EQAO Information

Our 2018-2019 scores in EQAO increased in all areas for Grade 3 and for Grade 6. Please see the chart below for results:

	Grade 3	Grade 6
Reading	82% (+23%)	88% (+2%)
Writing	74% (+15%)	90% (+3%)
Mathematics	69% (+28%)	55% (+1%)

Overall observations and implications include:

Reading

Grade 3 - overall results are good

Challenges: Implicit/Making Connections

- Vocabulary building is needed
- Using schema, giving an opinion, using text to make meaning of unknown words
- Grade 6 overall results are good

Challenges: Implicit/Making Connections

- using schema, give one's opinion
- students struggle when answers are not directly in the text

Writing

Grade 3 - overall results are good

Challenges: organizing information

• Organizing writing, drafting and revising writing, vocabulary knowledge, expand on the topic in their answer, editing and proofreading

Grade 6 Writing - overall results are good

- Challenges:
 - Topic development and open response questions

Mathematics

Challenges for Grade 3 and 6:

- The language in math word problems (e.g., greatest to smallest; how many taller), vocabulary (e.g., prime number)
- Comparative work: e.g., an ordering question
- Manipulatives: e.g., to visualize objects spatially from different angles, represent objects with linked cubes
- Reinforce concepts cross-curricularly: e.g., Geometry and 3D art or perspective in art
- Multi-step word problems go back and check that you answered all parts and did all the steps
- More practice needed with application and thinking related exercises as opposed to just knowledge and understanding
- Provide practice with word problems with no context of which unit the word problem is from

We are working with staff and our Superintendent to draft our School Improvement Plan from this data and plan staff professional learning for the year.

Math Corner

Many parents wonder how they can support their children in Math. Teachers frequently hear comments that parents have difficulty since much of the work is different from the math they learned in school. Our school data suggests that most students do very well with basic computation but continue to struggle with multi-step problems. This is an area where parents can help. Below is a sample question from grade six EQAO with prompts/steps that can be used to support your child's thinking as they work through this type of problem.

These types of questions can be intimidating for students, but the more they practise them, the more confidence they will build.

Andrew blinks his eyes about 3 times per minute when he is awake. He is awake approximately 14 hours per day. Does he blink his eyes more than 1 000 000 times in one year? Justify your answer.

What is being asked in this question? Does he blink his eyes more than 1 000 000 times in one year? What do you know already? He blinks 3 times per minute for 14 hours per day.

What other information do you need to know to answer this question? How many times does he blink in one day? How many minutes per hour? How many days per year?

What is your first step? How many times does he blink per hour? 3 times per minute multiplied by 60 minutes per hour.

Have you justified your answer? Did you show all of your work? Ms. Milford-Warren

Reading Activity – Analyzing Story Characters to Improve Reading Comprehension

A **character** is a person, animal or even a thing that plays an important part of a story. Characters think, feel, talk and act in stories.

When students analyze the thoughts, feelings, words and actions of characters, they deepen their understanding of a story.

<u>For younger students:</u> Read a-loud any picture book and use prompts to "talk about" their favourite character. <u>For older students</u>: Use prompts to discuss a story or chapter book that your child is currently reading and ask them to give the reasons for their answers.

Describe how the character feels. How do you know that? e.g. response, "Marigold is sad. I know that because in the picture she has a frown and is crossing her arms". or "Marigold is angry. I know that because it says that she suddenly threw her favourite toy on the ground and marched away." Ms. Lewis

Mini Master Plan

Character Education – November Focus is Empathy

Character Development is about helping our children to learn and to practice character attributes which will help them not only do their best but also be their best. November's Character Education focus is on "empathy," the ability to understand and share in the feelings of others. At Pleasant we think of empathy as being able to put yourself in someone's shoes and trying to understand issues from another person's point of view, even though we may not agree with them. We demonstrate empathy when we listen with full attention and look for the feelings behind the words and body language.

Construction Site to the West of Pleasant PS/Peckham Centre

There is activity to the west of Pleasant PS/Peckham Centre but construction is not underway. The site is currently being used for construction management and storage for Trisan Construction, who has a contract with the City for road repairs in the area. Trisan Construction will be using the site from now until January 2020, between 7am to 7pm. The site will be accessed throughout the day, generally by pick-up trucks and a trailer.

Public Consultations – Optional Attendance and Secondary Program Review

Public consultations will begin in November on a draft revised Optional Attendance policy and as part of the Secondary Program Review.

The Optional Attendance policy is being reviewed to ensure consistency with the TDSB's Mission, Values and Goals Policy, the Equity Policy and the Board's Multi-Year Strategic Plan. The Optional Attendance policy has not been fully reviewed since 1998 when the TDSB was created.

We are also holding consultations as part of the Secondary Program Review. In June 2019, the Board of Trustees approved the action plan outlined in the Secondary Program Review report. This report presented the rationale for a

comprehensive review of secondary school programming and related policies, procedures and practices (including Optional Attendance). Final recommendations may include the following:

- Potential consolidation of school
- Relocation or consolidation of existing program(s)
- Repurposing of secondary school buildings to address other system needs, i.e. using a secondary school facility for a large elementary school
- Different models of school organization, including full-year programming and campus models
