Principal's Message

Dear Richview Parents, Guardians and Partners:

On behalf of the Richview Family of teaching and support staff, a hearty thank you for partnering with us. Student success for all does not happen without the on-going and meaningful involvement of our invaluable parents, community coaches and volunteers. The Reinvigorating Richview fundraiser is an example of this relationship. Owing to your generosity, we raised approximately \$10 000 that was used to purchase 14 laptops and 12 desktops so that each department is better equipped to facilitate the teaching-learning dynamic. This initiative is complimented by the installation of 23 Wireless Access points rendering roughly half of the school "wired" for business. On this note, it is especially important to recognize the knowledge, leadership and initiative of Peter Gehbauer, our Computer Science-Math-Teacher-Librarian for teaming up with Mr. Schwellnus and Mr. Pope to survey the landscape, identify the needs and implement the plan. As of July 8, network connectivity will be upgraded from 100 MB to 1GB! Certainly, the 2013-2014 year has been meaningful and significant - not least of which because we welcomed a vibrant Grade 9 class in September, we reveled in the achievement of the graduating class of 2014 and we warmly welcome new grade 9s to RCI on Frosh Day, August 27.

In the following paragraphs you will be served a generous portion of the events and accolades associated with our students and staff. This will doubtlessly reinforce the fact that Richview remains a destination to prepare future generations of leaders. It is a truth underscored by relentless demand for registration. Over 700 parents attended Grade 8 Open House in January with the hope of admission offers that are few and far between.

To our graduates, we applaud your many and varied successes and extend our wishes for greater achievement and fulfillment in your future pursuits. To this end, we eagerly anticipate your return to the Richview Family for Commencement exercises on Thursday, October 9, 2014 when for the second year, a prominent alumnus will deliver the Commencement Address. To our returning students, we wish a safe and satisfying summer and look forward to a new school year and all the promise it holds.

Tina, Anastasia, Anna and Verona's Orange-Yogurt

Ingredients

Unsalted butter, softened, for pan 1 cup all-purpose flour, sifted 1/2 cup plus 3 tablespoons granulated sugar 1/2 teaspoon baking powder 1/8 teaspoon baking soda Pinch of salt 1/2 cup plain whole-milk yogurt

1/4 cup vegetable oil1 teaspoon grated orange zest, plus 1 tablespoon orange juice1 large egg

1/2 teaspoon pure vanilla extract

2 large oranges (1 zested into thin strips, both segmented)

Confectioners' sugar, for dusting

Step 1:

Preheat oven to 350 degrees. Butter an 8-inch round cake pan. Stir flour, 1/2 cup plus 2 tablespoons sugar, the baking powder, baking soda, salt, yogurt, oil, orange zest and juice, egg, and vanilla in a bowl. Pour into pan. Bake until a cake tester comes out clean, about 25 minutes. Let cool on a wire rack.

Step 2

Place zest strips in a bowl. Stir in segments and remaining tablespoon sugar. Garnish cake with some segments; serve with the rest. Dust with confectioners' sugar.

CNL4U - Canadian and International Law


This year, **Ms. Striftobolas' Grade 12 Law** classes participated in two mock trials. In February, our students participated in a **criminal mock trial** where the students were required to solve a case in real-time. Students took on various roles including lawyers, judges, witnesses and court services officers. The students were responsible for every aspect of the case and worked collaboratively to ensure that justice was served. In the end, both of the accused were found not guilty as neither case was strong enough to prove that they were guilty beyond a reasonable doubt.

In June, our students participated in an **international mock trial** that was set in the **International Court of Justice**. The accused in this case was a tribe leader who was charged with the recruitment of child soldiers and war crimes. This trial again saw amazing performances from all involved. Their opening statements were riveting, the victim statements were heart wrenching and our judges delivered the guilty verdict with efficiency.

As they head off to their various postsecondary destinations, we look forward to hearing about their future successes and careers in the legal field!

Law Students Take a Trip to he Superior Court of Justice

On **Tuesday, April 15th**, **sixty senior law students** were accompanied by their teachers, **Ms. Markakos** and **Ms. Striftobolos,** for a day at the **Superior Court of Justice** located at 361 University Avenue.

Students started the day with a **Public Legal Education** session, which provided them with the opportunity to interact with a superior court judge and a crown attorney. Students heard about career opportunities, educational requirements and personal experiences. They also had an opportunity to pose questions to our hosts during the education session.

