All students and families belong at The Waterfront School!

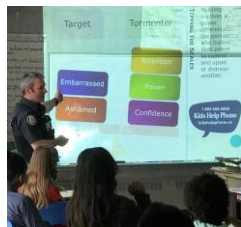
Partnerships with Police to Create Gourmet Dishes

Anti-Bullying Presentation & Making Positive Choices

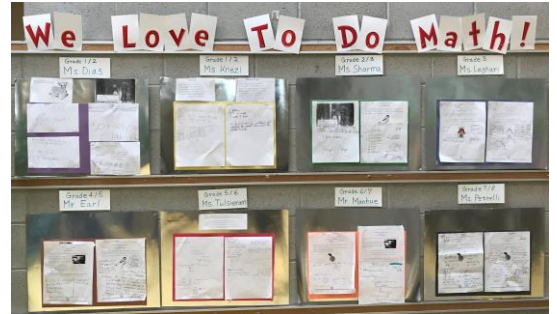

We continue to set high expectations for all our students and we expect students to follow these expectations every day. Our Staff provides support to students to achieve these expectations along with parent support at home. We expect all students to make positive choices every day.

Progressive Discipline

All TDSB schools use Progressive Discipline as a whole-school approach to address inappropriate student behaviour. We use a range of interventions, supports, and consequences that give students learning opportunities to make better choices. When inappropriate behaviour occurs, our approach is corrective and supportive rather than solely punitive.

We focus on prevention and early intervention to maintain a positive school environment in which students can learn. Early intervention strategies may include ongoing communication with parents, verbal reminders, review of expectations, and/or written assignments with a learning task that requires reflection. Progressively more serious consequences are considered for inappropriate behaviour that is repeated or more serious. Some examples of ongoing interventions are meeting with parent(s), requiring the student to perform volunteer service in the school community, conflict mediation, peer mentoring, and/or a referral to counselling. Mitigating factors such as the student's age, stage of social development, special education needs, history and the circumstances of the behaviour, are also considered. Each decision on discipline is unique for each student. Suspensions and Expulsions may be considered when progressive discipline has been used and the behaviour continues or for serious behaviours as outlined in the TDSB code of conduct. (You can find this in your child's agenda). Consultation with the TDSB Caring and Safe Schools Team and Superintendent is part of the process when a suspension and/or expulsion are being considered.

How can parents help?

Parents have a primary role to play in their children's education. We actively engage parents in the progressive discipline approach by involving them in ongoing conversations about their children's achievement, well-being and behaviour. When schools and parents are partners we see positive student behaviour and improved student achievement.

ECO Partnership with City School for Earth Day Activities



The City and Waterfront Schools (C.A.W.) Earth Day Summit is one of the highlights of Earth Day celebrations at The Waterfront School. On April 25 for the entire morning, students rotated through a series of Eco-workshops that were hosted by The Waterfront and City School students. The students learned about environmental issues including animal habitat loss and plastic pollution through games and interactive storytelling. They attended workshops that showed them how to repurpose T-shirts to make cloth bags and make musical percussion instruments out of found materials. Some other workshops were: making Seed Packs, Eco-crafts and Sustainable Eating. The students learned that is not only urgent but also "cool" to reduce our carbon footprint and to do our part to save the environment. From Ms. Sharma

Restorative Practices

Restorative Practices is one of the strategies that we use to help students actively engage and take greater responsibility for their actions when they have made negative choices. It gives each student a voice to reflect on their actions and to take steps to change their behaviour. Being restorative is about building relationships and connections that will positively impact academic performance. In Restorative Practices students use the following questions to reflect on their actions and to plan how they will fix what they have done.

Regarding Misbehaviour:

What happened?

What were you thinking of at the time?

What have you thought of since?

Who has been affected by what you have done?

In what way?

What do you think you need to do to make things right?

To help those affected:

What did you think when you realized what had happened?

What impact has this incident had on you and others?

What has been the hardest thing for you?

What do you think needs to happen to make things right.

Our staff also uses Restorative Circles with their whole class to build a positive classroom and school community and to provide opportunities for students to set goals and to share their ideas.

Forest of Reading

We are happy that our students are part of the Forest of Reading program which is designed to expose young readers to Canadian authors and illustrators. Students in the primary grades hear 10 stories and then vote for their favourite. Students in Grades 3 to 8 read independently and any student who reads 5 books can vote for their favourite book. As well they have a chance to go to the actual awards ceremony at Harbourfront in mid-May, to see the awards being presented and to meet their favourite authors. Happy Reading!
