






The Grade 11 Physics students completed their culminating projects on building and analyzing the physics behind roller coasters and the Grade 12



Physics students are currently finishing a creative assignment on Modern Physics which encompasses topics from Quantum computing and cryptography to Relativity.



# **Cooperative Education Department**

We would like to WELCOME teachers, Mrs. Brennan and Mr. Oppenheimer. They joined and are working alongside Ms. Fimis and Mr. Moro in the Cooperative Education Department. STRONGER...TOGETHER, we will continue to build a DYNAMIC Experiential Learning program with a wide range of rich and valuable work placements for all students!

This past semester, students from the Cooperative Education Department benefited from having amazing working experiences, including working with: the Canadian Government Defence Department (INFORMATION TECHNOLOGY), Hospital for Sick Children (TRANSPLANT), Humber River Regional (ENDOSCOPY), Sunnybrook (TRAUMA), Bank of Montreal Nesbitt Burns (INVESTMENTS), Veterinary, York University (ENGINEERING), Ontario Science Centre (LABORATORY ASSISTANT), working with teachers in our local elementary schools (EDUCATION) Retail (GARAGE, GAP), Culinary (MOXIES), Dentistry, and Automotive Technician. Second semester is already gearing up with some amazing placements in Film, Banking, Policing, Automotive, Hospital Medicine, and Accelerated OYAP Construction.

Students looking at careers in Construction from Civil Engineering to Trades were engaged in the 4 credit all day CTEP, Construction Trades Exploration Program. Students had an opportunity to work on construction sites. Each student was able to spend one week with every trade including management on the site. Some of the trades included Carpentry, Electrical, Plumbing, Sheetmetal, Drywall, Tiling, Concrete, and Bricklaying. Some of the builders included Tridel, Tucker, Daniels, Menkes, Accel, AspenRidge, Fram, TMG Builders, Buttcon, Mattamy, Skygrid. CTEP Students went on field trips to a number of union training centers such as Local 46 Plumbing, Local 353 Electrical, Local 506 Labourers, Local 183 Construction Craft Worker, Bricklaying, Local 285 Sheetmetal, Hydro One Lineman, and Local 27 Carpentry.

Northview Heights hosted the 12<sup>th</sup> Annual CTEP Construction Trades Exploration Program advisory meeting in January. Builders, union representatives, construction associations, parents and students attended Northview Heights to provide insight/future direction about the CTEP program. All of the guests were impressed with the CTEP students and Northview Heights.

Here is a testimonial from two of our students:

This past semester we had the opportunity of obtaining a co-op placement at York University. We are both SHSM ICT students who are interested in Computer Engineering. We had the pleasure of working with Professor Jenkin of the Faculty of Engineering at York University. Our project for the semester was to develop a prototype 3D visualization tool that would eventually allow emergency services personnel to map out the city digitally. Users will be able to view the best path and possibilities for their vehicles and personnel in order to better coordinate their current efforts and learn from previous ones. Over the course of the semester we learned many programming skills including working with a game engine called Unity, 3D modelling in Sketch Up, and developing for Virtual Reality equipment with the Oculus Rift. This experience has inspired us to use our skills in programming to try and develop a strategy based computer game and learned a lot of computer skills and job skills. We are very grateful for the co-op program and Professor Jenkins mentorship over the past semester.

Each month, students in the GLN4O9 course have an opportunity to visit a workplace and explore the values, learning styles and skills needed to pursue a career in a number of different industries. Here, students had the opportunity to SPIN at a community centre and learn about a career in Fitness Management and Training. Cathy Kenopic, General Manager, Prosserman JCC and Wilson Valle Echaverry, SPIN Instructor, give our kinesthetic learners a chance to experience this first hand.

We continued to explore careers in our community and practice essential skills by visiting a Toronto Job Fair and other workplaces, including the Police Station, Baycrest and Sunnybrook Health Science Centre. Students enjoyed face-to-face meetings, listening and talking with employees in security, community and support services, health sciences and management.



We ended the season with a one-of-a-kind field trip to Etobicoke's CJ Skateboard Park and School to inspire and engage our students with different abilities. Jay Mandarino, the owner of the skatepark, philanthropist and motivational speaker also came to our school to speak to all our students about using sport to instill a sense of empowerment. Living with ADHD and dyslexia himself, he talked about the value of self confidence and self-esteem and shared strategies on how to turn life challenges into opportunities.

The performance of *Still Falling*, presented by Young People's Theater was a one woman show about the difference between teenage angst and mental illness. Students had the following comments about the show:

"Having the opportunity to see professional theatre always changes in student's perspective about their own choices in class. This was clearly demonstrated when it was time for culminating activities as students explored themes such as greed, betrayal, body image and bullying. These photos illustrate some of the moments they created."

In grade 9 ESL Drama this semester, students had the opportunity to learn about self-exploration, theatrical staging, movement, script writing and choral work. We put on two in-class productions including our "Twisted Fairy Tales" and "Emotions". We invited the Day Care to attend the "Twisted Fairy Tales" production and received great feedback! For "Emotions" the class had to choose various emotions and dive deep into the concepts and ideas behind them. Why do we feel what we do? What happens to us when we go through stressful/happy/sad moments in our lives? Students then made creative collective pieces based on their own exploration of their chosen emotion.



#### Semester One in English: Exploring Media Skills


