As always, student success continues to be our main focus at TCI. Please be aware that there are many academic supports available to students. Teachers are very willing to provide help outside of class time. Our partnership in education with the Braeburn Neighbourhood Place community group continues to allow us to provide daily homework help opportunities in Rooms 277 and 279 both at lunch and after school. A hot meal, created by our food preparation class, is free to students prior to starting their homework. Tutoring is done by more senior Thistletown students under the guidance of the Braeburn staff members. Recreational activities take place in the after school program once homework is complete. Students can access forms outside Room 277 or see Mrs. Pleavin in Guidance to sign up.

During the past month students have also been engaged in conversations with their teachers and guidance counselors around their course paths

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and choices for next year. Setting goals and devising a plan for achieving post-secondary goals is an important part of enabling students to be successful. I encourage parents/guardians to be involved in the program choices of their student. Please be aware that TCI offers a wide variety of subjects which support all pathways: Workplace, Apprenticeship, College and University. We also offer students the chance to participate in a Specialized High Skills Major (SHSM) in Hospitality and Tourism or in the area of Arts and Culture (Dance, Drama, Music or Visual Arts). A SHSM is a program that allows students to focus their learning on a specific economic sector while meeting the requirements for the Ontario Secondary School Diploma (OSSD). Students leave high school with an industry certificate of their recognized special achievements in these programs.

We look forward to seeing you and speaking with you about your child's progress and possible career pathways at our upcoming Parent Interview Night scheduled on Tuesday, March 8 from 4:00 to 8:00 p.m.

On January 19 and 20 our Grade 9s wrote the EQAO Math test and we wish all the participants all the best in their efforts.

On March 31 our Grade 10 students will write the Ontario Secondary School Literacy Test (OSSLT). Students have written a practice test and other supports will be available to students as they prepare to write in March. Students are encouraged to embrace the supports offered.

And finally I wish to congratulate our Culinary Arts teacher Mr. Hoare and his two students Yohannes Asres and Justice Chea for coming in second and third in the recent *Chopped Canada* Youth competition final after winning first in their respective heats. We are all very proud of their accomplishments and our very strong Foods program at TCI.

NEWS FROM STUDENT SERVICES

Course Selection Process for Grade 9, 10, and 11 students

The course selection process for students to select courses for the 2016-2017 school year will begin on Monday, February 8. Students in Grades 9, 10, and 11 will receive a variety of information on courses that will be available to them for the upcoming school year.

When determining course choices, students should consider a number of factors:

• Courses already completed or currently enrolled in (do they have the prerequisite course?)

- Academic achievement to date (have they performed well to ensure success in future courses?)
- Post-secondary considerations (is the student wishing to work or become an apprentice? What high school courses are required for specific college or university programs?)

Integral to this process is parent/student dialogue. Students will be provided with a variety of material, primarily online, including course descriptions for all courses offered at TCI.

This will be the second year that students will be using the website <u>www.myblueprint.ca/tdsb</u> for course selection. This allows students access at home and we encourage parents to dialogue with students about appropriate course choices for next year.

The deadline to submit course choices is February 26, 2016.

Post-Secondary Destinations

A component of transitioning in high school is preparing students for life after their final year. One way we do that is by providing opportunities for students to explore possibilities that await them as they prepare to move into the next stage of their lives.

In November, Grade 11 and 12 students and their teachers heard presentations from a number of different individuals representing various college, trade, and university institutions. This was an excellent opportunity for students to begin asking questions about opportunities after high school.

Open Houses at colleges and universities will continue to be offered into the spring.

Post-Secondary Planning

At this time of year, Guidance counsellors in Student Services have had conversations with Grade 12 students about their post-secondary choices and explained application procedures.

• An assembly regarding the college and university application process took place in early December. This was offered to our graduating and senior students.

- Students applying for skilled trades or for workplace training and experience have met with Cooperative Education teachers at TCI for second semester placements.
- Students applying to college for programs beginning in September would have done so prior to the deadline of February 1, 2016.
- The deadline for applying to university was January 13, 2016.
- We encourage students to have alternative post-secondary plans in the event that their first choice does not materialize. For example, it is suggested that university applicants also apply to appropriate college programs. There are many excellent college programs that can lead to university completion if desired.

NEWS FROM THE SCIENCE DEPARTMENT

Some of the activities that took place in the Science department during Semester 1 are described below.

Mrs. Mangat's Grade 12 University Biology class had a field trip to Ontario Science Centre on November 3, 2015 where students carried out a DNA Fingerprinting lab. Through this lab students first learned to extract DNA by using their cheek cells as source of DNA. After, they learned to make multiple copies of their cheek cell DNA through the molecular biology technique known as Polymerase Chain Reaction Finallv (PCR). thev carried out Gel Electrophoresis by loading their cheek cell DNA into electrophoresis gels. Students also had the opportunity to analyze the results from Gel Electrophoresis. The real-world applications of these molecular biology techniques were also discussed.

Mrs. Kharotia's Grade 11 University Physics students are working on the Model Bridge Project for their culminating project. Each model bridge will be tested for strength by loading the bridge with steel weights, and weights will continue to be added until the bridge breaks. Aesthetics and design will also be considered for assessing the bridge.

Students from Grades 11 and 12 participated in the intra-school Crystal Growing competition. The results of this competition will be announced by the end of this semester.

NEWS FROM THE THISTLETOWN ENVIRONMENTAL COUNCIL

A number of initiative, activities and events were organized and implemented by the TCI Environmental Council during Semester 1, 2015-16. A brief description of these initiatives, activities and events is given below.

A small group of students from the TCI Environmental Council participated in the Eco-Schools Kickoff Workshop on October 21, 2015. The participating students learned about and participated in many activities such as tree planting, bee keeping, invasive species, green house planting, etc. There was also an opportunity for participants from different schools to share their best practices and learn from each other.
