#### Nowrouz Celebration (Fariba N-Z)

On Monday March 27, 2017, we celebrated the Persian New Year-Nowrouz (starting at March 20<sup>th</sup>, 2017). We kicked off the celebrations with a special lunch of traditional Persian food. The students joined together in the gym to help create a special art display. Each student made their own unique fish which were then displayed in a large tank on the wall. This symbolized "Life within Life." Afterwards there was a video presentation exploring Nowrouz and the Haft-Seen table. A large table was set up for students to touch and smell the special components of the table followed by traditional dances.







"We're Off to See the Wizard!" ( Gloria G.)

The Wizard of Oz, a musical production, was a collaborative effort between the students from Park Lane and Bedford Park. Students from Mrs. Paterson's class narrated the entire story, while Mr. Bonin's class performed with actions, dance and sign language. Park Lane students were featured with movement, film and percussion instruments – all to enhance the story!





Park Lane students played a role in the cast and were dressed in the appropriate costumes. There were many characters on stage – Dorothy, Toto, Auntie Em, Uncle Henry, Scarecrow, Tin Man and Lion, Glinda, Guard, Wicked Witch and, of course, the Wizard.Together with visual props (a rainbow, yellow brick road and a gigantic hot air balloon) the story was told how Dorothy and her friends succeeded in their mission to find the brains, the heart, the courage, and the way home back to Kansas, for which they had each been searching. Theatrically speaking, what an amazing opportunity for Park Lane students to share the stage with their Bedford Park friends!



#### African Heritage Month "We Are One" (Hibo S. & Maria L.)

March is African Heritage month and this year's theme was, "We Are One." This theme was reflected through the collaboration of staff and students coming together to create an African crafted handprint quilt in the shape of Africa. This was done by the students pressing their own handprint into the quilt and filling each of the countries with their handprints.

Once the quilt was assembled and showcased on the gym wall, one could clearly see Africa's diverse and robust countries, which were represented through the different coloured handprints. The colours seamlessly flowed together to become one continent, one people, thus highlighting the theme, "We Are One." Classes also made their own scrapbook page, in which each page is reflective of Africa's many cultural characteristics. Some of the themes included, Caribbean musical instruments, Caribbean traditional clothing, African jewelry, Caribbean cooking spices, African landscape and hand art. The classes came together to present and submit their pages, which were then combined together to create an African Heritage Scrapbook.

Our African celebration continued through a variety of activities following the art presentations. A power point slide was shown to educate staff and students about different tourist destination in Africa, traditional Caribbean dance and the array of African and Caribbean cuisine. The power point also illustrated the beauty and diversity of Canada and the part the courageous Canadian activists that played an important role in changing the course of Black History. A few of these activists include Viola Desmond, Michelle Jean and Harriet Tubeman (Honorary Canadian).



Staff and students were then able to get up on their feet and dance to the rhythms of steel pan Caribbean music as played by our musical guest, Vincent T. African people feel that music is a powerful instrument that can bring people together as well as bring happiness to their lives. Africans use music as a way to communicate through drum beats. When people hear the drum beats far in the distance, they know that there is a celebration happening somewhere, they then will get up and follow the sounds. In this way, the staff and students at Park Lane were able to hear and follow the Caribbean beats!

Looking around the gym, it was fun to see the many students and staff dressed in traditional African clothing provided by the Eresto family! Joy's mom Jacob played an important role in our celebration as he performed the Lion – Simba.

Our celebration came to an end by staff members enjoying the assortment of African and Caribbean dishes. These dishes were made by the African Heritage committee which was a wonderful example of the diversity and multiculturalism here at Park Lane. The committee would also like to extend a thank you to the many staff members who also supported and contributed to the preparation and execution of our event.

Staff and students at Park Lane always welcome a fun, enjoyable and creative way to gain new learning experiences; the African Heritage Celebration provides just that! The students were able to feel the different textures, smells and sounds of Africa while creating their scrape book pages, the music came alive in the gym while dancing to the different rhythms and some of the students were able to taste the various flavours of Africa! We look forward to next year...until then hakuna matata!
