#### Principal's Message

We have a new procedure with our beginning of the year forms – they are now online. The first year of any change is always a bit of a challenge, if you haven't already submitted the forms online, please be on the lookout for paper copies being sent home with your child(ren). We are always concerned about allergies so if your child has an allergy that we should be aware of please make sure the classroom teacher is aware of it along with filling out the forms.

There is one part of the form that causes some people some confusion – Use of Personal Email and Anti–Spam Legislation. We ask for your email and then because of anti–spam legislation we have to ask your permission to use is be– cause many of our messages that we send include some kind of sale of something (like school pictures, pizza) or fundraising (think of this message we are raising money for Terry Fox). If you say no then the only email list you end up being on is for attendance. If you would like to receive emails from the school then you have to say yes so that you can go on that list. We only send emails related to what is going on at school that will often include fundraising events.

Please ensure that Kimberly in the office has your most up to date contact information. Also please call the school at any hour if your child is going to be away especially as we head into cold and flu season – our answering machine is always on. We do not encourage you to email Kimberly that your child will be away because if she is away no one can read her email.

Our nutrition program has started whereby students are offered a healthy snack in the morning. We do get some funding for the program and we ask parents to contribute- we suggest \$10.00 a month or \$50.00 for the first half of the year. All children participate in the snack program. There are also some after school programs that are offered by outside organizations but use rooms at Niagara. These programs will have a fee. The Board does offer the International Languages program of Mandarin and Spanish here on Thursdays. Registration was last Thursday but if you're still interested you can contact TDSB Continuing Education at: 416–338–4100 and inquire about International Languages registration for your child. The classes are on Thursdays after school and there is a fee of \$20.00.

As you can see there is a lot happening at Niagara and we are looking forward to a great year of learning for our students!

In recent years, TDSB staff has been working closely with the City of Toronto's Transportation Services, Toronto Public Health and other community partners to improve road safety for school aged children and youth in the City of Toronto. In 2017, the TDSB launched its Traffic Safety Program (TSP) which helps schools identify travel issues and develop workable solutions. The TSP program aligns with the City of Toronto's Vision Zero Road Safety Plan – a plan aimed to reduce the number of traffic-related deaths and serious injuries on Toronto's roads.

## Lockdown and Fire Drills

At the beginning of each school year, staff and students prepare for the year ahead by establishing the foundations for a successful year. One of the ways we know we can help students be successful is to create a safe environment in which to learn. Though no one ever wants to see an emergency happen at a school, it's important for school staff to be equipped to deal with those situations, should these occur.

The safety of students and staff is a top priority at our school and to that end, as with all emergency drills, it is essential that we are prepared and understand the importance of procedures that will help ensure the safety of everyone in our school.

The TDSB has taken steps to ensure your child's safety while in school. Each school has developed emergency preparedness plans that include steps staff will take in the event of an emergency, how staff will get students away from possible dangers, and how students' families will be contacted.

One aspect of emergency preparedness is the lockdown and fire drill. All schools are required to conduct a minimum of two lockdown drills and six fire drills each school year. Lockdown drills, like fire drills, are an essential component to ensuring student and staff safety. It is important that all staff and students are prepared and know how to respond in cases of emergencies. The drills last approximately 5 minutes and ensure plans are effective and can also systematically identify any safety concerns.

Communication is also very important in any emergency situation. The emergency contact information kept on file is important in helping this happen. Please make sure our office staff have the most up to date contact information, in the event of any changes/updates.
