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Growing a Reader

Continue to read aloud

Listening to the written word supports language development by teaching new words and building a love of reading. Children can usually understand content in books that they aren't able to read themselves, so by reading them aloud, you can increase their comprehension skills.

Not every word counts

All readers make substitutions as they read and it's fine as long as the meaning of the word doesn't change. For example: if your child reads "house" instead of "home," keep reading without comment. However, if your child says "horse" instead of "house", the meaning has changed and you should ask them if that makes sense. Let them discover the substitution and the correct word. Reassure your child that this is a normal experience that shows they are becoming a more skilled reader!

Encourage your child to select their own reading material

In school, children are directed to books with educational goals. It's important to supplement their reading material at home and at the library with items that interest them and that they choose for themselves. This includes books that they can read on their own and books that need to be read to them. Letting your child select their own books helps to foster a joy of reading that will last a lifetime.

Learning to read is a gradual process that you can support in many ways as your child grows.

In the early stages of literacy, children learn that print and pictures in books have meaning. They like having the same book read to them over and over, and may eventually start to "read" the familiar text out loud. You should read, sing, talk, play and write with your child at this stage because these everyday activities develop early literacy skills.

When your child starts school, they will be given formal instruction about reading and writing. However, you still play an important role in their reading development and can support them in the following ways.

Model that reading is important

When your child sees you reading (it doesn't matter what), it reinforces that reading is an important activity that continues throughout one's life.

Reading is reading, no matter what the format

Comic books, instruction manuals, audiobooks, eBooks, novels, picture books, magazines, cereal boxes - all of these formats support reading development and promote a literate life.

Reading is cyclical

Just as your younger child longed for the same book night after night, older readers often return to familiar books that they find comforting. As long as they continue to be challenged with some new books, reading familiar books should be encouraged as it boosts reading enjoyment.







Finding a "Just Right" Book



Open a book to any page, ask your child to start reading aloud, and look for these clues:


Decoding Words

Is your child stuck on a word that they can't figure out? Help them to decode it by asking them to:

- Look at the picture for something that begins with that letter.
- Say the beginning sound.
- Slowly stretch each letter sound to make the word.
- Break the word into chunks they already know.
- Re-read the sentence. Think, "does that make sense?"
- Try a word that makes sense.
- Skip the tricky word. Read to the end of the sentence. Go back and try it again.
- If they're still stuck, they can ask you for help!



Design a "Reading" Home

Read, read, and read some more

Children need all kinds of interesting books and materials to read, not only in print, but also in audio and online. Families can build a home "library" and use the public library's huge selection of books, audiobooks, ebooks and magazines for kids, in English and other languages, to support reading development.

Comfy reading space

Children need a comfortable place to read. This can be anywhere – a chair, couch, or nook – as long relaxed and invites page

Play games

Board game night is a favourite for many families and promotes literacy at the same time. Board, card and word games (Boggle, Pictionary and Scrabble) are fun and improve reading, problem-solving and social skills.

Talk (and don't forget to listen)

Ask specific, open-ended questions, (not questions that can be answered with yes or no), and make sure you're talking with, and not just to, your child. Chat about your day and ask about theirs, make time to really think about their questions and find answers together, and ask for their opinion.

Stepping Up to Chapter Books

Does your home offer lots of ways for your child to read, write, talk and play?

Literacy-rich environments present chances to use these skills and emphasize the importance of reading and writing every day. Making your home a "reading" home isn't difficult or expensive. Here are some ideas to get you started.

Be dramatic

Spark creativity and imagination by reading stories, poems and plays aloud, playing charades, telling stories and reminiscing about memorable family moments. Looking through a photo album is a great way to find inspiration!

Write

Encourage writing by keeping pencils, markers, paper and other writing tools out in the open, and invite your child to write lists, songs, poetry, stories, letters and email or keep a diary. Write to each other and leave notes for your child in unexpected places for them to discover.

Make it mobile

Literacy-rich environments can go anywhere! Always bring books, word searches, a deck of cards and pen and paper with you – all of which fit nicely in a backpack or the car.

It's more than just tools

Literacy-rich environments need books and tools to promote a love of reading, but they also need people to bring them to life. A home filled with readers encourages questions, game playing, listening to stories, reading books and making time for each other.

The Power of Reading Aloud

Jim Trelease, author of *The Read Aloud Handbook*, says one of the reasons to keep reading aloud to children is that their listening level is higher than their reading level. Sharing stories with more complicated plots and characters improves comprehension and motivates children to read more.

Looking for ways to have a great read aloud experience with your child?

Let your child pick the book

They can choose a title on their own, or you can pick out a few books, read the summaries and let them have the final say.

Expression matters

Not only does reading with expression make a story jump off the page, but it also helps young readers to become more confident. Change the volume and sound of your voice to mirror characters or plot (think loud, deep voice when reading the part of an ogre), adapt the tone based on punctuation and font style (such as, "you did WHAT?!?") and slow or quicken the pace to create suspense or a feeling of adventure.

Talk about the books you read together

Find a time when it's convenient – this could be at dinner, traveling to and from school, or right before bed. Ask your child what they did or didn't like about the book and invite them to ask you questions, too.



New readers find it very exciting to read without help! But after children know how to read well, it's still important for more experienced readers to read aloud to them. Why?

Make them want more

Stories come alive when they're read aloud. End on a chapter that's exciting so they can't wait to find out what happens next. The time you spend reading and talking together (and maybe even laughing or crying, depending on the book) is one of the things that kids want most.
