
Principal's Corner

School Events

Watershed on Wheels (7ina 7.)

In November, room two had their monthly activity where they invited the Watershed On Wheels program to Park Lane. This is a free community outreach program provided by the Toronto Regional Conservation Authority that ties in with our school's eco-initiatives. The presentation topic was "Needs of Living Things" where activities focused on animals using their five senses to survive in the wilderness. Students were divided into 3 small groups to maximize their time with the presenter. Activities included smelling flowers, hearing bird calls, feeling animal pelts, touching stuffed birds and watching a music video of the "Green Grass Goes All Around" song. Students learned the concept of habitat through dramatizations and dress up. There were costumes of birds and bees that students took turns wearing. The birds would take turns flapping their wings and sitting on a nest (brown bean bag chair). Students that wore the bee costumes would buzz around the gym to various locations to forage for food from flowers, go into a huge tunnel for shelter and taste a bee product (honey).











Remembrance Day (Debbie Y.)

On Friday November 10th, 2017 both staff and students gathered in the gym to hold a Remembrance Day ceremony.

Before the assembly took place two local mounted police came to visit the school. Students had a chance to take pictures and touch the horses.



Each class then took turns presenting about an animal that was significant during the war. The ceremony also included songs, poems and placing a poppy on a mural.



This mural was later picked up from the local legion, as well as the money that was collected from the poppies.

Experiential Learning Program (Dave C.)

On Friday, November 24, we began an in school work program for a selected group of students. The program consists of Recycling and Green Bin collection on Days 1, 3 and 5. Work hours are from 1:30 to 2:00pm, whereby students, along with his/her supervisor, travel from classroom to classroom collecting bins. To simulate a work environment, students sign in and punch out for their work shift, and they wear a green TDSB t-shirt to be identified as a worker.

The purpose of this program is to simulate a work environment to prepare for future community opportunities. This pilot project will expand to greater tasks which will involve a greater number of our students.
