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Dear Thorncliffe Park Families,

I wanted to share with you our winter weather procedures and how you can help us to keep everyone safe.

After a snowfall, the TDSB arranges for a plow and salt truck to clear our back playground area. We are one of only a few schools that receives this service due to the high volume of parents and students that attend both our school and Fraser Mustard. Caretakers from both schools inspect our property each morning for icy spots and clear any areas that the plow could not reach. Although both schools try their best to maintain all areas, we will occasionally miss places. Also, "black ice" occasionally forms in the morning and disappears later on in the day, making it very difficult to notice.

I would appreciate your help to achieve our goal of keeping everyone safe:

1/ Please email me directly if you discover a place that needs to be salted or cleared and I will have my staff tend to it as soon as possible.

2/ At times we will place orange pylons around unsafe areas. Please do not walk through the pylons or have your children play between the pylons.

3/ It is extremely important that all students wear boots. Running shoes become very slippery in snowy and wet conditions so we do not want any students falling and getting hurt.

4/ Unfortunately, there is no parking for parents on our school site. The front loop is for buses only and the side parking lot is for staff. The loop is also narrower than usual due to the snow banks piled beside it. With the colder weather, several parents have been using the front loop to drop off students. Not only does this block the buses, it has also created a very dangerous situation for pedestrians. This week alone, we had 2 students and 3 staff members almost hit by cars. If you must drive to school, please park briefly in the mall lot. Thank you for your cooperation.





<u>Coding</u>


Ms. Hopkin's Gr. 5 Class




Younger kids can help by:



Principals are often asked how we decide whether it's too cold to allow our students out in the schoolyard for recess.

Fresh air and exercise are important for children. It keeps them physically fit, and helps them stay alert all through the school day. Parents can help by making sure their children come to school prepared to spend time outdoors. Hats, mitts, boots and a warm jacket are important to keep students comfortable during lunch and recess.

But extreme cold can be dangerous, and parents want to know that their children will be safe. When the temperature is predicted to drop below - 15C, the City of Toronto may declare a cold weather alert. Schools are very sensitive to the needs of our students and pay close attention to the weather, especially when the windchill is below -20 C.

The TDSB Severe Weather Protocol is flexible, so that every principal can make a decision that meets the needs of his or her school. It sets guidelines for when to allow students outside for recess, when to make outdoor breaks shorter, and when to keep students inside altogether.

Canadian winters can be wonderful but when the weather is cold, school staff keep one eye on the thermometer and the other on the needs of our students - a perfect balance of fun and safety.