Richview students got a chance to observe our criminal justice system in action by visiting courtrooms that were in session and open to the public. They observed cases

involving charges for murder, assault, robbery, weapons, fraud and arson. By the end of the day, students developed an appreciation of the workings of our legal system and had many stories to tell.

population to set the parameters for the potential of having an AI deliver a talk to an audience. Should the AI be given the theme or topic in advance? Should the AI be physically represented by a freestanding structure? Should the AI demonstrate the ability to answer audience impromptu questions immediately after the talk? These types of questions (and much more) were raised by our **Grade 12 HZT4U**, **Philosophy Theories and Questions** students this past Spring. They debated whether limits should or should not be placed on their development, as well as whether the AI could actually have the potentiality to think. What do you think?

Science Department

Highlights from 2013 - 2014

Our Science Department was a very busy one this year. Over the past months, we hosted a number of presenters for several of our classes. Our grade 11 Biology students learned about forestry management with a consultant for the Forestry Association. Grade 11 and 12 Biology students learned about organ donation with the Trillium Gift of Life Foundation. And two of our grade 9s learned about farming practices with Aaron Thompson, a local farmer trained in genetics.




In addition to hosting traditional in-person presentations, one of our grade 12 Biology classes got to partake in our piloting of the VROC (Virtual Researcher on Call) system. Using VROC, our students participated in a live on-line conference call with Dr. Alberto Martin (Canada's Research Chair in Antibody Diversification at UofT). Through conference calling, students learned more about immunology and how cancer cells evade our immune system. This Pilot Project was both enlightening and fascinating. Next year, we will be making the VROC system available to all Science teachers in the hopes of bringing in more experts to our classes.



Outside the classroom a number of our teachers supported extracurricular Science events. With teachers' support, our students competed in the Engineering Idol, The National Crystal Growing Competition, U of T's Biology Competition and The University of Waterloo's Chemistry Competitions. Overall, our students performed very well. However, bragging rights goes to our Engineering Idol Team who brought home Gold.



Continuing with our goals for more cross curricular activities, we partnered with the Family Studies classes and the Library in the second half of the year. With Family Studies, one of our Science teacher's guest lectured on research findings on milk consumption. As always, our Richview students had some excellent questions for our Science teacher. While partnering with our Library, Mr. Gehbauer worked with one of our Biology teachers to convert training resources from U of T and



McMaster University into a checklist and template to guide students in lab-report writing. These materials were used by grade 12 Biology students this year and the results were very good. Students' feedback showed that the resources dramatically reduced the stress associated with this challenging writing task and the final products by students were of excellent quality. Next year, we plan to modify these materials to gear them towards each of the grade levels in order to target this skill set systematically, starting from the grade 9 level.

Finally, our staff started training for the roll out of our STEM initiative next year. This initiative will focus on using an integrative approach to Science, Technology, Engineering and Math in order to address real world problems and issues. The initiative is designed to bring depth to the learning experiences of students and to foster more creativity and better problem solving skills. We are looking forward to this initiative and will be working diligently to ensure that it is a resounding success next year. Until then, we wish all our Richview families a wonderful, engaging summer!

Congratulations to our very own Richview student team for being successful at this year's venture competition!








COMPUTER SCIENCE



ENGLISH DEPARTMENT Media Trip

GRADE 9

From Shakespeare to Mythology to Non-Fiction news reports to Modern and Graphic Novels, grade 9 students continued to develop their literacy skills through the exploration of different genres of English language and literature. For added invention and creativity, students were able to construct both fiction and non-fiction pieces using the technology of Comic Life and Bit Strips. Going beyond the classroom, the grade nine students attended the grand Casa Loma to not only tour the castle, but watch a production of Shakespeare's Twelfth Night within its extravagant halls. For next year, a trip to Young People's Theatre is in the making to see a LIVE production of To Kill A Mockingbird-- a classic many of the parents know and love!

GRADE 11

The grade 11 English course continues to evolve as instructional planning improves through professional collaboration and development, and as differentiated and up-to-date resources accrue. The past year saw students delving into the Bard's dark Jacobean tragedy Macbeth, into the despots, dictators and tyrants who have wreaked havoc on our world, into the fine art of journalistic editorial, the ostentatious world of Gatsby and the Roaring Twenties, and culminating in truly impressive student-made documentary films on social issues that complicate the lives of the modern day teenager. Through it all, Mr. Cohen, Mr. Richards, Ms. Sabadash, and Ms. Waller have worked diligently with students to improve and to refine the critical communication and higher order thinking skills necessary for success in the grade 12 English program.

