
How to Create a High School Plan using MyBlueprint

- 5. Open up the attachment for the school for which you would like to develop a plan.




6. With the attachment open in one window, you can go back and forth and make the course selections in MyBlueprint. Students have had a workshop on how to complete this step. It's real easy!.



Some things to consider when working with your grade 8 child selecting courses.

<u>Understanding Course Codes – Please consult the Choices for 9 Guide that was sent home earlier this</u> year.





Academic courses develop students' knowledge and skills through the **study of theory and abstract problems**. These courses focus on the essential concepts of a subject and explore related concepts as well. They incorporate practical applications as appropriate.

Course code example: ENG1D1 the "D" denotes Academic

Applied courses focus on the essential concepts of a subject, and develop students' knowledge and skills through **practical applications and concrete examples**. Familiar situations are used to illustrate ideas, and students are given more opportunities to experience hands-on applications of the concepts and theories they study.

Course code example: ENG1P1 the "P" denotes Applied

Locally Developed Courses

Locally developed courses are courses developed by school boards to meet educational needs that are not met by courses outlined in the curriculum policy documents. Such courses may be developed to accommodate the educational or career preparation needs of students in a particular school or region, or the special needs of exceptional students. Locally developed courses can be designed to meet compulsory or optional credit requirements.

Course code example: ENG1L1 the "L" denotes Locally Developed

Open courses are the only type of course offered in most subjects other than those listed above. They are designed to prepare students for further study in a subject, and to enrich their education generally. Open courses comprise a set of expectations that are appropriate for all students.

Course code example: Vocal Music - AMV101 the "O" denotes Open

Your child's grade 8 teachers will be providing "suggestions" for course types that may be suited for her/his grade 9 course selection. *Ultimately, student and parent/guardian will make final decision based on all information provided.*

French

All grade 9 students in Ontario are required to take French in grade 9. Exceptions for Substitutions or Exemptions are reviewed on a case-by-case basis upon receiving a written request by parent/guardian. This letter is addressed to Mr. Sprack and Ms. Kim.

Students may choose any one of the following courses for French:

French: FSF1P1 (Applied); FSF1D1 (Academic); FSF1O1 (Beginner - limited or no previous French)

Special Education

Students receiving special education support in our HSP or MID programs, are encouraged to select course types as recommended by the committee at the Annual IPRC Review meeting from November 2016. In some cases, students have been recommended to take the General Learning Strategies (GLE1O9) course. This course is a CREDIT course which counts towards the completion of the 30 Credit Ontario Secondary School Diploma.

This course is offered in each of the 4 years in high school. It provides students support in improving organizational skills, time management, how to prepare for tests and prioritizing assignments, how to plan and study for exams as well as, a resource centre for support with course material.

Taking the GLE course DOES NOT automatically allow a student to substitute it in place of French. Once again, a written request is required and it will be reviewed on a case-by-case basis.
