FROM THE PRINCIPAL'S DESK



AFRICAN HERITAGE MONTH

February is African Heritage Month and it is an occasion to recognize and celebrate the many achievements and contributions of Peoples of African Descent to Canada and the world. The first Black Canadian woman elected to Parliament, the Honourable Jean Augustine, introduced a motion to recognize February as Black History Month. The motion was carried unanimously by the House of Commons. In December 1995, the House of Commons officially recognized February as Black History Month in Canada. At the Toronto District School Board, a motion to recognize African Heritage (Black History) Month was carried in January 2002 and reaffirmed again in January 2004. An <u>artwork</u> created by students under the leadership of their teacher, Matthew Chapman, from Downsview Secondary Schools in 2020 has been updated to showcase this year's theme *NIA: Walking in Our Purpose.* Five principles of Kwanzaa are presented in this painting:

- Umoja (unity) the tattoo
- Nia (purpose) the logo on the shoe
- Kuumba (creativity) the logo on the shirt
- Imani (faith) the brand tag on the hijab
- Kujichagulia (self determination) found in the fabric of one of the shirts.

There were almost 1.2 million Black people living in Canada in 2016. The Black population is diverse and has a long and rich history in Canada. This dates back as early as 1608 with Mathieu De Costa who came from Holland to Canada to work as a French interpreter. There was also a large settlement of Blacks in New Frence in and around 1734 with Marie Joseph Angelique. During the 1850's and 1860's many Blacks fled to Canada from the United States seeking refuge from enslavement because of the Trans Atlantic Trade.

Among the Black population born outside of Canada, the source countries of immigration have changed over time. More than half of this population who immigrated before 1981 were born in Jamaica and Haiti. Black newcomers now come from about 125 different countries, mainly from continent of Africa.

During the month of February, several activities are being planned and they include a virtual launch to kick-off African Heritage Month (see details below) as all staff, students and the TDSB community are invited to attend!

CHINESE HERITAGE MONTH

The month of February is proudly recognized as Chinese Heritage Month (CHM). This year CHM coincides with one of the most important Chinese celebrations, the Lunar New Year!

The Chinese community is integral to the growth and success of the City of Toronto and Canada. Members of the Chinese community represent approximately 10 percent of the total GTA population and form its second largest visible minority group.

During this month, we celebrate the energetic culture and traditions of the Chinese community with students, staff and community members.

Below is a contribution from one of the parents at Twentieth Street from our Virtual Kindergarten Class, Jennifer Tam who wrote a little bit about Chinese or Lunar New Year. This year it is celebrated on Tues. Feb. 1, 2022.

Happy Chinese New Year to all of you, I hope everyone is doing well and are staying safe. I'm happy to be able to write about our culture this year for all the families, I hope you all enjoy this piece as we welcome a new year, this year being the year of the Tiger let me tell you a little history about it.

The Tiger is known as the king of all beasts in China. The zodiac sign Tiger is a symbol of **strength**, **exorcising evils**, and **braveness**. Many children wear hats or shoes with a tiger image for good luck.

Treats are shared during Lunar New Year, It's a classic Lunar New Year scene: Family and friends huddled over a red and gold candy box, unwrapping edible treats and shelling nuts. Cyun hap (LNY candy boxes) have a history that can be traced back for more than 1,000 years," says Gloria Chan, spokesperson for the Hong Kong Culture Heritage Studies and Promotion Association. The traditional word 'cyun' means 'to put together, or to bring together. By putting all the fortune candies in one place, a cyun hap symbolizes bringing luck together and wishing blessings for the coming year. "It's important to note the word "candy" should be used loosely and can refer to anything from seeds to dried fruit. Nian gao, also known as "rice cake" or "New Year cake" in English, are a must for Chinese New Year. The "gao" in nian gao is a homophone of 高 (gāo—tall/high). It's a wish to be successful and "higher" each year. Every year will be better than the last. Some funny parents like to tell their children that eating this will help them grow taller too. They are either made of sticky glutinous rice or yellow rice, giving nian gao two major colors and textures. During Chinese New Year, any flower market or shop will have abundant bouquets, pots and arrangements of Orchids - to decorate our homes for a fresh beginning

Chinese lanterns are used in important festivals such as the Spring Festival (Chinese New Year to the Lantern Festival) and the Mid-Autumn Festival. During Chinese New Year it is not uncommon to see lanterns hung on trees in the streets, office buildings, and doors of houses. Hanging a red lantern in front of the door is believed to **drive off bad luck.**

People of Chinese origin believe that what you do at the beginning of a new year will affect your luck in the coming year. **Staying up on Chinese New Year's eve** (January 31st, 2022) and **saying good words** to your family/friends like Happy *New Year after the clock strikes 12 will certainly bring good luck.*

We wish every family and their loved ones a Happy Chinese New Year and stay happy and healthy in the upcoming year.
