Traditional Greek music was also enjoyed and it was a fun, sensory-filled afternoon for all.















African Heritage Month (Irene T.)

The last Friday in February, room 6 held their "Friday Activity" for the whole school. Students celebrated African Heritage Month by taking part in five interactive activities stationed throughout the school. Each station was prepared to engage students in learning about African culture. Students took part in participating in tropical smoothie making, creating beaded necklaces, making Kente cloth, exploring the sensory table with smells of different spices and the textures of animal pelts and cloths, and making maracas and drums out of recyclable materials.





The morning activity started with our wonderful MC Melissa saying a few words about African heritage history. Favourite Recipe the kids make: Chocolate Chip Cookies

Preheat oven to 350 degrees F (175 degrees C).

1 cup butter

1 cup white sugar

1 cup brown sugar

Cream together the butter and sugar until smooth.

2 eggs

2 teaspoons vanilla extract

Beat in the eggs and vanilla.

1 teaspoon baking soda

1/2 teaspoon salt

3 cups all-purpose flour

2 cups chocolate chips

Mix it all up!

Place golf ball size globs onto a cookie sheet.

Bake for about 10 minutes in the preheated oven, or until edges are nicely browned.

One of our favorites was the enlarged version of "The Very Hungry Caterpillar" since our focus on books was spring time. Afterwards, students enjoyed interactive play with sensory driven activities similar to KidSpark from the Science Centre. We also enjoyed lunch in the cafeteria and walked around Mel-Lastman Square.





Superstore Grocery Shopping Field Trip - Room 6 made a list of groceries needed to make a pizza with the integration students from Bedford Park P.S. We went from isle to isle and found the ingredients we needed. Students explored the different food categories and experienced how to self-check out items and pay for them. Back in class students had a great time rolling the pizza dough, spreading the tomato sauce on the dough, cutting the green peppers and mushrooms, and shredding the cheese to spread on the pizza.
