

## PRESENTATIONS FOR STUDENTS FOCUSING ON KINDNESS & BULLYING AWARENESS

During the week of April 11<sup>th</sup>, the school will be putting a focus on Bullying Awareness as well as being kind and caring to others. There will be presentations to highlight these messages for all students from JK – Grade 5. On Tues. April 12<sup>th</sup> our KNG students will be treated to a presentation by Arts Express called "Milton's Secret". Grade 1 and 2 students will enjoy this same presentation on Wed. April 13<sup>th</sup>. Milton's Secret is a story

about a boy name Milton. Milton is a happy kid until he encounters a school bully. He worries all the time about what the bully will do. Milton encounters a few situations that help him understand a very important thing: the only way to be happy is to live in the NOW! Using the lessons in the story and mindfulness techniques students will learn how to stay in the moment and cope with fear and anxiety.

On Wed. April 13<sup>th</sup> there will be a presentation for our Grade 3-5 students entitled "Tackling Anxiety and Stress through Arts and Mindfulness" (TASAM). This presentation addresses the same issues as the parent presentation taking place a week earlier. Using a creative arts approach, the children will be provided with lifelong strategies and techniques to cope with anxiety and stress, helping them effectively eliminate the stigma and discomfort of these issues.



## PINK SHIRT DAY WEDNESDAY, APRIL 13, 2022

The **International Day of Pink** is a worldwide anti-bullying event held annually during the second week of April. This year it falls on Wed. April 13, 2022.

This Day originated in 2007 when David Shepherd and Travis Price along with their friends organized a protest to stand up to bullying and harassment after a grade 9 student was bullied for wearing a pink shirt to school. The next day David Shepherd and Travis Price rallied their school community. They bought and distributed 50 pink shirts to students in the school to wear in support of their young classmate. The grade 9 classmate was moved by the kindness shown by the community and the bullies were never heard from again.

We encourage all students and staff to wear a pink shirt in honour of International Day of Pink on April 13, 2022. Bullying of any kind has no place in our school and in the Toronto District School Board. Today our diversity is becoming more visible than ever as people continue to embrace their cultures, identities, and true selves in more open and direct ways; making the need to Lift Each Other Up and have greater acceptance, respect, and inclusion for everyone so important. Wearing pink shows your commitment to being an ally and standing up to bullying.

All students and staff will be given a **PINK** t-shirt to wear on April 13<sup>th</sup> **and** to keep as a reminder to always stand up to bullying and to *Lift Each Other Up*. #### LIBRARY UPDATE

We are currently conducting an inventory for our school library.

# STUDENT ATTENDANCE AND PUNCTUATLITY



Regular student attendance and punctuality are important in order for students to be successful at school. The Education Act states that it is the responsibility of the parent/guardian to ensure that their children attend school regularly. A student's academic progress depends on regular class attendance.

TDSB elementary schools practice the Safe Arrival Program that requires schools to perform a school-home attendance check. Notify the school when your child will be absent. Students are expected to fully participate in learning opportunities and complete all homework assignments and tests when they are absent so make sure your child is getting homework assignments when they are absent.

You can help ensure that your child is in school and on time for classes by:

- being involved in your child's education;
- knowing the school's schedule;
- communicating regularly with classroom teachers (use your child's planner to send notes to the teacher);

- calling the school if your child is going to be absent
- writing a note if your child is late due to an appointment;
- ensuring that your child gets a good night's sleep so that they have the energy they need for the next day.



### HIGH WATER LEVELS BRINGS INCREASED RISKS

The Toronto and Region Conservation monitors hazardous ice conditions as thaw begins and are reminding everyone to be very careful around all bodies of water. The first hint of warming weather and the promise of spring thaw can bring extreme danger to the shores and surfaces of streams, rivers, ponds and lakes, according to Toronto and Region Conservation.

As warmer temperatures arrive, stream banks become increasingly slippery and unstable. Lake and river ice weakens, becoming thinner or with higher flows breaking with little or no warning. During this time, the potential for flooding and ice jamming is high.

Higher, faster-flowing water and extreme cold temperatures combine to create increased dangers on or near rivers, streams and ponds for people wishing to enjoy the seasonal changes. Parents and caregivers are being asked to keep children away from stream banks, ponds and lakes.



# APRIL IS SIKH HERITAGE MONTH AT THE TDSB

Sikh Heritage Month is proudly recognized at the Toronto District School Board (TDSB) during the month of April since 2016 as the Board of Trustees voted to designate April of each year Sikh Heritage Month making the TDSB the first school board in Canada to do so. This designation matches the recognition by the Province of Ontario that proclaimed Sikh Heritage Month Act in December 2013, and the recognition proclaimed by the Government of Canada on April 30, 2019. Sikh Heritage Month is recognized nationally across Canada.

This year our theme is Come to learn, go to serve; the goal of education is to serve humanity. Sikh Canadians have lived in Ontario since the turn of the twentieth century. They have made significant contributions to the growth and prosperity of Ontario and their traditions and culture continue to be a vibrant art of every aspect of life for Canadians today.

We are inviting all TDSB community, students, and staff to join our virtual Sikh Heritage Month launch to recognize the contributions of Sikh Canadians. Join us for a remarkable afternoon of information and celebration (see below for full details).

Since its creation of the Latin-America History Month Volunteer Planning Committee in 2016, the membership continues to expand searching every year for more intentional ways of working in solidarity with Indigenous Nations of Turtle Island (Canada) and ways to bring Elders, Knowledge Keepers, educators and families together to decolonize understandings of Latin-America. The Latin-America History Volunteer Planning Committee is comprised of TDSB staff, former students, parents/caregivers, and community members.

During the month of April, several activities are being planned for students, staff, and community members. We invite everyone to join us to kickoff Latin-America History Month with a virtual launch (see below & flyer for details). We're pleased to share with you the results of a Creative Arts Contest (to be posted shortly on the TDSB website) where all TDSB students were invited to participate from all grade levels. Elementary students will also be provided with the opportunity to learn about the art of healing and the powerful tool that music brings with Ruben Beny Esguerra, a Canadian musical artist and poet based in Toronto. Ruben Beny Esguerra has been nominated twice for a JUNO Award (2018 JUNO Awards in the World Music Album of the Year category and for the 2022 JUNO Awards in the Global Music Album of the Year category.)

During the month of April the TDSB recognizes Hispanic Heritage Month. In March 2010, our TDSB Board of Trustees voted that April be designated as Hispanic Heritage Month at the Toronto District School Board. As stated in the Hispanic Heritage Month Act, (May 5, 2015): "Ontario is home to more than 400,000 first-, second- and third-generation Canadian of Hispanic origin. As early as 1914, Canadians who originated from 23 Hispanic countries began immigrating to the province and today the Hispanic community is one of the fastest growing in Ontario. Hispanic-Canadians represent a dynamic community that has made significant contributions to the growth and prosperity of the Province of Ontario. By proclaiming the month of October as Hispanic Heritage Month in Ontario, the province recognizes the rich contributions of Hispanic-Canadians to our social economic, political and multicultural fabric. Hispanic Heritage Month is an opportunity to remember, celebrate and educate future generations about the outstanding achievements and contributions of Hispanic people in the province."