GRADE 10

This school year brought some highly anticipated changes for the Grade 10 English students at Richview, while continuing to build on some of the exciting texts and assignments from previous years. The always popular Book Clubs continued this year, as students selected a novel of their choice from such popular dystopian texts as The Hunger Games, Divergent, Unwind, The Maze Runner, and Fahrenheit 451. In March, approximately 180 Grade 10 English students converged on the Scotiabank Theatre downtown for an opening-day viewing of the highly anticipated film version of Divergent, which was arranged exclusively for Richview students. We were also happy to introduce a new summative assignment for grade 10 students this year, which focused on an exciting literary genre that students were introduced to in Grade 9: the graphic novel. In addition to some popular graphic novels offered by the English Department including Maus, Skim, The Night Fisher, and I Kill Giants, the teachers worked together with Richview's Library to add a number of graphic novels to the library's collection. Based on personal interest, each student selected a graphic novel of their choice to complete a variety of creative and analytical tasks, including a "sales pitch" to their fellow classmates explaining why their chosen text should be added to the course selection for next year's grade 10s.

GRADE 12

The Richview English Department continues to enjoy a constantly changing senior level program which reflects the richness of the new curriculum and the diversity of our student population as well as the ever changing world around them. As a lead up to the Film Festival our aspiring authors also got a taste of published life as they sold their fiction 'zines at *Exposure*, a pre-festival reception highlighting some of the incredible photography and creative fiction 'zines imagined by our very own saints.

Students in the writing course have also been instrumental in the continued growth of our online newspaper the *Richview Herald*, and contributed articles as well as editing mastery to the student run paper. MEDIA STUDIES

Richview Film Festival

As programs in Media Studies proliferate at the university level, the Media courses offered at the school have become more and more important. The courses themselves are ever -evolving, providing students with access to cutting edge ideas and cutting edge technology. While founded upon a critical thinking pedagogy and providing students with the tools necessary to navigate the intricacies of the media landscape, the courses also afford the opportunity for students to express themselves and to contribute to the vast media flow with texts of their own creation. This year, at **RIFF**, Richview's first annual Film Festival, the students had a more formal forum for their output. Held in the RCI auditorium, this highly successful event is already in the calendar for next year.

The 3 year old grade 10 Media Arts course offers students their first opportunity to explore the impact of media on their lives and to participate in a small way, in the production thereof. The course started with a focus on advertising, both deconstructing and creating, and then shifted its attention to documentary and mockumentary film. The class, this year, made their own mockumentaries on topics of their choosing, filming and editing all of their own work. The course culminated in a study of genre, involving both research and the production of a fictional trailer.

The grade 11 course (EMS 3O1) once again turned its attention to counterculture, the DIY ethic, and the remix this year as well as to the evaluation of the impact of audience driven content on popular culture. The course culminated in two summatives: one where the students have been asked to create their own remix and to consider issues of copyright and intellectual/ creative property ownership, and a second where the students self-publish their own 'zine. This year, the students, after going to TIFF for their "Film in a Day" workshop, took their newfound knowledge to a Norseman Public School Grade 5 class to run a similar program for them. It was an incredible day and the end products, 5 very short films, are available for screening on You Tube under "Norseman Film Fest".



The grade 12 (IDC 4U1) students continued to engage heavily in the formal filmmaking process generating scripts and storyboards, while also learning how to build a narrative using the latest in digital film and editing technology. New this year was a project involving font design where the students created their own font using computer software as a part of a unit on semiotics. Recently, the IDC class has collaborated with the Writer's Craft class in the production of a conversation driven short film. These films were the backbone for the RCI Film Festival held in early Spring.

BLOOD DONOR CLINIC

Richview C.I. has been hosting an annual Blood Donor Clinic for several years now and the Saints continue to rise up to the challenge of donating their precious blood to those in need. Perhaps squeamish at the thought of writing a pages long English essay, Richview never shies away from being one of the best schools in the TDSB to donate in droves. Canadian Blood Services is always impressed with the generosity and graciousness with which our Saints come through year after year. This is a Saintly tradition that Richview is extremely proud of and one that will, no doubt, continue on for years to come!

In total, 27 university and college liaison representatives visited Richview to answer specific questions about their programs and the institutions themselves. In the Spring, we were very fortunate to have one of our alumni visit the school to speak with students about post-secondary preparation for the field of medicine. Workshops on scholarships, bursaries and loans available to graduating students were held during the lunch hour. Also, this year, an online post-secondary information site (http://richviewguidance.weebly.com) was created by Student Services to provide students with pertinent information regarding scholarships, planning and applications to post-secondary pathways. Graduating students are encouraged to visit this site on a regular basis. In addition, Student Services hosted a College Panel and a Parent Information Session on navigating post-secondary options. As one group of students leave us, we welcome 209 new Grade 9 students for the upcoming school year. Their transition to secondary school has already started as they attended our Grade 8 Orientation afternoon in May. Career exploration and planning is an important component of the Student Services mandate and this year students continued to use the website <u>www.myblueprint.ca</u> for educational planning and course selection.
