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The International Bilingual Education Project

Good evening, everyone. We would like to invite Grades 2-3 students in French immersion programs to participate in our research project, titled the *International Bilingual Education project*. This project has been reviewed and approved by Research Ethics at the University of Toronto and by the Toronto District School Board. Your child may have completed the first time point of this study in the Fall of 2019 or may be joining the project for the first time.

Please note that this study will now be completed entirely online.

The research project has the following two objectives. The first objective is to evaluate dynamic assessment (DA) tools for early identification of at-risk reading status for French immersion children. The second objective is to provide interventions to at-risk readers through evidencebased computer games. If you decide to participate in our study, your child will be followed for two years and tested at two time points: at the end of Grades 2-3 in January-May of 2021, and at the end of Grades 3-4 in January-May of 2022. Students will receive language and literacy measures one-on-one with a professional research assistant from the University of Toronto in English and French. At each of the time points, individual testing will take place in several 1hour sessions online via Microsoft Teams, or your preferred method of communication. The results of this research will help educators and parents gain new information and skills that can be used to support at-risk readers in French immersion programs. Moreover, when our educational games are developed, they will be provided to your child's school for free. Finally, you will receive an honorarium \$10 for allowing your child to participate in the study. If you and your child decide to stay in the project next year, another \$10 honorarium will be provided. Traffic Safety Tips: Help Make this a Safe Winter Season

As winter approaches, we know that severe weather will be part of our daily lives for the next several months. While traffic safety is an important matter all year long, this is a particularly good time to review what we can do to keep students safe.

The need to be aware and alert at all times, on any road, and even in the most routine circumstances is key to traffic safety. This applies to students and drivers alike. Road conditions can be challenging in the winter months. So to those of us who drive, please take extra care on the roads and in parking lots, especially in areas where children might be present.

School staff periodically review street and traffic safety with students. Parents can help reinforce these safety messages with children at home. Below are some tips that might be helpful to review.

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Stop, look, and listen for traffic.

Only cross at corners and crosswalks.

Make eye contact with drivers.

Walk on the right side of the crosswalk.

Wear appropriate footwear to reduce the chances of slipping.

Never run into the street.

Obey crossing signals.

Cross only if clear.

Walk on sidewalks.

Where there are no sidewalks, walk as far away from traffic as possible, facing traffic.

6. Other Business

Safety with masks at school

- Anna presented information about safety with masks. She suggested doing an experience with glitter (represented as water droplets as potential virus). When touching the masks with the "glitter", it can transfer the glitter to other surfaces. Therefore, it is better to replace masks each time you take them off. She also suggested use of alcohol gel hand rub for 15 seconds.
- Mask protocol it's mandatory that parents must wear a mask. If
 parents are exempted then it is recommended that they still need to
 wear a face cover.

7. Questions & Answers

- 1. Q: Is there a way we can access the questions and answers if we can't attend the meeting?
 - A: Q & A will be available in the minutes.
- 2. Q: Who will make the decision if a child has a runny, stuffy nose from being outside in the cold or in a class with the windows open and being sent to be tested?
 - A: Ms. O The guideline called "Know when to Self-Monitor, Self-Isolate or Send your Child to School" can be used to make assessments. This guideline was created by Toronto Public Health. Ms. O will post it on the Newsletter.
- 3. Q: If the child ends up staying home for at least 10 days, will learning still be available to them while not being in classroom?

- A: Ms. O Teachers are set up for remote learning and are providing all homework online through Brightspace or Google Classroom at this point, so students are able to log on and keep up with their homework this way, but classes are not set up to be taught as virtual school during a child's absence.
- 4. Q: I no longer get calls when I forget to report my child's absents!
 - A: Ms. O There are safety arrival processes that the teachers must follow. If the automated system did not call, parents are encouraged to call the school to inform Ms. O. Thane will follow up internally to figure out if there are issues with the automated system.
- 5. Q: Are we getting the result of CCAT test with feedback for grade 3 students? And when would it be?
 - A: Ms. O CCAT results are in the process now. This is taking much longer and will not be on the report card.
- 6. Q: I wonder how teachers approach and teach students regarding skin ship like hugging each other among friends during this pandemic as it should be avoided.
 - A: Ms. O School is encouraging cohorts to stay together, and to give air hugs, etc.
- 7. Q: Can we give the teachers gift cards as gifts? Or will they not be accepting anything from home?
 - A: Ms. O Gifts will to be kept a side for some time before giving them to the teachers.
- 8. Q: What is the protocol for last bell? My daughter was left alone in the class because the teacher said she was too slow. My daughter was scared and cried.
 - A: Ms. O There's a buddy system so this should not have happened. This will be addressed with the teacher.

- 9. Q: Does the school provide testing for Dyslexia or learning disabilities?
 - A: Ms. O TDSB psychologist would conduct the test.
- 10. Q: My child in kindergarten told me today the teachers don't take the students to fill up their water bottles. A small thermos of water isn't enough for the day.
 - A: Ms. O Kids are allowed to fill up the water bottles throughout the day. Not sure where the miscommunication occurred, but this will be communicated to the teachers.
