# What are the differences between colleges and universities?

- Generally, colleges offer one year certificates, two year diplomas, three
  year advanced diplomas, four year degrees in applied areas of study and
  one year graduate certificate programs for students who have completed
  a diploma or degree.
- Colleges also offer the in-school portion of apprenticeship training programs and collaborate with the Ontario Ministry of Training Colleges and Universities to offer specially designed second career training opportunities for adults.
- Universities offer Bachelor's degrees and first professional degrees, as well as graduate programs leading to Master's degrees and Doctorates.
- Some colleges and universities have developed collaborative programs, also called joint or integrated programs, where students study at both institutions either sequentially or concurrently.
- Private career colleges also offer vocational training in many communities.
