NEWS FROM ENGLISH

It is impossible to ignore the biggest literacy news story of the first semester, the first online EQAO literacy test. It is unfortunate that with all of the news about the problems surrounding the test that more attention was not given to schools like TCI who persevered throughout these difficulties. All staff who was assisting students on the day of the test can attest to the fact that our students patiently worked through all of the difficulties of that day. As a result, many students were able to complete most or all of the test. A number of schools throughout Ontario were not as lucky as TCI and had to cancel their test day completely. However, I am certain that it was not only luck that was demonstrated at TCI on the day of the test. Both TCI staff and your sons and daughters collaborated to make the best of a more than challenging day. We are proud to be working on behalf of such amazing students.

As you have recently been informed, the EQAO has announced that those schools like TCI, who persevered through the difficulties they encountered on the day of the test, will have their tests marked. I am quite certain that a number of our students will discover that their hard work

will pay off, and they will soon find that they have passed the test. This information will be passed on to you as soon as we receive it. Rest assured if anyone was not successful, we are already in the process of preparing students for the regular date of the spring EQAO.

Going beyond preparations for the literacy test. the English department at TCI is encouraging the development of Deep Reading. One of the biggest challenges facing a 21st Century North American student is digital distractions. For too many students, screen time has unfortunately replaced quiet time that was once given to reading, writing and conversation. Within TCI's classrooms, we are providing both time to read and strategies to better comprehend challenging texts. Our goal is that your sons and daughters are not just passing tests and gaining credits, but that they are gaining the skills to make them lifelong learners and successful students in their post-secondary pursuits. To this end, we ask that you provide an hour each evening of screen-free time for reading and conversation. We are always most successful when we collaborate with you in making our TCI students successful. Thanks so much for working with us.

NEWS FROM STUDENT SERVICES

Post-Secondary Visits

On November 10, senior students had the opportunity to participate in presentations from a variety of post-secondary institutions from around the GTA. Our 'Post-Secondary Afternoon' gave students the opportunity to ask questions and hear from a variety of college and university representatives. Our aim is to encourage students and give them opportunities to research and explore the opportunities that exist for them after high school.

College and University Applications

On December 1st students in a graduating position will be invited to an assembly to learn about the application process for college and university. The deadline for college applications is February 1, 2017 and January 11, 2017 for university applications. We encourage students to have conversations with their parents/guardians about this important decision and to complete their applications early. Guidance staff is always available for questions or consultation.

Parent Workshop Evenings

We are pleased to announce parent workshop evenings for parents and guardians of Thistletown students. As part of our commitment to student achievement and equity, we are inviting parents and guardians to partner with us to improve well-being and understanding of our students.

Grade 10 and 12 students will begin selecting their courses in November and December, respectively. NEWS FROM VISUAL ARTS.



This semester, the grade 9 Visual Arts course NAC10 Expressing Aboriginal. Metis and Inuit Cultures has been busy finishing up the History of the Land mural that is now hanging on the cafeteria wall for all the school to enjoy. This large scale mural was started in the spring semester with Phil Cote our Indigenous Guest artist. He assisted the class with historical information that the class painted onto the mural. The acrylic painted mural reaches 8 feet high and 25 feet long and tells the story of the Indigenous presence on this land since before the ice age and travels in a chronological fashion from left to right across the ages from settlement times and first contact until today at TCI! The Humber River is the background for the images because the story relates to our own school being on previous aboriginal land with the Humber River just behind our school.

The nines are now enjoying a TDSB sponsored Art Gallery of Ontario tour of artworks and attending a First Nations themed studio workshop. Aqua and Rebecca Baird, two other aboriginal artists, will be visiting the class in November to share their wisdom of their culture and experiences as artists.

The grade 11 /12 class is busy as usual with professional guest artists in Interior Design and Printmaking. These workshops will provide certification opportunities for the five SHSM students in our senior Visual Arts class. Our trip to the Graphic Arts North American University and Colleges Expo was successful in guiding our students toward their post-secondary decisions. Another trip is scheduled to the McMichael Arts gallery for the seniors to participate in a contemporary art workshop.

Also, the Visual Arts Department has three students entering the OSSTF Marion Drysdale "Mirror, Mirror" competition in poetry and painting. The Visual Arts students' next public art show competition is the Delisle Youth Art Show and Sale.

Mark your calendar for the T.C.I. STUDIO 150 HOLIDAY ART SHOW AND SALE on Wednesday, December 21st with displays of Aboriginal handicrafts, clay ceramics, and the grades 9, 11 and 12 hand-printed cards and paintings in water colour and acrylic for viewing. Parents are welcome while teachers will bring in their classes in to walk around and observe the art show while enjoying hot apple cider and student homemade cookies. Money raised from the sale will be donated to YOUTH WITHOUT SHELTER, our neighborhood charity.

Canada's 150 Anniversary Celebrations: Highway of Heroes Living Tribute

Anniversary Celebrations. The first part of these celebrations began in November and is dedicated to remembering, commemorating, and paying tribute to the Canadian Soldiers who have sacrificed their lives to defend our country, its interests, its values, and contributing to international peace and security. The following events were organized at Thistletown to remember and pay tribute to those fallen soldiers

Tulip bulbs were planted in our school's vegetable garden on Friday November 4. A number of students from Ms. Pepper's and Mrs. Mangat's period 2 classes and members of the Environmental Club helped out with the planting of Tulips. These bulbs will bloom in the spring of 2017, the time we will be celebrating Canada's 150 Anniversary

Display cases with information and pictures of some of our soldiers, who travelled along the Highway of Heroes, were set up by Ms. Jackson during the Remembrance week, November 7 to November 11.

We are also supporting "The Living Tribute" initiative of "Highway of Heroes" through fundraising. The mission of this Living Tribute is to plant 117, 000 trees, in five years, one for every fallen Canadian Soldier since Confederation, along and near the Highway of Heroes between Trenton and Toronto. Environmental Club members will be collecting donations in the front foyer in the morning and in the cafeteria during lunch throughout the months of November and December to support the "Living Tribute" mission. Funds will also be raised through a Samosa Sale on November 30 and a Hot Chocolate Sale on December 8.

Students had a chance to express their understanding of "Freedom and what Canada stands for", "Highway of Heroes", and "Living Tribute" through this activity. NEWS FROM NUMERACY

Greetings from the Math Department!

A kindly reminder that students in the **Grade 9** Academic or Applied math programs will be writing the Math EOAO assessment on January 19th and 20th. The EQAO assessment measures understanding of student's knowledge and skills at key stages of their education in comparison to provincial standards. It is compulsory in Ontario for all students registered in Grade 9 Mathematics (Academic or Applied) to write the Math EQAO. Results will count for 10% of their final mark. This test will require students to answer a series of questions in multiple-choice and open-ended short answer questions, which are reflected in the math curriculum. An opportunity will be provided for our students to write a practice EQAO test in their classroom, which will provide them with

constructive feedback. If you have any questions, please contact your student's grade 9 teacher.

Our math teachers will continue to pursue new and innovative ways to build our math program. Currently our department is enrolled in the Math Renewal Strategies where our focus is on supporting grade 9 and 10 students in achievement and success. We hope that we can count on the support of our great parents to ensure that students come prepared for school on a daily basis with their learning materials (i.e. pencil, paper, binder, and calculator) and complete a minimum of 30 minutes of math homework every night.
