Community Market - we hosted a fresh fruit and vegetable market for Unison Health. Students were really impressed with the quality of the food; it spurred many conversations about food insecurity and the quality of food in certain grocery stores. Many community members attended as well. In total 225 people received food from this event.

Sept 30 - Orange Shirt Day. First National Truth and Reconciliation Day. Students, led by Mitch and Ms. Hanson in the arts department led some learning on Orange Shirt Day. Art installations capturing student's feelings and learning were placed outside the front of the school as well as in several areas around the school. Students also sold buttons that they made and the proceeds went to an Indigenous children's charity. Many community members also stopped to read and observe what the students did. Many even purchased a button.

Vaccinations - to date 25% of students have declared that they are fully vaccinated on the TDSB health pass app or website. Anecdotally I believe that our vaccination rate is much much higher. Students and families have been sent the instructions to upload vaccination receipts. Having your child's vaccination status uploaded to the health pass will mean that these students do not have to isolate in case of a positive case in class. Students who are not vaccinated or have not disclosed their status to the app will be asked to stay home and isolate if there is a close contact for them identified.

OSSLT resumes this year. It is now online during English class time. Students will need 3 sessions 1 to learn the software and complete a short practice test. 2 more, 1 for each booklet. Students must write at school. Students in grade 10, 11 and non-graduating 12s will need to successfully complete this test to graduate. Graduates have had this test waived. Exact schedules will be shared by English teachers.

Credit Rescue Days - again this year there will not be formal exams. Similar to last year the 10 exam days will be spread throughout the year to support students in danger of failing their courses. 2 days will be at mid-term and 3 days at the end of each semester. Attendance will be recorded, but only those students who are in need of extra support must attend. Students who are currently progressing well can use this time to review and consolidate their learning. If students want to attend that school to independently review their work under the supervision of a teacher, they may but no new material will be taught.

# Semester 2

Today is the deadline to switch from in-person to online or vice versa for semester 2. Students will not be able to switch after this time as a great deal of planning and sharing of students with other schools will need to happen to make online learning possible. We are still waiting on approval from Toronto Public Health to return to a 4 period a day schedule which we support and feel will mitigate some of the challenges students are having with the timetable. We are also very hopeful (and have been advocating for) a return to a 60-minute lunch which will allow us to offer more lunch time activities.

# **Sports**

We are expecting to return to our usual full complement of inter-school sports for the winter sports season. Final details and information on try-outs will be available in the new year. Students should speak with a PE teacher or listen to announcements for details. Thus far we have been offering only

intramural sports that don't involve travel or other schools. The change to mandatory vaccinations for student athletes will allow a safer return to interschool sports for students and coaches.

# School Improvement Plan

During the November PD Day VP Taiwo led the staff in activities to finalize and then work on our School Improvement Plan. Our goals have been similar for the past few years as we work to ensure we are meeting our students' needs.

#### **EQAO**

Students taking English this semester completed their online OSSLT in November. Graduating students were exempted from writing the test. Students who are currently in grade 9 math, in person, will take their online math EQAO by the end of semester 1 and the remainder will write at the end of semester 2. Students who are participating online will be offered the opportunity to come to school to complete this assessment. If you have a child in grade 9 more information will follow closer to the administration date. Connect with your child's math teacher or VP Taiwo for more details.

### Credit Rescue

# Semester System

- Like the champions Oakwood students are they have adjusted quickly to the 4 periods a day schedule
- Next year all schools will remain on the semester system
- Families will be given the choice to enroll in a separate virtual school if they want to continue to learn from home.

# Projected enrollment

- 352.5 (98 in grade 9)
- Increase of 8 students
- DD enrollment remains the same

# Course selection and staffing process

- Course selection closed on Friday, guidance will now approve and check for errors
- Over the March Break the data will be uploaded into our new Student Information System called PowerSchool
- Next steps are usually to receive our staff allocation right after March break and then go through
  the staffing process that see us create a very rough outline of courses, we will offer based on
  student choice and then match that up with our staff allocation
- MOE declared a few weeks ago that school boards must have a stand-alone virtual school, which is a welcome relief for staff that have been managing the hybrid virtual classes this year. However, it will likely impact our staffing levels and the time it takes to complete the staffing process as even though our projected enrollment has slightly increased the board now has to staff an entirely new school. This will impact all schools and all schools are expected to lose teachers to VS.
- Families should have received info about VS today

#### Public Health info and rapid tests

- Rapid tests are available to any staff or students who have used theirs due to being symptomatic
- We share our allocation with daycare (added layer of protection for our students)
- While the COVID positivity numbers are widely accepted to be low due to lack of testing, the
  rates are still on a 5-week decline. Hospitalizations, ICU utilization and fatalities also continue
  to decline
- Cell Phone data shows that people are returning to normal activities and going out again to levels similar to pre-Omicron, in fact the same as mid-March 2021
- TPH is resuming city clinics for other vaccinations, a package will be sent to parents this week
- 12 17 year olds are still among the highest vaccinated age groups (94%) in the city (with the
  exception of booster shots due to age restrictions). Only 18 29 are higher. Lowest age groups
  are 5 11 (56%) and 45 49 (83%))
