

A School Council Presentation: Mad Science

Thank you to our School Council for sponsoring the Mad Science presentation. Sir Adam Beck students welcomed Scientist Element also known as Scientist Ella to the school on Wednesday, November 22nd. She came in full of energy to show the students a magic trick and plenty of science experiments.

Scientist Ella showed examples of high and low air. She showed how using one breath can fill a plastic bag because of low pressure. She then showed high pressure by keeping a small ball floating over a straw, then she wowed the students using a hair blow dryer and finally an impressive leaf blower to keep a large ball floating above, all thanks to high pressure!

Next, Scientist Ella used the leaf blower using high pressure to blow toilet paper in an exciting scene until it moved out of the path of the source of wind and fell to the ground.

After that, a hovercraft made an appearance! Scientist Ella showed how friction slows down the hovercraft causing it to stop. Then, using air from the leaf blower and causing less friction, Scientist Ella was able to glide around the floor of the gym on a hovercraft board!

In the grand finale, Scientist Ella used carbon dioxide pressure to spray water over the audience. Thanks to the support of Sir Adam Beck's parent council, students learned a lot about high and low pressure as well as friction.

With each read aloud, we focus on reading strategies and understanding the text. So far, we've worked on reflecting on the author's purpose, characters, setting and vocabulary.

Toronto Public Library Update

As you may be aware, the Toronto Public Library (TPL) experienced a cyberattack at the end of October. As a result, our students have not been able to sign-out books during class time. They now expect the systems to be down until January 2024 (please see the TPL website for more details). I have been working with the TPL staff and we have come up with an internal process to sign-out books so book exchange will thankfully begin soon. The first order of business is to return all the books students signed out in October. Many of these books have been housed in your child's classrooms. Please help by making sure your child's library books are returned. Then, students will be able to sign-out only one book at a time during this process. Life is Like A Tree Workshop

In this workshop, students from Mme Brown and Mr Breaw's classes explored traditional glue making and created collages with words, pictures and found materials. We learned, through an Anishinabe lens, that the sap of the tree can be understood as the blood that flows in our bodies. We are living life that is fluid, flowing and running, always changing.

Through "Life is Like a Tree", artist Alexandra Iorgu and Knowledge Keeper Alan Colley, in partnership with Nadijah Robinson of Lakeshore Arts, welcomed students to the New Toronto Library Branch. The lead artists invited participants to deepen their understanding of trees and the trees' connections to self, history, and community. Funding for these programs was made possible with the support of Toronto Arts Council, in partnership with Toronto Public Library, as part of their Artist in the Library programs.

Health Physical Education and Dance Update

During the month of November the focus has been [Germs and Vaccinations for the Primary classes](#) and [Healthy eating for the Junior classes](#). We have been discussing the importance of ways to prevent and avoid germs (washing hands with soap and covering their cough or sneeze in the crook of their arm), as well as making sure to make healthy food choices using Canada's Food Guide.

The primary classes (grades 1-3) have also been learning about some of the elements of dance (Body, Space and Relationship). Students have been learning how to move around the space using a variety of locomotor and non-locomotor movements incorporating levels (high, medium and low), and interesting body shapes. Classes have been working in small groups to create choreographed dance pieces to perform in front of their classes.

Diversity, Inclusion and Equity Corner

December brings with it many celebrations throughout the world. Many of these celebrations trace their roots back to winter solstice and the beginning of our journey back towards warmer weather and longer days.

Hanukkah – Dec 7-15 A Jewish holiday which reaffirms the ideals of Judaism. Candles are lit as a family for eight nights of remembrance.

Universal Human Rights Month (United Nations) - December 10, 2023 marks the 75th anniversary of one of the world's most ground-breaking global pledges: the Universal Declaration of Human Rights (UDHR). This landmark document enshrines the inalienable rights that everyone is entitled to as a human being - regardless of race, colour, religion, sex, language, political or other opinion, national or social origin, property, birth or other status. The Declaration was proclaimed by the United Nations General Assembly in Paris on 10 December 1948 and sets out, for the first time, fundamental human rights to be universally protected.

