserve outside of Brantford, Ontario called Six Nations of the Grand River where all six members of the Haudenosaunee are represented. They lived in stockaded villages of hundreds of people. The social structure was based on the descendants of an individual woman; female members lived together with their partners in a single longhouse. A village could have a few small longhouses to as many as 50.

Among the Haudenosaunee are groups of people who come together as families called clans. As a matrilineal society, each clan is linked by a common female ancestor with women possessing a leadership role within the clan; family names and clans could only be passed down from a mother to their child. For example, if a man belonging to the turtle clan were to marry a woman of the wolf clan, the children would be of the wolf clan.

In Haudenosaunee society each member has their own family. A mother, father and brothers and sisters. But everyone else belonging to the same clan is also considered an extended family. This system was especially helpful when traveling from nation to nation as people would search out members of their same clan who would then provide food and shelter and care for them as part of their family.

The clans are represented by birds and animals and are divided into the three elements: water, land and air.

The Haudenosaunee languages belong to a family of 16 North American languages spoken around Canada and the United States. For most languages the number of fluent speakers has decreased, but individual nations are working to restore them. The Mohawk language is the healthiest with 3000 fluent speakers spread out in Canada and the United States.

Because the Haudenosaunee believe in preserving the traditions for those that will follow, great efforts are being taken to carry on the culture and language so it will be enjoyed for generations to come.

The Haudenosaunee community has many cherished and special traditions. One of these includes the snow snake. During the winter, this exciting game is played in Haudenosaunee communities, and traditionally follows the men's arrival back from their annual hunting trip. The game tests people's strength and athletic, using the "snow snakes" which are handcrafted from a flattened carved piece of wood. Today, its purpose is to bring community together and remember traditions. Many Haudenosaunee peoples from around Canada gather for snow snake games with yummy food, music and plenty of enjoyment.

WENDAT CONFEDERACY

The Wyandot people or Wendat, also called the

Huron, are Peoples of North America that speak Iroquoian and who emerged as a tribe around the north shore of Lake Ontario. The name Wendat means "population of the island".

Pre-colonialism, the population was prospering and growing but around the 17th century the plagues brought by the colonizers caused the numbers of the Wendat people to significantly decrease from 20,000 people in Canada only to 9,000. Today their total population in both the United States and Canada is 21 000.

According to the Huron-Wendat oral tradition, the customary territory of the Huron-Wendat Nation, the Nionwentsïo, means "our magnificent land" in Iroquoian. It lies along the north and south shores of the St. Lawrence River, between the Saint-Maurice River and the Saguenay River.

The culture of the Wendat peoples is rich in language, social life, cooking and clans. Traditionally, Wendat peoples lived somewhere between 18-25 villages with around 3000 people. The Wendat peoples were farmers, bringing in their economy of corn, beans, squash and fish. A popular dish called "Sagamite" (Corn soup) was made with corn, meat, fish, and squash.

There were eight Wendat clans. Each of the clans were matrilineal, Each clan was identified by their mystical ancestors including the Bear, Deer, Turtle, Beaver, Wolf, Loon/Sturgeon, Hawk and Fox. Strength and passion was built in each of the clans so that they built a sense of community and trust within them. Another important aspect to the Wendat culture is their language, native to the Wendats, the Iroquois language.

Colonization threatened to bring the Iroquois language to extinction and it has been at risk of extinction, until recently when Wendat peoples have revitalized it through education and initiatives.

MÉTIS PEOPLE

The Métis people's culture is filled with dancing, artistic abilities, survival skills and music. They dance to fast-paced songs, hunt for food and made floral motif beads. Although the tradition of adding floral motifs to the clothing of their loved ones has since been discontinued.

The Métis people originated when Scottish and French fur traders married Aboriginal women back in the 1700s. The descendants that followed formed their culture, and traditions. Keeping up with their ancestors, the Métis people kept the tradition of trading furs. Their homeland is spread across multiple provinces such as Manitoba, Saskatchewan, Alberta, as well as parts of British Columbia, Ontario, northern United States and Northwest territories.

Historically the Métis people have been doing activities such as fishing, hunting, trapping and trading furs. Those who live in more rural areas are consuming more traditional foods than those who live in more urban places. Traditional foods are some sort of animal caught while

hunting or fishing, bannock and berries. The Métis people were very spiritual, however most would practice a folk version of Catholicism.

The Métis peoples' songs are very upbeat and their dancing style is very fast-paced. For example, the "Red River Jig" is a signature fiddle tune and dance that the métis people enjoy. Traditional clothing is very colourful and has been decorated with quill work, embroidery and floral motifs in beads. Although over the years this tradition has died because of institutional mislabelling that have misnamed them "Plains Cree" or "Ojibwa".

INUIT PEOPLES

The Inuit culture follows animism and shamanism, where spiritual beings/healers talk and reason with spirits. In Inuit culture there are no specific figures that have an important role in the culture and there are no punishments in their beliefs. The culture is focused on traditional stories, rituals and cautionary tales that warn about the dangers of the harsh Arctic climate.

Inuit communities can be found in the Arctic, Northwest Territories, Labrador, Quebec and in the northern part of Alaska. The word Inuit comes from the Inuktitut language and it means "the people." Since they were mostly found in the Arctic Tundra, they've had to deal with harsh, cold climates. To do so they have made parkas and other clothing made out of animal skin and fur. They are a nomadic so they would move from place to place, hunting and using the land's resources.

The ceremonies were and still are a very sacred part of Inuit traditions. They helped Inuit peoples practice their beliefs and religion. The main instrument used was a special drum, made out of walrus stomach and bladder, and caribou skin over a wooden hoop. Drum dances took place in igloos where around 60 people would gather and there would be singing, dancing and ancient story-telling. After a large hunt a "bladder dance" would be performed as they believed the soul of an animal was in the bladder and would put it back in sea to rebirth it's soul.
