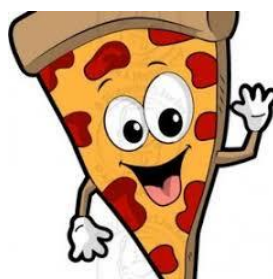


## Appreciation

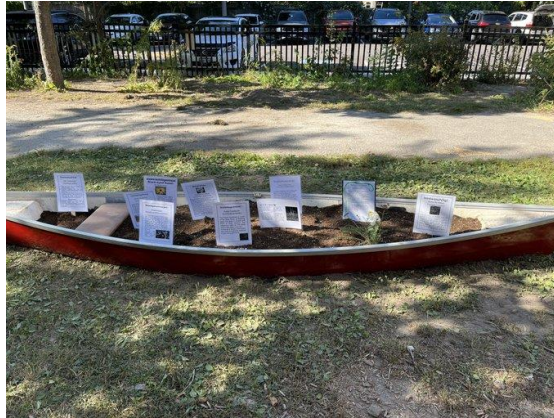


The TDSB Professional Support Services team offers weekly virtual drop-in times where you can connect directly with a staff member to help answer questions and provide support to help you and your child.

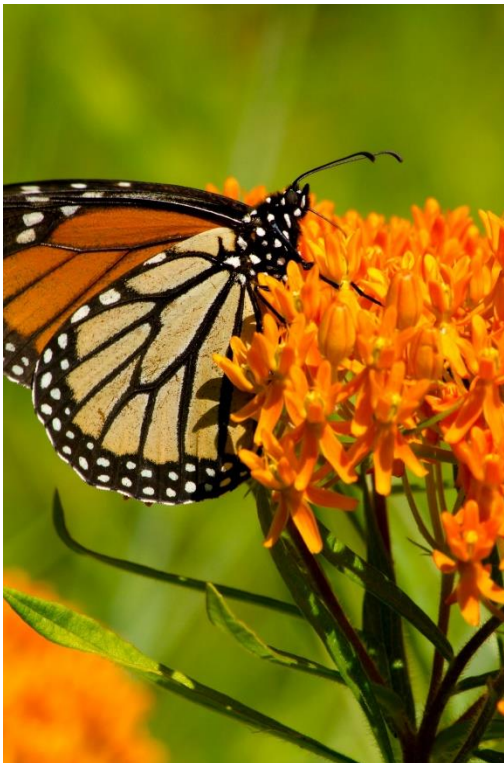

## Indigenous Education and Sovereignty

We are learning about the land on which we live, work, learn, and play. Aligned with this learning is our participation in the David Suzuki Foundation's Butterfly Way Project. Carol Lee from the foundation let us know that we are the first Leaside school to have a Butterfly Way canoe. Thank you to the David Suzuki Foundation for donating the canoe planter to our school!



Mr. Sauve, one of our Kindergarten teachers dug out the space we needed in our Kindergarten yard and the canoe was installed last week. In the daytime, during school hours, you will have noticed individual signs about native plants that we will be planting in the spring. Each of our classes selected a plant, researched the plant, and created a sign. Thank you to teachers and students for this amazing learning! Ask your child which plant their class researched! One example is included below.



**Ininiwanzh (iig)** is commonly known as Butterfly Weed. This perennial is native to Ontario and Quebec. Indigenous Peoples valued its medicinal properties and used the fibre for rope and weaving. With vibrant orange, red and yellow flowers that seem to jump out, butterfly weed is a great addition to a sunny garden with average dry soils. It is a source of nectar for monarch butterflies and other butterflies.

**Ininiwanzh (iig)** flower gifts are red-orange clusters of small flowers blooming in summer. In fall, rainbow pods releases wind-bound seeds. In winter, visual gifts continue with gray/tan seed pods.