Los Posadas – Dec 16-24 - A mainly religious festival commemorating Mary and Joseph seeking shelter in Bethlehem. This celebration ends with pinatas filled with candy and toys for the kids.

Winter Solstice - December 21st is the first day of winter and the shortest day of the year, in the Northern Hemisphere. In the Southern Hemisphere, it is the Summer Solstice, the longest day of the year. As the solstice happens all around the globe, there are many different ways of celebrating this transformational time. The winter solstice is an important time of spiritual rejoice and celebration of the return of the sun, and many religious holidays in winter are rooted in this period of transformation.

Christmas – Dec 25 - A Christian celebration of the birth of their lord, Jesus Christ. The term Yule may date back to a few other words which mean feast of the winter solstice.

Kwanzaa – Dec 26 – Jan 1 - a seven-day celebration of African roots, observed by people of all faith backgrounds, since it's not tied to any religion. The African-American and Pan-African holiday is anchored by seven principles known as the Nguzo Saba which aims to inspire Black people to be united, self-determined, accountable for their communities, financially invested in Black-owned businesses, purposeful with their lives, creative and full of faith. While originated in the United States, the celebration draws its roots from the South African first fruit celebrations. South Africa being in the Southern hemisphere and enjoying the start of summer in December.

Please choose the top 3 priorities that you feel are the most important.* One of the options is "**Education supports (like before and after school programming, special education and developmental support programs).**" We encourage you to list this priority should you wish to support public education.

Early French Immersion (JK Entry)

The Early French Immersion program begins in Junior Kindergarten (JK). Families who wish to have their child participate in an Early French Immersion Program **must** apply in **November**. To apply, please visit www.tdsb.on.ca/pars.

For September 2024 entry, **the application process will open on November 6, 2023 and close on December 1, 2023**. Applications that are submitted after the deadline will be marked as late and accommodated if space in the program is available.

In February, only those families who applied in November and have accepted an offer of placement for their child via the [central application process](#) can register in Early French Immersion.

Below is a Q&A that may support some inquiries which you may receive from local parents/caregivers during this time period:

When the on-line application system (PARS) opens...

How do I apply to Early French Immersion?

- Please invite parents/caregivers to visit www.tdsb.on.ca/pars. They will select the program from a drop-down menu on the right (Early French Immersion) and follow the prompts. This process is not first come first served. In the weeks following the close of the application, offers of placement will be **sent to the email address provided** by the parent/caregiver. Please encourage them to check this email frequently and follow the prompts in the message when the offer is made.

My child is not in the TDSB and does not have an OEN. **ALL families will be non-TDSB families who have child(ren) born in 2020.**

- For non-TDSB students, the parent/caregiver selects the “Non-TDSB Student” option on the PARS site and follows the steps to generate an identification number. They must then continue the application procedure with this number.

I can't get on the website.

- Please reassure the parent/caregiver that the application is not handled on a first come, first served basis. If there is an internet issue, the parent/caregiver may try again. If there is a problem with the site, please let us know via email and assure the parent/caregiver that it will be taken care of and they should try again in the next couple of days.
- If the parent/caregiver cannot access the internet from home or has any other challenges using the on-line system, please offer them assistance at the school or have them call our office. With a DOB, anyone can submit the application for the parent/caregiver.

When will I hear?

- Offers of placement will begin in the days following the application deadline and they will continue for the weeks following. Not all families in a given area will receive their offers of placement at the same time, but all will receive one.
- Please encourage the parent/caregiver to check their email frequently (including their junk mail). Please do **not** offer a firm date when the offers of placement should be completed.

Is it a first come first served process?

- No. All applications received by the deadline are treated with the same priority and are guaranteed a place **in the program** (we cannot guarantee placement in a given school).
- All applications received after the deadline will be held on a waitlist *and considered subject to available space until the end of September of the entry year.*

Reduce the Spread of Respiratory Viruses

Dear Parents/ Guardians/ Caregivers,

You and your child play an important part in protecting our school communities to reduce the spread of respiratory viruses this fall and winter:

Reduce virus spread

- Stay home if sick or have symptoms of being sick, even if they are mild.
- Use the [TPH screening questionnaire](#) or the provincial [COVID-19 Self-Assessment Tool](#) before attending school or work if there are symptoms of illness.
- [Clean hands](#) often.
- [Cover their cough](#) or sneeze with a tissue or their elbow.

- Wear a well-fitted, high-quality [mask](#) in crowded indoor settings with poor ventilation, especially if at higher risk of getting very sick

Get the updated COVID-19 and flu vaccine this fall

- Both vaccines are important to prevent serious illness.
- The updated COVID-19 vaccine targets the XBB variant and will better protect from the variants spreading now and [long-COVID](#).
- Everyone six months and older can get the updated [COVID-19 vaccine](#) and [flu vaccine](#) starting October 30th, 2023 at:
 - Toronto Public Health [fixed-site vaccination clinics](#). Book an appointment at [TPHbookings.ca](#). Only one appointment is needed to get both vaccines.
 - Participating [pharmacies](#) or health care provider's office.

It is also important to have your child up-to-date with routine vaccinations

- In Ontario, the [Immunization of School Pupil Act \(ISPA\)](#) requires all students to be up-to-date with certain vaccines, or have a [valid exemption](#). This includes vaccinations for measles, mumps, rubella, diphtheria, tetanus, polio, pertussis, meningococcal and chickenpox.
 - Toronto Public Health (TPH) will be sending letters to some parents to ensure their child is compliant with the ISPA legislation.
 - Parents must report any vaccines not given by TPH through [Immunization Connect \(ICON\)](#).
 - Students who are not up-to-date can be suspended from school.
- Students in grades 7 to 12 can get the [hepatitis B, human papillomavirus \(HPV\) and meningococcal vaccines](#) through the [Student Immunization Program \(SIP\)](#).
 - How to get these free vaccines:
 - **SIP school clinics** will offer hepatitis b, human papillomavirus (HPV) and meningococcal vaccines during school hours to grade 7 and 8 students who attend the school. Visit the [School Immunization Program webpage](#) to see the school clinic schedule.
 - [TPH fixed-site vaccination clinics](#). Book an appointment at [TPHbookings.ca](#).
 - **A health care provider's office**. Ask your health care provider to [order these vaccines](#) for free from TPH and report it through [ICON](#).





November Assembly

We brought the school together for our first monthly assembly of the year, on Friday, November 3rd.



Mme Brown's class started the assembly off with a focus on inclusion. The grade 4 French Immersion class read <<Bienvenue! Un livre sur l'inclusion>> (All Are Welcome) by Alexandra Penfold. The students spent time reflecting and learning about the book's message of inclusion. During the assembly, they shared how to make others feel welcome at both Sir Adam Beck and in the community.

The grade 4 French Immersion students also read <<L'histoire du chandail orange>> (The Story of the Orange Shirt) by Phyllis Webstad for the National Day of Truth and Reconciliation. Students shared why they wear an orange shirt, how they can help and explained why every child matters. One message was that we wear an orange shirt to remember all of the students who went to residential schools and to honour the families who lost a loved one in residential schools. Another message was that we can learn about the truth of residential schools and make sure that what happened never happens again. A student also said that every child matters because children are our future.

Students also learned about the Witness Blanket, a piece of art made up of over 100 objects from residential schools, churches, government buildings and traditional structures and cultures from across Canada. Students shared that each object tells a story of loss, strength, and resistance. Through learning about the artifacts included in the Witness Blanket, students broadened their knowledge about the events that took place in Residential Schools.



Finally, students shared information about Sir Adam Beck's Walk on Wednesday, including the benefits of walking to school. Students noticed that when they walk to school they can concentrate better during the day. They also enjoy observing the nature along their walk and appreciate the benefits of walking to school on the environment. Remember, Walk on Wednesdays are happening every Wednesday this year! The Walking School Bus is happening on the last Wednesday of each month.
